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

I'm sure slow about writing and right now I haven't much time but there is one thing I have to find out about. That is -

Bob Ennis has been after me for his trailer hitch and I figure it is still on your car. So – can I go down there and get it or can you have some one there ship it up here.

If I knew where I could get another one to replace it I'd get that and you could keep the other one.

Bob has asked me several times if I'd found out about it yet and I keep stalling him off but guess will have to do something soon.

Let me know right away if there is any way I can get that one back.

I'd be willing to take a bus down some Sat. nite and come back Sun. to get it if there was some way I'd be sure of getting it when I got there.

We still haven't shot any of the picture we were planning on but will start next week if not sooner. So I'm not sure I'll be here this week end.

Oct. 23, 1942

Dear Leonard

Well, I'm in the army now. Got in here last nite at 6.30 (Thurs.). Sure was a rough trip down. We had a special train. 450 guys on it. all the cars were so old they were about to fall apart. I was on the best car in the train and the least crowded. only 11 of us and most cars had 35 or 36. And the __ engineers we drew must have been kicked off freight engines. Sure handle that train rough. We didn't see anything worth seeing from the time we left San Berdov until we got almost to Kelly Field. Lost about 3 bucks in the poker game and had a lot of fun though.

Last nite we didn't get to eat until after 9 and in bed after 11. Up this morning at 5:30, breakfast at 6:15 and from 7 to 12 we stood in line to fill out insurance papers.

This afternoon is free until 4 and what comes then I don't know.

Boy, this place is huge. We've only seen a little bit of it so far and won't see much more for sometime.

It will take up several days to pass our exams to see if we are to be pilots, bombadiers, navigators or ground crew. Then we have to wait 3 or 4 weeks before getting into pre-flight and I don't know how long before we fly.

I think I'll like it fine after the strangeness wears off.

I'll write more soon. Answer as soon as you can.

I haven't heard from Kay yet. But should in a day or two.

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

Preflight School, Jan. 6, 1943

Dear Folks -

I've gotten all your letters O.K. but haven't done so well about answering. The past six days I've had my right arm all tied down with gauze and tape so I couldn't write. I threw my right shoulder out of joint again and the doc's have had me sort of tied up. I still have my arm in a sling but I can write O.K.

I threw it out while wrestling during Physical training period. The other fellow got a little enthusiastic at a time when I was in a bad position. However it wasn't serious as it only came part way out.

Well, things have been going right along here. A week from today we will be upperclassmen. Time sure goes fast here.

I've gotten both of Dad's letters and enjoyed them very much. I hope to be able to answer very soon.

I'm not sure I thanked you for the xmas presents before. If not, I sure do now because you sure sent the things I can use. I got the last box of cookies too. And the pop corn balls. Boy, were they good.

But don't try to send too much of that because sugar is a pretty hard thing to get for you folks and I can have all I want here one good thing about this place is the food. It is sure some different from the food in Classification Center. Right now, however we can't get any butter at all. Haven't been able to get any for several days.

It started to rain yesterday afternoon and has been raining pretty steadily ever since. We've sure had some lousy weather lately. Cold and windy and now rain.

One good thing about the rain, we can't go out and parade in the mud and parades are about the hardest thing here. you have to stand at attention or parade rest for about an hour and 45 minutes and your feet go to sleep and every muscle aches until you swear you can't sand still another second. Then they give the order to pass in review and when you start to walk you find that your feet are dead and you can hardly stand up. Add to that a good hot sun and you've really got something

Dear Folks

I've gotten all your letters but I'm slower than usual about answering this time I guess.

Been pretty busy as an upper-classman and especially the last week. We're getting ready to move out, to Primary. We leave tomorrow for Muskogee, Okla.

I'm sure glad I'm down south now, where there is no snow and it doesn't get very cold.

It has been cold enough to freeze ice outside and we have seen a few snow flakes but it didn't last long.

Sure was glad to hear that Dad got to go back East. Hope he got to see most of the folks.

I had a letter from Leonard a while ago. He was still working as usual. He didn't say much. I wonder if he is still figuring on going to Canada I hadn't had a letter from him for about a month and a half.

Had another nice letter from Mr. Kingsley. I sure do enjoy his letters. He writes almost as good a letter as Dad does, but not quite. I still have to laugh every time I think of Dad telling how the cow kicked him.

Our Group had their dance last Thurs. nite at the Service Club here on the past. We sure had a good time but it didn't last long. From 7:30 to 10:30. It was formal affair with the Cadet's in their full dress and white gloves and the girls in their formal dresses. It was quite a colorful show, quite a few of us had dates with girls we had met at a Tea Dance at the Gunther Hotel in San Antone a couple of weeks ago. For those who didn't have dates, the Cadet Hostess of the Post took care of them by inviting about a hundred extra girls. They arrived by bus loads and when they got off all you had to do was walk up and take one by the arm and there you were, all fixed up with a date.

We finished up our regular classes about a week ago but have been kept busy since learning all about chemical warfare and learning how to shoot .45 Colt automatics and .45 Calibre "Tommy" guns. Some fun. After shooting the .45 Colt I felt like I couldn't hit the ground with my hat but did quite a bit better with the "Tommy" gun.

Today is Turnabout day so the under classmen are having quite a time giving us the going over that we gave them for 4 ½ weeks.

I don't how I'm going to like Oklahoma but it can't be much worse than what I've seen of Texas at least we will be flying.

Meant to get something for you and Dad on your birthday but couldn't find anything I liked. I'm going to have some pictures made when I get to Primary and I'll

send you one as a substitute for something better. Anyway I sure hope you had very Happy Birthdays.

I'll write again just as soon as I get to Primary.

Dear Folks

Not much to write about but thought I'd drop a line anyway.

No flying today. This morning when we woke up there was a nice blizzard in progress. How this Oklahoma weather can change. It cleared up about noon and we had some fun out rassling around in the snow and having snow ball fights. Some different from San Antone.

I soloed last Saturaday. The first one of my class to do so. Makes me feel pretty good. I only hope I can keep it up. They really demand precision flying here. So far I haven't found it very hard but our training has just started.

I don't know if we will fly tomorrow. It's getting steadily colder now and may be too cold to fly tomorrow too. Whenever we can't fly, we are free to go into town so time doesn't drag like it would if we had to say in the barracks.

We took a lot of pictures today, so should have some in my next letter.

I talked to Kay the other nite, on the telephone and she had been home 3 days with the measles. She was feeling OK but didn't think much of having to stay inside all the time.

Mr. Kingsley did send a joke in his last letter. We all got a big kick out of it. Leonard is worse than I am about writing. I've written him 2 or 3 letters but haven't got an answer.

Got a letter from Edna the other day so I owe her one too.

She says the only way she can get a letter from me is to have a baby and I understand I'm about due to write her another letter. I'm sure though that it isn't necassary for her to go to such extremes.

I hope the weather has been better there. It should be. It's all moved down here now. I suppose you're already looking forward to spring work.

Dear Folks -

Well, here I am, back in the State of Texas. Got here yesterday afternoon about 1 o'clock after a 7 hour train ride from Muskogee in a broken down chair car.

Boy, is this another change. Not at all like Spartan. Nothing but sand. Not a blade of grass in sight. And tar paper shacks for barracks. We weren't looking for this when we came here but I guess we can stand it for a couple of months.

I guess we will start flying again about Monday.

I can see now that flying these BT-13's is going to be the best part about Basi I'm sure going to be tired of sand and tarpaper by the time I get out of here.

