I believe; 3) a rador mission I led that we all get lost on until we passed over carkedool at Chartres to a lead navigator in another groups recognized it.

City Flo. Do you know where Dinuidale Enhancester is?

Hugh Phelan (bombordion) & I were Col. Robenson's "dammy our field"

bombing team. We blew hell out of a dummy field one day!

I used to wonder who was looking out for me, I times I had to pick a crew to fly with even the I was spell nev. because they had none. Each time the other crew was shot down! I times my berracks was shot down to about I people + I was the only one there ell I times. Needless to say I moved out!

Saw a letter recently from Fuhrmeister, saying that he had had a surprise call recently from Duke Jacobs, who lives at Orlando.

I'm also interested in that first Schweinfurt raid. Did you actually practice before the raid for several weeks? Tell me about it. Also, would appreciate any details of the mission you can remember. I spent an afternoon with Bill Raper last summer. Don't believe he has changed much since Thurleigh days. He retired as a one-star.

Dear George:

I have my fingers crossed that you still have possession of your 201 file. If so, I am interested in receiving copies of any odrders that you have issued by the 306th Bomb Group, Station iil, or other organizations which you were stationed in England.

Special Orders were not routinely saved until 1 Dec 43, and those that I have collected prior to that date have come from individuals, and are the only source for many of the names of men who served with the 306th.

You know, the USAAF did not keep rosters of the 306th, or any other unit. I have the film of all the orders after 1 Dec 43, and a smattering of those before, beginning 1 Mar 42.

If you can assist me in any way, I will be eternally grateful.
