Many thanks for your interesting reply to my queries.

I have kept those things which seemed to be copies, and copied some that are originals, and am returning them to you.

I have also selected fourbpictures and am having them copied and will return the originals to you as soon as they are finished.

The picture of Banshee was especially welcome. Wild Bill Casey, whom I spent a lot of time with in Miami Beach, sent me a poor snapshot, the only thing he had left and I think it was of Banshee II. I copied it and sent him back an enlargement along with the original. But as soon as I get a print of this I'll send it along to him and credit you. I know he will be pleased.

I would like to ask you for one more thing. Do you have in your 201 file, or other records, any orders from the 306th or from the squadrons? I would like to borrow these, or have you send me copies, if you can copy them easily. I am interested in those published from the beginning up to Dec 1, 1943. These were not saved by the group and have disappeared. The government does not have them. Thus far I have been able to pick up 40 or 50 from various people and there are probably about 450 in all. 

Joe Bowles, DFC, Got to Fly Because Comrade Became Ill

First Lt. Joe Bowles, much decorated officer on a Flying Fortress whose wife, Mrs. Frances Bowles, lives at 2101 Courtland Ave., began flying only as a "substitute" member of the plane's crew, according to a recent story released at an Eighth Air Force bomber command station somewhere in England. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. William E. Bowles, live at 802 Tenth Street Extension.

Bowles, who has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Purple Heart, went overseas as an armorer and a technical sergeant. The authorities refused to allow him to go on combat because armorers were needed, the story relates, but when a ball turret gunner became ill just before the first raid of the group, Bowles took his place.

He stayed with the crew after that flying alwasy as ball turret gumer, in the famous Fortress "Banshee", which has since been shot down. He completed his tour as technical sergeant on June 28, and was commissioned a second lieutenant last July 16, and promoted to 1st lieutenant Dec. 1. Since he has taken up his duties as gunnery officer, he has evolved new tactics which have been widely used and highly successful.

He was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received during the famous low-altitude mission over St. Nazaire. His ship was hit badly by both flak and 20 mm; shells, tearing away large parts of stabilizer and rudder, and leaving a huge hole in the leading edge of the wing. The co-pilot had the rudder pedals shot right out from under his feet, and both navigator and bombardier were wounded by flying fragments. "The flying controls were hit," says Lt. Bowles, "forcing us out of formation. The side of my turret received a direct flak hit, tearing out a hole and wounding me in the head,"
Lt. Bowles is credited with two

o'clock low." "At 500 yards I gave him a 100-round burst," says Lt. Bowles, "and he simply fell apart. I saw the pilot bail out and his black chute open. A few minutes later another F-W came in at 6 o'clock low. I opened fire at 900 yards first category him squarely at 400 yards. The whole ship hurst into flame and catapulted downward. The pilot didn't have time to get out." In spite of having three wounded men on board and all the damage to the ship, the pilot brought the plane back and landed it safely.

Lt. Bowles enlisted in the six corps Nov. 5, 1942, and took armament and turret training at Loury Field, Denver, Colo., and McDill Field, Fla. As a civilian he had worked as salesman for Swift & Cu, in Rosnoke, Va. He gradusted from Jefferson high school, Rosnoke, in 1930.