We won't be able to leave the post for at least 10 days and then we won't be able to get out over the weekends like the former Classes did. A new regulations say that no cadet may have an overnight pass.

Our class – 43-H – must be a jinx class or something. Every time we arrive at a new place they take some of our privileges away.

I'd hoped to get over to see Dallas once. It's about 55 miles away.

I had a letter from Leonard the other day. Guess he is still getting along OK. He sent some pictures of himself and the Stoudts and Wanda.

I still haven't sent that picture to you but will try and get it wrapped for mailing today. I've got some other pictures I want to send with it.

I expect you folks will soon be busy in the fields.

The mail just came in and I got the Harlem News. Thanks a lot.

Well, there doesn't seem to be much to write about this time but will write again in 3 or 4 days after we sort of get settled here.

Everythings going fine here. Have in 16 hours now in the BT trainer. About half of it solo. It's a lot of fun but some different from the Primary trainees.

We didn't like this place much when we first got here but are getting used to it now I guess. They keep us so darn busy that it's hard to find time to write much but will do the best I can. I think we're kept busier here than we were at Pre Flight. We've been here over two weeks now but doesn't seem that long.

Had a nice letter from Kingsley the other day. He must have lost my last address because he sent it to classification Center and it had to go to Pre Flight, then to Muskogee, and finally here.

Went to church this morning – a habit I've sort of got into lately. The sermon the preacher gave on Mothers and Mothers Day was sure good. Made a lot of us boys wish we were home again.

I should have sent the picture a long time ago but there is no way to get to a post office here to mail a package. However, I bought a lot of stamps in a drugstore today, so will put some stamps on it and send it with our regular mail and hope it gets to you O.K.

Had a letter from Mary the other day. Hope I can answer it soon. I've got to try and find time to do more letter writing.

Greenville, Tx Memorial Day 1943

Dear Folks -

I know I should have gotten a letter off to you long ago but first can't seem to get time to write. This won't be much but thought I'd better let you know I was O.K.

Everything is going just fine. I have in 55 hours now in the BT and should have about a 100 by the time I leave here. Getting so I know this ship pretty well now. Passed my final check on acrobatics the other day. Only have one more check to go and that's on blind flying.

I've been selected to fly in an acrobatic contest sometime before we leave here. The winner gets some war bonds or something.

We started flying nights last week. Fly 3 nites a week. Don't get much sleep. One nite I flew from 3 until 4:30 in the morning, got in bed at five and up at 7:15.

We had some nice cross country trips. The best one was to Texarkana, Arkansas, to Shreveport, La and back bout 350 or 400 miles altogether.

We have started flying "under the hood" now too. That's instrument flying. It's awfully tiresome.

We've been getting a lot of rain the last couple of weeks. However, it hasn't interfered with our flying too much. It rains almost every week end though. Not much to do around here when we do get off to town. Go to church every Sunday and usually see a show.

We will leave here some time late in June and already we are beginning to ??? ??? ??? still have no idea where we'll go from here.

Finished flying Tues, nite and since then we've just been puttering around the barracks.

After the pace we've been going, this sudden let down is no good. Guys get dissatisfied pretty easily. But I guess we will hold out till Monday.

I got a nice letter from Kingsleys the other day. Sure too bad about the Tanger & Boy.

Had a letter from Omer too. I hadn't heard from him in a long time.

I sent an announcement to Mary and Lex up there because Mary said in her last letter that they were going home so you can see that they get it.

This is sure a mixed up mess here. Nobody knows where they're going everbody's trying to get packed, everybody wants to get out so they can see folks in Houston, and nobody knows whats going on.

We've been issued all of our equipment and its quite a problem packing it.
Winter flying clothes, Mae West, parachutes and other stuff, takes up a lot of room

I don't believe any of us will get any time off between stations, so don't look for me home.

This is not a very cheerful letter but I don't feel very cheerful right now. We'll all feel better when we get to flying again, I reckon.

Just a glimpse of something besides are army post would help.

Well, when I write again it will probably be from some where else – outside the state of Teal hope.

Dear Dad -

Got your letter last week end and as Sunday was Fathers Day I figured I'd write a little myself.

Sure glad to hear things are going OK and crops looking good. Hope you don't have any trouble getting labor. I know that the farm labor shortage is pretty serious in many parts of the country.

This is quite a country down here. Flat as a table in every direction. Cotton is the big crop here. It's pretty country to fly over. Lots of woods and streams and everything is green. If only there was a hill now and then.

We took a cross country trip to Texarkana, upon the Arkansas border, then down to Shreveport, Louisiana, so got to see a good deal of eastern Texas. Gets pretty swampy down around Shreveport.

It stays so damn hot here all the time. Thunderstorms around every day but haven't been getting much rain lately.

We've just about finished our flying here only flying 30 min. a day. Just enough to keep our hand in

We will be leaving for Advanced School the end of this week I think. We know where we are going but can't say until after we get there. I'll let you know as soon as I get there. I'm going to twin engine school which is what I wanted. I feel lucky cause a lot of guys didn't get what they asked for. Being as I'm going to Twin engine school I may be flying one of those 4 engine bombers before long. It may be I'd be sent up that way.

Jack and a couple of other cadets were suppossed to fly back to Primary at Muskogee to talk to the cadets there to tell them what to expect in Basic school but think they've decided it's too far. Sure would like to go, though.

I haven't heard from Leonard for quite awhile so don't know if he is married or not but expect he is. If he is, he got a swell girl. I guess he has a pretty good job where he is at and would hate to leave although he mentioned in a couple of letters about jobs in the aircraft factories. I thin that's where he will wind up eventually. There isn't much else doing around L.A. now except factory work.

Have had a couple of letters from Mary since she got to Cheyenne. I gather she doesn't think to much of the place. I never could figure out why they left Gt. Falls. I guess this war makes everbody restless and they get the idea they could do more somewhere else.

Dear Folks -

Reckon it's time I answered your last letter.

Got by my birthday OK. Just another flying day. Received the package OK. Too. Thanks a lot. We all sat down and ate it up right away because the ants and cockroaches are too bad to leave any thing around.

You asked when Kays birthday is. It's not until Jan. 19th.

I got a card from both Leonard and Wanda. First time I've heard from them in about 3 months. They seem to be getting along fine.

Did I tell you about our hurricane. You probably read about, if I didn't I know for sure that I want to be down in a deep hole next time – if there is a next time – I'm in one of those blows. I've definitely had enough of the state of Texas and the South in general. Too hot, too many bugs and too many storms. The wind was above 100 M.P.H at times and there we were out in it supposedly holding down the planes but mostly just hanging on to keep from being blown away.

We're getting behind again. We will probably have to fly Sat.& Sun. nites this week. Which won't matter much because we are confined to post this weekend because of a few cases of infantile??? ?? She hasn't written for sure yet. Se said she was quitting there the 15th and heading back to California.

With the last few nites off, I've been catching up on my letter writing. I still owe Kingsleys one though.

I was going thru a lot of letters tonite, that had accumulated and in one Dad asked about Bob Ripley. I don't remember whether or not I told you about the last word I had about him. It's been a long time ago now that Dave Edwards in Calif. Got a telegram saying he was missing on a Flying Fortress in the Battle of Batoon. I haven't heard anything since.

I also ran across a clipping you sent me about Wayne Suhr Xthat you wanted back so I'm sending it now.

Also a couple of pictures that were taken at Basic at Major's Field. Not very good, but they show the airplane anyway.

Well, the day of days is drawing closer and life here is becoming easier. About all we do now is fly, eat, sleep and fly which is what want so haven't much kick x coming.

