We flew a new B17-G to England arriving on 1/5/45. We arrived at the 306th Bomber Group 1/13/45 and were assigned to the 367th Bomber Squadron. Flew first mission 1/28/45 to Colone (Koln), and flew the last mission on 4/17/45 to Dresden, mission #35.

Assigned B17-F "Hellcat Hattie" 43-38302, which was finally shot down over the English Channel by a new gunnery crew on a training mission 3/9/45.

1st Lieutenant William H. Wear (Pilot) and Staff Sergeant Clarence Allred (Ball Turret Gunner) were the only two on William H. Wear's crew to finish 35 missions. 1st Lieutenant W. H. Wear's last mission 4/15/45 and Staff Sergeant Clarence Allred's last mission 4/17/45.

- Jamuary 28, 1945, (1)--Cologno Koln -: Alack moderate. Lt. Hatch-Filot. Flack was accurate.
- January 23, 1945, Third anniversary of Eighth Air Force.
- February 1, 1945, (2)--Mannheims Lt. Woar-Pilot. Flack moderate. February 3, 1945, (3)--Berlins Lt. Wear-Pilot. (Nine hour mission). Flack was terrific. Lost two planes. Flow deputy load from target home. Biggest raid of war. (250,000 people killed.)
- February 6, 1945, (4)-Fuldas Lt. Wear-Pilot. (Ten hour mission). Milk rum, little flack over Helland Coast.
- February 9, 1945, (5)--Lutsondorf: Lt. Weer-Pilot. (Hine hour minsion). Hilk run. February 10, 1945, (6)--Dulmen: Lt. Weer-Pilot. (Eight hours). Hilk run. Received first air medal.
- February 14, 1945, (7)-Dresdon: Lt. Wear-Pilot. No flack over target. Moderate flack over front lines.
- February 15, 1945, (8)-Dortmund: Lt. Wear-Pilot. Plenty of flack. Good hits on Oll Plant. * 4
- February 19, 1945, (9)--Bookung Lt. Wear--Filot. Moderate flack. Hit oil target. February 21, 1945, (10)-Ruremberge Lt. Wear-Pilot. Very little flack. Tank Factory.
- February 22, 1945, (11)-Whittstock: Lt. Wear-Pilot. Onl. Sutton-Lead. Bombed at 12,000 feet, no flack. 190s and Jets. 300 missions for 306 Bemb Group.
- February 23, 1945, (12)-Plauent Lt. Wear-Pilot. Bombed at 12,000 feet again. Landed with tail wheel up, had to go around, ceiling was 200 feet. These low level attacks are hard on German Horal. Received the Cak Leaf Cluster.
- Following 26, 1945, (13)-Borline Lt. Wear-Pilot. Plenty of flack, but 10/10s . coverage gave us good support. A milk run compaired to February 3, 1945.
- Merch 2, 1945, (14)-Bohlens Lt. Wear-Pilot. Mil target of great importance. A pin point target, we got a direct hit. Really wiped it out. Lead group over. Got oxygen line shot out over target. John passed out from lack of exygen. Number 3 engine shot out. Landed in France. Come home in C-47. Flenty of flack end accurate.
- March 7, 1945, (15)-Seigens Lt. Wenr-Pilot. Support of front lines. Hit Worsholing Yards, 10/10 - P.F.F. Moderate flack.
- March 9, 1%5, Lost our ship "Hellcat Hattie". Another crew used it on gumery missions got shot down by some of our own gumners.
- March 10, 1945, (16) -- Dortmunds Lt. Wear-Pilot. More support of front lines. Merchaling Tards 10/10s.
- Farch 11, 1945, (17) -- Bremen: Lt. Wesr-Pilot. Sub pens. Moderate flack 10/10s.

Airch 14, 1945, (18)--Hildesheims Lt. Wear--Pilot. Largest Jet plant in Germany. Visual target. 306th was first over-complete destruction .

Morch 15, 1945, (19)-Zosnen: Lt. Wear-Pilot. Headquarters for German Army. No flack-good hits.

Merch 17, 1945, (20) -- Molbis: Lt. Wear--Pilot. (9) hours). Hit power plant that furnishes power for four large German towns. Leipzig and Bohlen being the main ones.

March 18, 1945, (21)—Berlins Another visual raid. It is supposed to be as big a raid as February 3, 1945. 25,000 tons dropped. Plenty of flack and very accurate. A great deal of holes in almost every plane. Ont large hale in wing. My worst raid of war,

Farch 19, 1945, (22)-Plauens Lt. Wear-Pilot. (9g hours). Hit Industrial Targetgood hits. Rendezvoued over Paris.

March 22, 1945, (23) -- Dorston: Lt. Rear-Pilot. Front line support. Hit a German Infantry Camp. Carried nickels.

Merch 23, 1945, (24)-Cresfeld: Lt. Wear-Pilot. Front line support. Hit rail yards-completely destroyed town.

Forch 24, 1945, (25)--Vechta: Lt. Near--Pilot. Front line support. Nit Jet air drome--completely destroyed it. Two missions that day.

Merch 30, 1945, (26)-Bremens Lt. Wesr-Pilot. Hit bridge in center of town. Links town with Sub Pens, got three large holes in R. waist, also rmist window broken cut. Plenty of fleck. Visual.

Merch 31, 1945, (27) -- Halles Marshalling Tards. Moderate fleck -- 10/10 coverage. Support to General Patton's spearhead. Lt. McDonald--Pilot. My ninth Wedding Anniversary.

April 1, 1945, Mode Staff Sargent.

April 3, 1945, (28)y-Riel: Sub pens and dock instellations. Went over North Sea, 1,000 miles. 8/10 coverage. Lt. Fear--Filat.

April 7, 1945, (29)-- Mosendorf: Lt. Wear--Pilot. 15,000 feet. Hit air drome used for Jet planes made three runs over target. Fighter attacks.

April 8, 1945, (30)-Helberstadt: Lt. Wear-Pilot. 20,000 fect. Warshalling Yards. Good hits-4/10-Ed flow with us.

April 10, 1945, (31)-ranienburgs Lt. Wear--Pilot. Air drome--fair hits. Oct a lot of accurate flack just before I. P. One ship got its tail khot off-gunner and all. Also seen midair collision.

April 11, 1945, (32) -- Kraiburg: Lt. Wear--Pilot. Muniti-ne factory. Perfect hits. Other Groups hit marshaling yards and air dromes all near Munic. Saw the Swiss Alps-made me home sick as hell.

April 14, 1945, (33)--Royan Area: Lt. Wear--Pilot. This is at the Fort of Bordo. At the mouth of Garande River in Southern France. Germans held wouth of river so Allies couldn't use it. Over energ territory five minutes--18,000 feet.

April 15, 1945, (34)-Reyen Ares-Port of Bardo: Same as yesterday only different aining point. 15,000 feet. French Army went in and started

taking it one hour after we hit it. It. Weer's last mission. Arril 17, 1945, (35)-Dresdens Lt. Marks-Pilot. Heavy flack. Hit Marshalling Inrie-grad hits.
