#### BIOGRAPHY

#### COLONEL GEORGE R BUCKEY

### PART 1 - Narrative

Colonel Buckey was born at Belen, New Mexico, on May 5, 1919.

Shortly thereafter he moved to Trinidad, Colorado, where he resided until entering the service. He attended Trinidad High School and received his higher education at Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, Texas.

An aviation enthusiast from boyhood he obtained his private license during the summer of 1940. He enrolled in February of 1941 as a flying cadet in the United States Army Air Corps. He attended flight training at Santa Maria, Moffett Fld, and graduated from Stockton Air Base, California, where he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Corps Reserve on 27 September 1941.

Lieutenant Buckey's first assignment was as a pilot with the 17th Bombardment Wing at Pendleton, Oregon, flying B-25's when the War broke out.

His next assignment was with the 303d Bombardment Wing at Boise,

Idaho, flying B-17's where he volunteered for an undisclosed mission which

turned out to be reenforcement for the Midway battle. He arrived in

Hawaii a day after the battle was won and he spent the next two months

conducting submarine patrol in that area.

Due to the priority of the war in Europe he was sent back to the United States where he joined the 306th Bombardment Wing which deployed to England in August 1942.

It was as Commanding Officer of the 367th Bomb Squadron, 306th Bomb Wing, an 8th AF unit in England, that LtCol Buckey won the Distinguished Flying Cross with one Oak Leaf Cluster and the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. He returned to the U.S. in June 1944 after completing 25 combat missions.

LtCol Buckey's first post war assignment was Operations Officer of a B-29 Group at Pratt AAB, Kansas. He attended the Command and General Staff School at Leavenworth, Kansas during the fall of 1946, after which he spent a short tour at Clovis AAB, New Mexico before being assigned to Davis-Monthan. AFB, Tucson, Arizona, where he was Director of Personnel, 43d Bomb Wing, a position he held until 1950. It was during this tour that he attended the Air Command and Staff School at the Air University. For the next two and one half years, Col Buckey was the Chief of Maintenance, 97th Bombardment Wing, Biggs AFB, El' Paso, Texas during which time he spent seven months TDY in England during the Korean War.

From November 1952 to August 1953 he was Deputy Commander,
7th Bombardment Wing at Carswell AFB, Ft Worth, Texas

In August 1953 he joined the newly formed 9th Bombardment Wing at Biggs AFB, Texas as Director of Materiel.

His next assignment, September 1956 to September 1957, was
Chief of the 15th AF Assistance Team, March AFB, California. In
September 1957, Col Buckey proceeded to Anderson AFB, Guam where
he served two years as Director of Materiel, 3d Air Division. After
returning from Guam in 1959 he spent one year as Director of Materiel,
22d Air Division, Clinton County AFB, Ohio.

In October 1960 he assumed the duties as Director of Materiel,

818th Strategic Aerospace Division, Lincoln AFB, Nebraska. While at

Lincoln he attended the Senior Officers' B-47 Transition Course,

McConnell AFB, Kansas and the Supervisor and Management Course on

the Atlas F Missile at Sheppard AFB, Texas.

In September 1962 he joined the 837th Air Division, Shaw AFB, SC, with duties as Deputy for Materiel. With the deactivation of the 837th Air Division in February 1963, Colonel Buckey became the Deputy for Materiel, USAF Tactical Air Reconnaissance Center, with the Headquarters at Shaw AFB, SC.

Col Buckey is credited with flying 25 combat missions with a total of 150 combat hours during World War II. He amassed approximately 3900 hours flying time in a variety of aircraft.

Colonel Buckey and his wife, the former Maxine George, of Comanche, Texas, have three sons and two daughters: Richard 21, Donna 18, Barbara 14, David 11, and Stephen 9.