Did Leonard and Wanda send you a picture? They look pretty good, I think. Can't think of anything else right now so will sign off until later.

Dear Folks -

Got your letter the other day and it reminded me that it was time I wrote again.

Well, it's almost over now – at least this part of it. Will we be glad to get out of here!! We've been restricted to the post for three weeks now and things are going from bad to worse. Especially since we've finished flying and have nothing to do. Tempers are getting short and dispositions bad. Getting so you speak softly to you're best friend.

The restriction seems so silly that none of us can understand it. The reason they give is a few cases of infantile paralysis in Houston. But they let all the regular soldiers and the officers go into town, only the cadets are restricted and as soon as we get our commissions, they'll turn us loose. We're made immune, I guess, by act of congress.

Kay has been down here a week but of course I haven't been able to see her. I guess I'll be able to see her Monday, graduation day. She's staying with Leo's wife in town. Having a time talking them into staying until we do see them. They're about ready to go back to Calif.

If I never see the state of Texas again, it will be too soon to suit me.

Dear Leonard & Wanda -

I'm writing this letter from some where on the surface of the earth – they tell me it's part of Texas but I'm sure this can't be part of the U.S. God! What a place! Only in Texas would it be possible.

The only thing this country is good for is rattlesnakes & horned toads, and I doubt if they would stay here if they had the ambition to move on.

After standing up in the aisle of a train, out of Fort Worth, almost all nite, we arrived in this hole about noon. Got off and looked around. Took 4 guys to hold me from getting back on that train. The town has about 75 people, a R.R. station, a filling station, a drug store, a theatre, 2 stores and a couple of beer halls. Oh yes, and a broken down hotel where Leo's wife is staying. You never saw such a bunch of broken down, sway backed, unpainted old board buildings in your life! And all around is desert as far as you can see.

The post is less than a mile from town and its much better. They have a good officers mess with good food and a nice officers club with a much nicer bar. We live in tarpaper barracks but that's not so bad. A darky boy keeps them cleaned up.

This is a base for B-17's and we were sent up here to be co-pilots. So far, haven't been up yet but have spent sometime in the cockpit trying to figure it all out. Boy, it's a lot of airplane, and I don't mean maybe!!

We're suppossed to leave here in a couple of weeks for our 2nd phase of training some where in Southeast U.S. We haven't got all our crew yet but I guess we will pick them up at the next base.

It's rumored pretty strongly that after the second or third phase of training, the copilots will be sent back here as first pilots to start making up crews of their own. I hope its true. The rest of the crew will get a copilot from Transition School, go to their last base for a final going over, then go across.

Nothing definite on it however. Nothing is definite in the Army anyway.

We are also supposed – to get 8 days between here and our next station which will be in Louisiana I think. With travel conditions the way they are, I don't know whether I could get out to Calif. & back to La. in time or not. And in the second place, it would cost just a little to much money, I'm thinking. However, I shall keep it in mind & work on it. We don't get travel pay to our next station so that makes it bad.

Did Katie get home yet? I've been wanting to write here every day but I didn't want to send a letter so that her folks would get it before she got there. That would spoil her surprise.

Gee, was I glad to see her. She was just about the loveliest sight I ever saw. She's just the same Katie. A little fatter but you kids can beat that off of her. Time was short down at Ellington and I was busy a lot of the time as it seemed as if I hardly got to see her at all. I sure hated to say good bye to her and leave her there in Houston. I know how lonesome I'd have felt if had to see her leave first. Bad enough as it was.

I sure hope she had a better trip than we did. I'm glad she didn't have to make it with us. That would have been too much.

The railroad thru here runs to El Paso and west. We are about 250 miles east of El Paso.

Show Katie this letter and make her write, right away. You guys write too and let me know what goes on. I'll write again, just as soon as I hear from you. I am anxious to know how Kay got along. I kind of worried when I saw how the trains are crowded.

I wish we could get started here. It's always like this. They rush you to a new station where you sit around on your butt for a week, wondering what it's all about.

I guess we'll get gong in a few days and probably when we do, we'll have more than we can handle.

I guess Leo's wife and Henry Browns wife are going to stay at the hotel in town but how they can stand it is more than I can understand. Course it won't be for so very long.

I sure got a swell kid as first pilot. His name is Svereika (SP) but he doesn't look it. Tall and lanky and blond and he really knows a "Fort" inside out. He's been flying then about 4 months.

I think I've jabbered enough for one time. Kay can probably tell you a lot more. Is Cort xstill with you? Tell him I said hello and asked about him.

Say hello to everybody else and tell them to write. Herb & Gwen especially.

Time I wrote a few lines anyway. I got both your letters. One of them was waiting for me when I got back from Calif.

I had a swell time while I was there. I was lucky going out. Got a seat on American Airlines from El Paso to Los Angeles. I had about 5 ½ days there and came back on the train.

Everybody is just fine. Leonard and Wanda look fine. Both are working. They have a nice place and a nice car and are getting along swell. I jumped them about writing and I'm going to write them a letter and bawl them out some more. They're not so busy that they can't write.

I'm glad the crops are good and hope you get the best prices. Wish help wasn't so hard to get, so you wouldn't have to work so hard yourselves.

Dick must be getting to be a pretty big guy now, huh?

I guess Kay wrote and told you we plan to be married. Some way we've got to arrange it so you can be there or so we can get u to see you.

I hope I get more time off than I did last time.

We're working hard here and doing a lot flying. The old "Flying Fortress" doesn't seem so bit anymore and ????? missing some of page?

So I finally got my picture in the G.F. Tribune. Any what a picture! The army can certainly take some dillies.

Did I tell you I got a letter from Thor Johnson, from College Station, Texas? I got a letter from Mary the other day. Guess they didn't buy a house after all. I don't know much more to write.

Don't care much for La. Too cold & too damp. Been fighting off a cold ever since I got here. The western states are still the best.

Well, I've got to get to bed. Got to get up early tomorrow and go to school, and fly tomorrow afternoon. We have a pretty tough schedule. We go to school and fly both for 3 days, then the fourth day just have school, then school and fly for 3 more days and the eighth day we have off. Today was the eight day.

Doesn't amount to much though because we flew last nite, so didn't get in till 2 A.M. Slept till 10 this morning and didn't get off the post until almost 1. Back early this evening because we have to get up early tomorrow.

Oh, well, that's the army.

Kays and my plans are going to be knocked into a cocked hat if I don't get leave. We are entitled to a leave, but getting it is something else.

We had pictures taken of the whole crew together the other day and as soon as we have some made up, I'll send one. I've seen one and its pretty good.

I haven't had a letter from any of the kids for sometime, so haven't heard anything new from them.

Today is our day off but we flew last nite until after midnite so didn't get up until 11 oclock today. Have to get in early tonite so a day off doesn't ???? (missing)

I guess I'll go in an see a show this afternoon and that will be about all.

They opened the new Officers Club last Sat. nite. It's really nice and gives us a place to lounge around in our free time, instead of staying in the barracks all the time.

Sure has been cold lately. get frost every once in awhile and the other morning after a rain, there was ice on the puddles.

I see in the paper that the Dakotas and Minn. Got quite a blizzard. I suppose you got some of it too.

Had several tornadoes in La. & Miss. last week but none close to here.

Did you get all the beets out before bad weather came?

I can't think of anything else. Hope everybody is OK and hope to see you sometime before Christmas.

Here it is, a new place and a new month, so time I wrote again.

