



FIRST OVER GERMANY: THE STORY OF THE 306TH BOM-BARDMENT GROUP. By Arthur P. Bove. 148 pp. \$5.00

The people of Putnam are always glad to greet proudly any Putnam man or woman who enters the magic circle of authorship. This fall we greet the first of our servicemen to publish a book upon the War. Arthur Bove's "First Over Germany," just off the press, is a volume of which he and we may well be proud. This attractive book will claim the interest, not only of his fellow townsmen, not only of the men of the 305th Bombardment Group for whom it is primarily written, but also of every reader, for who has not been thrilled by the exploits of the Eighth Air Force, an important unit of which this book makes real to us.

The volume itself is attractively bound, printed upon excellent stock in double column, thus containing a much larger amount of text than one might at first think, since an outstanding feature is the illustration by almost countless prints of all sortsphotographs of officers and men, of planes and of places, astonishing that the reproduction of casual snapshots has been so successful. It was H. G. Wells who made his famous Mr. Britling note that the Kodak shows only sunny days, Though this may not be strictly true, certainly the wealth of these pictures will recall to the men of the 306th much that they will be happy to

remember and much that, even though it be touched by sadness, they will cherish in memory.

However, interesting as are the varied and extensive illustrations, and tireless as the author has been in collecting them, the written content is the vital element of this book as of any.

Mr. Bove has written a clear, concise history of Bomb Group 306 from the time it was welded into a unit at Salt Lake City, March 1942, through its training period to its arrival in England in the early fall of 1942. It was stationed at Thurleigh, Bedfordshire, where it took over in December an R. A. F. field, and from which it operated till V-E Day. Then follow accounts of the experimental period, descriptions of the four squadrons of the 306th and a spirited narrative of the attack on January 27, 1943 which established the Group's right to the title, "First Over Germany." The narrative continues to a Post-War Supplement, Due credit is given to both the famed and the reason to be sincerely proud.