Arrived here Sun. P.M. along with a few snow flakes. Didn't snow enough to even whiten the ground and has been pretty nice since. A little colder this morning.

I wrote Mary a letter as soon as I got here and she called me last nite. Said she was coming down this week sometime. Len couldn't get away so she is coming alone. We're only a little over 30 miles from Cheyenne and I hoped I could get up that far, but I guess I won't be able to. 300

We haven't been doing much of anything since we got here. No flying at all.

Most of our outfit is getting ready to move but a few crews, mine included, aren't doing anything and looks like we were going to stay awhile. However, we never know from one hour to the next what is going on.

I called Kay the other morning. Everything is going OK out there.

I sent her one of the crew pictures the same day I sent you one and I must have been a little confused or something because the papers I meant to send Dad were in her envelope. She will send them on to you.

I'm glad to be out of the South. ???? in Louisiana. I've seen all the South I want.

It's pretty dull just sitting around the Officers Club without a thing to do. Sure wish I could find out what is going to happen.

We haven't been able to go to town yet so haven't even had the diversion of looking over a new town.

Didn't get any chance to look over the towns we came through on the way up here. We came through Little Rock, St. Louis and Kansas City. Two nights and two and one half days, to make the trip. These troop trains really move slow. We had Pullmans though so the trip was in comfort.


How is everything at home? Did my foot locker arrive thru yet? The key is with the papers that Kay got, I guess.

In the rush of leaving I didn't have time to write but I asked Kay to.

I wish you could have been at Grand Island for the wedding. When I talked to Mother on the phone, I told her Kay and I might be married if I was there long enough but the connection was pretty bad and I wasn't sure she understood me. When I talked to Mother I expected to be leaving the next day, and before Kay arrived so wasn't planning very strongly on getting married and of course could make no plans, as it was, we really had to rush. As it turned out, our departure was delayed and so we had three days anyway.

I'm really glad we got married and I hope you get to meet Kay and her folks soon. You'll like them all, I know.

How has everything been this winter? I hope you had a nice Xmas and have a swell New Year.

I believe this year of '44 will bring many changes in this world conflict and all for the best.

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As you probably know, we flew over and had a nice trip all the way, except it got pretty cold at times.

England is pretty much ?? what we expected. A little colder and wetter than X expected but the winter he that way I guess. The farms are quite small and very green. Every field of surrounded by a stone hedge fence. The buildings mostly stone or brick. The whole country gives you the impression of being very old - as of course it is.

But there are a lot of things in the U.S. we regard as necessaties that are really luxuries over here. And the States don't know what rationing is like. You can really tell that England has been at war for a long time. Almost everyone you see, men and women are in some sort of uniform.

The people as a rule are very friendly and treat us swell.

Life here isn't so bad. The food is good and we get plenty. We had turkey for Christmas and New Years.

I can't tell you any thing about what we're doing but don't worry about me. I'm just fine and everything is going swell.

I left before the Xmas package got to Grand Is. but W of the other boys brought it over so I got it before Xmas. Thanks a lot for everything. Over here those things really go good.

We are rationed on x and cigarettes but 32 get enough cigarettes.

Miss something to read more than anything san't by any magazines of any kind. Do you think you will get to go to Calif. this winter? I hope so.

I'd better close for now, I'll write soon. Write as soon as you can because it takes mail quite awhile to get here. Be sure and use the address below.

I hope you had a pleasant trip from Cheyene home & am glad you had a nice time at Mary's. I certainly wish you could have stayed longer here, it seems you scarcely got here when you left again. I'm sorry that, you Dad & Dick, couldn't come but I can well imagine what would happen to the farm, on the other hand, I can imagine what happened when Mother was gone. Whats the matter with your cooking skill you two guys didn't even cook a spud, but maybe you cooked an egg or two but how I'll bet you were glad to have mother back & I'll bet she was glad to get home too. I thought we'd have to hog-tie her here.

Well we've had nothing but rain the past 5 days, today its pretty & clear, sunshining and all. So we took on the washing today. We had a terrible storm Sun, Mon, & Tues. & the Water & Power Co was on a strike & we had no lights for 2 nights going around with candles cooking dinner & all. But I'd rather be without lights & see those fella's get their raise They really have it coming, 15.00 a month. Its such a darn Political & corrupt outfit, I'm glad the Army took over, May be they'll straighten them out now, I hope so.

I had a letter from Merrill yesterday & he had finally gotten some mail it was written on the 6th, that day he had received the first mail So he should have plenty by now.

I haven't seen much of Wanda & Leonard the past few days. Incidentally he forgot to send the avocadoes so will send some others soon The rains been so bad & trees falling on high ways & Med? that I haven't been out very much to see the kids.

I'm not working at present, the place where I did work have been cut so on their production that they don't have enough business to warrant my services – so am on the hunt – I'm going to try to get something in Van Nuys so I won't have so far to drive. I'm feeling fine now & rare'n to get back on the job, can't stand this sitting around any more.

Well no more news from here, so write us soon & let us know all your news.

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Dear Dad -

Guess its time I wrote a few lines to let you know that everything is O.K. Got your v mail letter the other day and got Mothers letter day before yesterday. The one she wrote after she got home. I've been getting mail quite regularly for some time now. V mail doesn't seem to come as fast as air mail most of the time.

Everything here goes along the same. A little work to do over in a while. You've probably read about some of it. Will see if I can find a couple of clippings out of our paper, "The Stars & Stripes", to send along. You probably read the same thing back there but they may miss something.

Gosh, you folks have sure done we to get everything paid for in so short a time. Sure have down a swell job. Don't see how you did it. It's true that if things had been like that when we were home, it might have been different but in my case, after I got tangled up with flying, I don't know. I do know that I wish I had been in on the job you've done on the place and there were a great many times when I almost went back.

I'm glad Mother got to make the trip but sure wish you both could have gone.

Mother has probably told you all about the girls and things in Calif. so there isn't much I can add there.

Don't worry too much about the candy I asked for. We get a little each week but it's English candy and not R-l-s ?? and not nearly as good. As for papers, we don't read much except the "Stars & Stripes" but if you could get the Harlem News and send it over I'd like that. I know there is not much news in it but the local news is always interesting to me.

What do you hear about the boys from Harlem who are down in the S. Pacific? Got a letter from Edna and one from Mary too the other day. All mail is coming through pretty good. About 9 or ten days usually. Haven't gotten any packages yet but probably will soon. Kay has sent one too.

I thought the joke you wrote was pretty good. Not quite as good as your usual standard but still pretty good. I haven't heard any good ones but found a couple of rather doubtful ones in the paper and will send them along.

How's Dick doing? I'll bet I won't know him at all next time I see him. He must be pretty big now.

Clarence and Edna are doing pretty fair too from what Edna wrote. Sure glad to hear that everybody up there is doing so well.

We read quite a bit about the soldier vote over here but there doesn't seem to too much interest in it. Over here, all that seems petty small and far away to worry about until we finish this. The thing that really gets the boys going over here is the strikes back there. Most of them seem to be making good money and we need the stuff they're

making. Besides that they're in the good old U.S.A. If these boys over here were to get a hold of a bunch of strikers, hell would be to pay for sure.

That's one thing I sure have to admire about the English people. They've been at war a long time and some of them have taken plenty but you'll never see greater unity of people anywhere.

We had a U.S.O. show at the theatre tonite and after seeing some pretty bad ones over here we weren't sure we ought to go but finally did. And am really glad we did. It was, I think, the best show I've ever seen anywhere. I haven't laughed as hard or enjoyed a show so thoroughly in a long time. This show business sounds kind of silly sometimes but boy, these shows the U.S.O. puts on at the camps is a good morale booster. It's really good to see folks from home put on a how in good old American style and to hear some good American jokes. They told one about Hitler an Goering & Goebells driving down the road and they ran over a farmers dog. Hitler says to Goering "Herman, you go and apologize to the farmer while I wait outside". Hermann goes in and pretty soon he comes back loaded down with cheese, bread, wine and bee. Hitler couldn't under stand it and he says "Hermann what is this? I told you to apologize for killing the dog, not rob them". Goering says "I don't understand it. I went in and said "Heil Hitler. The dog is dead and they loaded me down with cheese, bread, wine & beer".

Well, that should be enough for tonite. Better get some sleep. Three may be work tomorrow. Write soon and I'll try to do the same.

You've probably given me up as one of the members of missing persons but no such luck I'm still around & ornery as ever. In your letter to Mother you said you hadn't heard from Merrill in 2 weeks – I guess he's been busy, but he's all right. The last letter I had from him I got in 6 days from the time he mailed it, so that isn't bad time – in comparison to 20 days on others. He still thinks our cities are better. I can't say that I blame him, although I haven't been there. I share your thoughts Mother He has sent me 2 clippings from the newspaper there. He said they were a bit about what was going on over there. Meaning I presume, they were raids he had gone on – The Schweinfurt raid on the 27th of Febr. & the Ball bearing factory raid on the 28th. He said he would send them from time to time, so now I know hes flying. When he got back from his trip to London he said there were 12 letters waiting for him 1 from you, 1 from Edna, 1 from Mary, I from my mother, 1 from my sister & 7 from me so he said he had a swell time catching up on home news.

Wanda & Leonard are fine still working hard. I don't see them much during the week but try to get down on the week end – I haven't gone to work yet, but have a number of things lined up. I went down to Civil Service board and got a Senior Steno Clerk rating for Gov't work, so now I'm waiting a placement here in the valley if its possible. In the mean time I'm working part time in a gas station I like it for a change Its good to be out of doors.

I hope you all are well & fine & Edna's too – Say hello to them for me. In Merrills last letter he said her oldest boy was 11 and he could hardly believe it.

We're all fine & have been enjoying some nice weather up to today its clouding up & may sprinkle before the days over.

I'm enclosing some pictures the ones we took that Sunday 2 of them didn't turn out but heres a set of the ones that did.

Well I haven't any more news so will finish up before mail man comes. Write when you have time I always lie to hear what doin', I'll write when I hear from Merrill again.

Something like that we can fix up over our store in the barracks in the evening. My mouth waters just thinking about popcorn.

Well, I better get to bed. Tomorrow may be the day our rest come to an end.

I got your letter some time ago and I guess I'm not so good at writing either, since it's taken me so long to answer.

Everything is going pretty good over here. At least I'm just as healthy and ornerus, as ever. We get plenty of work to do, which you probably read and hear about. It's not too bad, although I've prayed like a good Christian on several occasions. I've been intending to write for several days but when we get back we're so tired we first fall into bed.

We had a St. Patricks party Sunday nite at the officers club. We all got anywhere from slightly to stinking drunk. I was approaching the stinking stage. Got to be at 1:30 and they work us up at 3:30 for the hardest day yet. I was so tired last nite I could hardly walk.

I got a letter from Mother day before yesterday and she sent a clipping from a news paper talking of a crash at Palm dale which killed the son of Billy X Sunday. That didn't interest me much but the other pilot, also killed, was Geo Davy, the guy who taught me to fly. Sure was surprised to hear about it.

Wanda, I can't tell you how sorry I am about Harry. I never knew him but from what everybody says he must have been swell. I should liked to have met him and known him better. Guess may be these airplanes are dangerous and I'll be doubly careful.

I'm glad Mother got down to visit you. I knew she'd like the girls. I never worried about that. I sure would have like to have been there too. We could have had a hell of a time. Kay sent me some pictures while she was there. Mother looks well.

Mother told me Dick was making an ice shed ?? out of the old washing machine engine I've been trying to get him to write but he hasn't as yet. I've been away from home so long that I probably don't seem like a brother anymore.

How do you like the studio work? Wanda must be doing dam good now with this last raise. You kids should be able to save a little.

Got your letter the other day just before I went on pass so didn't get around to answering till now. Went to London again. Think I'll go somewhere else next time. I'm getting tired of looking at London. This is not much for writing paper but I ran out of the other and it's almost impossible to buy any. Here it is the middle of April already. I suppose you're starting spring work now. Spring has sort of come to England too. Lots warmer than it was but the weather hasn't improved any. Got a box of candy from Kay today and I've been sitting here eating it so fast, I'll probably get a good bellyache. I'm writing this without paragraphs so it may sound sort of jumbled. You mentioned liking Kay for not minding the idea of a farm. It's true, she doesn't. In fact she likes that sort of thing. I don't mind the idea myself but am not making any plans yet. We'll be up to see you first thing when I get back – I hope. Also got a letter from Helen Nelson Lee today. She wrote a swell letter and told me what she knew about all the kids around town. Boy, they're sure scattered out. I enjoyed reading the Local news from the Harlem paper, that Mother sent. I'll bet that Bunny McGuire has had a time down there fighting Japs.

Sure surprised me to hear Clarence Watkins got married. I can just hear the old

lady asking him if he did it to escape the draft. _ darn

It does sound like the farm was a dam good deal. Boy, sugar beets are really brining (sp) a price, aren't they? They are starting their spring work over here now too.

A lot of the farmers use horses, and darn good ones too. Great big fellows. But I've seen a lot of American tractors too. John Deere Gen. Pur. with rubber tires; Case Gen. Pur.

And several Cat "22"s and RD-4s and Allis Chalmers Crawlers. They really farm every square foot over here. And this land has been farmed for so long that they really have to use the fertilizer. I think solve good legume crops would help over here.

I got a swell letter from Uncle Art, telling me about life on the Alaskan Hiway. I'd sure like to be up there for a little hunting.

Well, I guess after tomorrow I'll be riding as a 1st Pilot instead of Co-pilot, and have a crew & ship of my own. Not much difference. A little more responsibility and a chance to change the 2nd Lt to 1st Lt.

I found a little clipping in the paper I thought was pretty good and am sending it along.

This is about all I can think of tonite. Hope to hear from you again soon.

I'm staying a what was once a beautiful hotel on the sea shore but is now a Red Cross (ub. It's beautiful here. It's a sleeply little city and seems so far removed from a war that I can hardly believe one is going on. I think in peacetime this was probably a resort town, and still is for us.

Last nite the had a dance and we really had fun. There are quite a few American Red Cross girls here beside the local English girls.

They have all sorts of sports here for us to play or we can just lie around and sleep. We get American newspapers too. A little late of course. We don't have to dress military as long as we're around the club. No ties, leather jackets, anything. It's really great.

I don't believe I really needed the rest but wouldn't turn down the chance when

they offered it too me.

I suppose you knew that the length of our tour here had been extended from 25 to 30 missions. I hope I get to come home for awhile when I finish – which shouldn't be very long now. The chances of getting home look pretty good.

Leo Brown, my old buddy in Cadets, has already finished and gone back. He

came over the same time I did.

I went over and visited Dick Carlson, the kid from Glendale, Calif., before coming up here and he's doing fine too. His Mother and Kay keep in touch with each other pretty much, I guess.

I won't get any mail while I'm here, so I'll probably have stacks of it to answer

when I get back.

That's about all I know today. We'll try and write again in a day or two.

I should be finishing up before long but can't be very sure that I'll get home for quite awhile yet. I'm sure hoping I do get back for awhile at least.

The weather has been a lot better lately. Even warm enough to be out without a jacket, which is a change. It rained last nite some but a pretty nice today, except for a little wind.

Spent a very lazy Sunday today. Except for a parade we had this afternoon, in honor of several fellows who received the DFC.

The other afternoon I flew co-pilot for one of the Colonels and we went up to Scotland. Gee, it sure was pretty. It's not flat like England. Has a lot of hills and valleys and lakes.

Kay writes that everything is going fine down there and she likes her job pretty well. She was telling about her Dad shearing the ship. I guess it must have been pretty good I'd like to have seen it.

By the time you get this you will probably have all the crops in. I hope you have another good year. I hope too that the new machine for blocking beets works out OK. Hence will save a lot of time and work.

Dear Mother, Dad & Dick

I know I haven't written you for such a long time, I'm ashamed I've been working rather long hours, as the older employees at the Post Office are taking vacation also, rather irregular hours, and I'm usually tire or just too lazy to write. I owe Mary a letter too, so tonight I think I'll catch up on some of my letter writing.

When I got your card, Mother, I hadn't heard from Merrill either – it was about 3 weeks before I heard I got a letter the some day your card came.

He's been on a 7 day rest leave – somewhere in England I suppose, quite aways away from any War activities. He said it was or rather used to be a tourist resort, & was very nice there. I suppose you've heard from him by now. I was almost crazy with worry – but I guess bad news travels fast.

Hes back again at his base, & the crew he was flying with are flying on their own, so now he has a crew made up of veterans, some, he says will finish before he will. There is some talk he says, of keeping them there after their 30 missions, but I hope not. I think they should let them come home, but I guess they know best I suppose they're keep them for the ??? Xmas or perhaps, they're all banned on traveling out of England.

I saw Wanda & Leonard the other nite, and their land-lords daughter is coming home, so the kids have to move. They haven't found a place yet – I imagine they'll have quite a time, as places are awfully scarce around here. That's about all the news from them I know right now.

We're all fine, eating, sleeping, and working as usual. We have two calves now – Both our heifers (sp) came fresh. So we have lots of good milk My garden is just beautiful We're having, onions, swiss chard, radishes, & beets out of it now. Something got on the spinach when it first started so I don't think it will be so good – Its coming along pretty good now – My potato? plants are starting to blossom already. Things sure do grow here. I suppose your garden is just starting about now. But your spring comes a little later there I guess.

How are Ednas – I hope they're all fine, give them my best – Let them read this, & won't have to write two letters.`

Merrill wrote he'd receive the Air Med .. & had 3 oak leaf clusters added to it, meaning he's been awarded for 20 missions so far. He said the D.F.C. (Distinguished Flying Cross) was given when they finished 25, and he should get it real soon. However they raised the minimum from 25 to 30. So 30 is now the top. He also got his 1st Lt. bar, so he's doing just fine. Except that if it wasn't for this War, he would probably be doing better. Gosh I wish it was over with. Its so terrible, and of course I can't leave the paper along. I have to read all the gruesome stuff.

Well we all send our love, & I guess I'll stop for now, will try to get around to writing sooner next time Hope you all are fine & well

Further information has been recieved indicating that L. Burton was a crew member of a B-17 bomber which departed from England on bombardment mission to Dessau, Germany, on May 30th. Full detaile s are not available, but the report indicates that during this mission our planes encountered enemy aircraft and in the ensuing battle your son's bomber sustained damage.Lt. Burton's Fortress was last seen as it left the formation about 11:09 a.m. in the vicinity of Magdeburg, Germany. The crew members of planes returning from this mission were unable to give futher information with reference to the disappearance of this aircraft.

Due to necessity for military security, it is regretted that the names of those who were in the plane and the names and addresses of their next of kin may not be furnished at the present time.

The great anxiety caused you by failure to receive more details concerning your son's disappearance is fully realized. Please by assured that any additional information received will be conveyed immediately To you by the Adjutant General or this headquarters.

Dear Mr. Burton:

This letter is to confirm my recent telegram in which you were regretfully informed that your son, First Lieutenant Merrill O. Burton, 0-690,042, Air Corps, has been reported missing in action over Germany since 30 May 1944.

I know that added distress is caused by failure to receive more information or details. Therefore, I wish to assure you that at any time additional information is received it will be transmitted to you without delay, and, if in the meantime not additional information is received, I will again communicate with you at the expiration of three months. Also, it is the policy of the Commanding General of the Army Air Forces upon receipt of the "Missing Air Crew Report" to convey to you any details that might be contained in that report.

The term "missing in action" is used only to indicate that the whereabouts or status of an individual is not immediately known. It is not intended to convey the impression that the case is closed. I wish to emphasize that every effort is exerted continuously to clear up the status of our personnel. Under was conditions this is a difficult task as you must readily realize. Experience has shown that many persons reported missing in action are subsequently reported as prisoners of war, but as this information is furnished by countries with which we are at war, the War Department is helpless to expedite such reports. However, in order to relieve financial worry, Congress has enacted legislation which continues in force the pay, allowances and allotments to dependents of personnel being carried in a missing status.

Permit me to extend to you my heartfelt sympathy during this period of uncertainty.

Have a nice visit with Mary – Tell her I'm sending something for the baby next week, but had to wait until ??????

I just wish it was me having one that's all. If you should decide to come down, be sure & wire me when you'll arrive so I can meet you.

I had so many nice letters from all my friends, I just don't know when I'll ever get around to answering them. Ive been working just 10 hours a day for almost 3 weeks now, & I like my work & it helps me a lot. I am answering the Chaplain's letter today too, & will also send a note to the Army Headquarters in answer to the letter you sent yesterday. I think its pretty fin that they send us as much news as they have, every little bit helps – The next news will be good I'm sure. I think Merrill is such a determine, & one with lots of stamina, that if a minute chance is given him he'll come through it O.K. As long as we haven't heard by this time I'm sure he's O.K. as for us OK goes in that place. I'll bet he's worried more about us here at home, than he is about himself – it's just like him you know.

We are all fine & keeping our heads & hopes high all praying silently (?) Dad was in France in the lat war for 2 years, & I believe he has been he most lifting to all of us, although suffered worse inside – He says his heart goes with every ship on a mission when he hears them tell of it on the radio and on D-Day was with every one of the boys landing on Normandy – I don't think Germany will last much longer. Do You

Mother, Lois, & Beverly all send their best love & prayers for you and I wish we could be together. I had a very nice letter from Edna & I'll answer it soon.

Wanda & Len are fine, working hard. Wanda is working 10 hrs a day 5 days a week up to 90c hr. now. She certainly deserved her raise. All the Aros (?) are fine too.

Weve been having some hot weather lately, & our apricots & plums are ripe, seems we're always picking something. I've dug up our potatoes & they're really nice. We sold both our cows, as hay was so high it wasn't worth it – also sold our pigs, now all we have is 2 calfs & 7 sheep. Its enough to take care of as dad works out every a then comes home & works & Grampa is getting too old to do what he used to. Well no more news from here, Keep you hope high I'm sure Merrill will be home for long.

Dearest Mother Dad & Dick -

I was so pleased to get your letter, some weeks ago now, but I've been so darn busy I haven't hardly had time to sit down and write a letter. Ive taken on another job part time – People are just screaming for help & can't seem to get anyone especially, the non-essential industries – Since they changed my hours at the Post office to 12:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. – I had all my mornings free, so I took a part time job in the Drug Store, on the corner right across from the post office – so I don't have to drive from one place to another. I work there from 8 in the morning til 12 noon – eat & then go to the P.O. & letters, I've just tried to get them written but never get sat down long enough. I work in the fountain part of the store. I never done any work like this before, & theres just enough diversion from each one, so that it really isn't such a long Day.

I had hoped by now we'd have had some news about our boy, but no soap. At this time tho, with conditions as they are in Europe, I hardly expect to get any word, until the thing is finished, Their Communications systems must be in terrible shape, after all the bombings & etc. I just feel so strongly inside that he's all right, that I just know it almost. Everyone seems to think the same, otherwise we would have heard by now Don't you think? I have to think about it, as I get so nervous, wondering & wondering so, consequently, my 2 jobs keep me from thinking too much, although, inveribly your mind runs along that train? I miss writing my letters to him, too, its funny. I used to race home from work & write a letter, or often write them at the P.O. & send them out on one particularly good dispatch to N.Y.

I hope all of you are all right & feeling well. Don't work too hard in the heat. It takes too much out of you, especially when your out in the sun. So take it easy. But I can well imagine all the work there is to do one a farm. Your work is never done – I may come up to Montana with Leonard & Wanda – although it depends on what we know by then I'm not promising, just thinking it over. I have an Aunt in Bozeman, (Dads sister) & she wants me to come visit them too. So I may come up that way, but time will give the answer. I owe Mary a letter too, I may get at that tomorrow, as I may get the afternoon off. (I'm working Sundays too) –

With Len working nights & Wanda, days, they hardly see each other.

Well I guess I said enough our family is all fine & send their best to you, all. Will try my best to write sooner next time. Even if you don't get my letters often, I think

about you every day, & wonder how you are, & wish we could be loser together. In the clipping you sent, it mentioned the Distinguished flying Cross. I guess he got that on the 25th mission – I didn't' know anything about that before. I wonder if they were right?

Dear Mother, Dad, Dick, Wanda & Leonard.

Well I imagine Leonard has arrived by now if every thing went OK for him. I had a good notion to pack up & come back up with him. I sure love it up there, & as a matter of fact you could probably use another truck skinner. I certainly had a very nice time while I was there, to prove my point, I had 3 extra pounds of excess baggage, when I got home Must have been all those wonderful rolls, cakes, potatoes & yum-yum - I'm getting hungry thinking about it.

Sunday

I had to stop writing this, & finally today am getting around to finishing it. I tried to dye a light green sweater this morning, black, but it turned sort of gray – a real pretty color but, I think I'll dip it in some more black later.

Everyone here at home was fine when I got here, crazy as ever – I stopped in to see your Dad, Wanda, on my way home from Work & they're all O.K. & missing you I'm going down today & see what you had to say in your letter that I saw at the P.O. O'l Noisy me. I see ever thing.

I copied the letter from the War Dept, so am sending back the original. I'll send one other back when I copy it, the one telling about where he went & etc. The Redman Lodge, that Merrill belonged to, are holding a Memorial Servise in about 2 weeks in the Presbyterian Church in Van Nuys – Mr. Farrell, who's son & Merrill were such very good friends is making all the arrangements – Merrill used to spend the night at their place quite a lot. I think there is still plenty of time for those things – I'd like to have a little more information, & right now I don't think will be able to get much until things are quieter in Germany – and the letter in the second paragraph states that the report from Germany contained only the fact that he died on May 30th. Now I've given the letter (copy) to the Red Cross & may be they'll be able to get more information inside Germany, but it will take time.

Dick, right now Dad doesn't have any film in at the Drug Store but will probably get your number on the next shipment, I haven't yet had time to get down to Hollywood to one of those Jakes & Trick (?) Stores to see about "Whig-Bougs" but will try to get down some time soon & see if they still have them. Did the Radio tube that Len brought with him work, if not I'll keep trying. When I was in Bozeman, I left your name with a Radio Shop there, & when their shipment comes in, they said they'd send it to you at Harlem.

There's a boy around the corner from us, who was missing for several months, later reported killed – his wife made all the settlement with the Gov't. All of his crew were prisoners of War & never had any word about him for months - & he walked in the day before I got home. So I'll still cling to one small hope, that there may be a chance, &

it may be a mistake – Oh God, how I hope & pray so. I don't think life is worth living – it seems so cruel & cold. I seem to have lost all emotions, & am getting so hard & cold I don't think all of this would have happened if Wilson wasn't so strongly apposed & beat down by the isolutionists in the last war. I can't believe God intended things to be this way. I think its all Man Made, greed, cruelty, & hatred.

I hope Dick hasn't killed or seared the cows to death by now & that your getting enough milk. One of our neighbors, just bought 2 tons of oat hay for his horses - \$37.00 per ton – How about that Dad?

I had a nice time in Bozeman I went to two Auctions. Herefords - & Short Horns - But I still think the Angus - are the best. I'm just a little predjudiced - I would certainly loved to come back up with Leonard, but Xmas & the P.O. I thought I'd better stay, they'll need all the experienced hands they can get. Is old Sam Hardy still with you - eating, talking, & doing as little as possible? Ho! Give him my regards & a kick in the rear for me - Remind me to Mrs. De Weese- Saddler, & etc. I'm sorry we didn't get over to see Gramma Watkins, she must be a wonderful person for her age.

Say Leonard I never did get an introduction of formality to the Great Bum Henry Brekke – alias Henrah! Nor a peek at him – Wanda you'll have to get a look at him & tell me when you get back. I'd sure like to go on that hunt. This country hasn't anything any more – Just climate & the ocean, the rest is just (Bush wah!) – They really don't know what living is. They're all so wrapped up in the city ways – I just don't like them any more. Are there any more homesteads up there? I think I'll come back with a weather proof tent & homestead, or get a job as a sheep herder – How does that sound.

I sure hated to leave - now I wish I was back. You, all really made me feel better, & were so nice. Thanks loads for a wonderful time.

Well I guess I've said enough for this time. None of it makes much sense, but I don't know what I'm doing half the time, anyway.

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Wanda, give everyone a big hug & kiss for me, especially Dick – I can just see him Blush, but I love it, too.

Dear Mrs. Burton:

How much nicer it would be to sit and talk with you about your son Merrill. He was a grand fellow, and I rate him as one of my finest friends in the army. It is men, such as he was, who made life great, made it worth living, and who represented the best of American manhood.

Merrill was always a gentleman on the base. I was proud of him, and knew that he must have come from a good home. You were right in saying that he was always a good boy.

I am glad Merrill's wife came to see you, and that you read the letter I wrote to her.

I know of no further news. If there is any, it will come from the government, through the International Red Cross. His personal things will be sent home at the proper time, I am not sure when.

It is hard for me to believe that these fellows, who were once with me – my buddies – are now gone. I saw them go away in the morning, I watched their planes go off into the air. All were so strong and well and happy. It seems that they are just gone for the day, and will fly back to me. I sit waiting for the planes. When one or several do not return, it seems untrue, and I cannot help feel that they are just away for a flight.

When word comes form the States – from the families – it is the first news I receive that a fellow will not come back. It is then I realize the horror of it all. Then, and then only, do I realize what these boys did for me. I feel terribly guilty – guilty that I sat here, and they went out for me.

I have gone on a mission over Germany with the men, against all rules and regulations (an got bawled out for it from Higher Headquarters), because I wanted to be with the men. I know of no other Chaplain in our Division, or over here, who has gone on a Bomber in a Mission.

But that was only once. I still feel guilty when I sit here, and see the men go out. Thanks for telling me about the farm. We'll be so glad to get home. Let us all keep our courage high.

My Dear Mrs Burton

I received your nice letter. Thank you for writing. My heart aches for you for I know just how you feel. If we could only see why our fine boys have to die like this. I know God is good and that He knows the answer to all this, but that dont ease the hurt in the ease the hurt in the heart of each of us. I can hardly believe that it is true that Ralph wont be coming home. I had Prayed so hard that he would be safe and never thought anything else than that he would be home some time in June or July. You see I had talked to one of his buddies who had just come home in May and this boy said Ralph was almost through with his missions.

I got exactly the same messages that you did. I got my telegram on June 13 and then had a letter on June 19. Then on Sept 17 I had the telegram that he had died on May 30.

I have heard from all of the boys' families now and there were 4 killed and 5 are Prisoners. The ones who are Prisoners had their ?? of that back in from 10 to 14 or 15 days. I wonder why it took so long for us to learn about our? There is so much I cant understand.

Ralph was just 22. So young, he hadnt started to live yet. He wasnt married. I am glad for that, as there might have been a child left fatherless. He was a dear thoughtful boy. He was my second son. I have two others in Service. Norman, the oldest is in the Medical Detachment at Fort Ard, Calif. He most likely wont be sent away as he has asthma quite badly. He has been in for 3 years, is 24. Richard the youngest is 20 and also a gunner on a bomber. He will be shipped out this month I guess. How I hate to have him go. I have two small sons, half brothers of these other boys. They are 6 and 4. I am glad they are not older. I have never had any girls.

I am 43, and just a housewife. My husband owns and operates a Coal mine here. We own our home here in Durango and like it very much here. I have lived here Practically all my life. I was born in Durango. My Parents and my first husband (father of those three boys) are all buried here. So this is ??? ???? days. We have an ideal climate. Not too hot in summer and not too cold in the winter. It gets rather cold alright but never unbarable. And we do have the most beautiful scenery around here.

I would like to hear from you from time to time if you care to write. Sincerely yours

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Dear Mother, Dad, Dick, Wanda & Len.,

Excuse the typewriter, I don't like to get typewritten letters myself but I thought I could write more faster this way. Even at that, this old typewriter isn't very good.

I called Mrs Berry, but she didn't have a telephone, so I wrote her a card an asked her to call me collect from Compton. Her husband, Alvin Berry was the Bombardier-Navigator on the ship. There were only nine on the ship. They have reduced the number to nine so as to utilize all the men, or else there was a shortage of one or the other. She told me that her husband had written her about that. She also had this very startling news.

Her husband is a prisoner of war and of course she can't get any information from him but – she had a letter from him a few days before he went down saying that he was going to be transferred to another crew on their next flight, and that was undoubtedly to Merrill's ship. The crew that he had been flying with were on that flight of the 30th of May, and saw the whole thing. This crew is now back here in the states and have written to Mrs. Berry and she told me what happened.

Merrill was the leader, (Flight Squadron Leader) and a Ltd. Monnahan in another ship was second in command. They were approaching the target, with a full load of bombs, they had not yet dumped them. Then a squadron of enemy aircraft (fighters) came into sight. Of course they always try to pick on the leader, so as to disintegrate the formation, thus when they're separated from one another they're not so well protected. They started making passes at Merrills ship first, he said "about twenty passes were made at him in 10 minutes", Merrill radioed to Monnahan and told him to take over, and Monnahan said back, "I'm sorry sir, but my ship is also damaged, and am pulling out now," so Merrill told the third in command, (that was the fellow who wrote this letter) to take over, and Merrill left the formation. He said his engines were on fire, but the ship wasn't burning badly. Merrilll went in one direction and Monnahan in another, evidently Monnahan's ship wasn't burning, as the fighters really picked on him after he left the formation, but they didn't bother Merrills ship. It glided off, and parachutes started coming out, and he said for the life of him he couldn't say how many chutes came out, as he was busy, fighting off the enemy. Then he said the ship sort of flipped over and went into a tail spin.

Now even if the ship went into a tail spin, there is still a hatch over the pilots heads, over the cockpit where they can bail out, and they could very easily have gotten out even then.

Now here's what puzzles me. How do they know that Merrill was killed, that day. If he went down in that ship, there wouldn't be anything big enough to tell it was him If he didn't go down in the ship, he's still alive in Germany, I'll wager ten to one. Here's another thing. Mrs. Berry was notified in ten days that her husband was a prisoner, on the 24th of June, Sgt Hittel's folks heard in three weeks, Lets say within a month all of the boys who were prisoners were captured. If they reported Merrill as going down in the ship, and being killed on that day, why did it take four months for us to hear. The whole thing doesn't tie up to suit me. Either one of two things happened, either he went down in the ship, or he's being hid out, and we'll never know until those boys come back from Germany, whether or not he got out of the ship. Until then, I'm going to keep on believing in God, and Merrill, and that someday he'll come back. Merrill isn't the kind to take unnecessary chances and has the will, of do or else. If he was capable of radioing to the other ships, he evidently wasn't hurt then, and if the fighters didn't pick on him after he left the formation, I can't see any reason right now why he couldn't have gotten out of there, but as I say we'll have to wait until this DAMN was is over, to find out definitely.

I'm going down to see Mrs. Berry as soon as I can get enough gas together I'm kind of short right now, I didn't apply for my A Book, and when I did they took some of the tickets out. So that's the way it goes.

I'm sending Mary a carbon copy of this letter, this way it will eliminate writing it twice. I have written her another letter, and will enclose this one in with it. I'm also making her copies of the letters we had from the War Dept, and etc., as I thought perhaps she would enjoy having and reading them. This typewriter is old and sticky, but its saving a lot of work, I don't think I'd be able to get all these letters written if it weren't for this.

Everything is pretty much the same here, working every day, I'm still on the late shift, and I don't like it very well, so I've decided to take a short carrying route in town in the morning, and then work inside in the afternoon, and try to get away from that night work all the time. I think it will be sort of fun carrying mail, just a short route wouldn't be bad; and I've got a good pair of walking shoes, and that's the main thing.

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I stop in to see your Dad, Wanda, and he's pretty lonesome, but I sit and chew the rag with him, and we win the war, election, and run the capitalists into the ground. The trouble is we agree too often, and there isn't much of the good old arguing. The more I hear and read about both sides of the election problem, sometimes I wish I didn't have to vote for either one. What I'm most concerned about is winning the war, and I think it's a crime, the way people aren't putting there all into it because of this election talk. Secondly, is a lasting peace, and I have enough faith in God, to know that this world can get along with one another, it wasn't meant to be a continual caos, and destructive world.

No one can tell me any different. Its been proven that American cannot live by herself, and policy of isolationism must be done away with.

Well I guess that's enough for now, and lets pray that we will get this War over with, and find out more about our dear Merrill.

We all send out love and best regards, I hope you've finished with the beets by now, and everything is hunkedindleing. I suppose all the men are cleaning their guns, buying grub, and getting out their heavy clothes for the hunt. I sure wish I could go with them. Maybe I could hit the broad side of the mountain with this hair-trigger 22 and then again maybe I couldn't.

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Dear Mrs Burton.

We received your letter also your daughter's letter and wish to thank you both. We wrote England for the next of kin and we waited a long time before receiving them but just as soon as we did we put in phone calls to quiet a few as we were so anxious to hear the news about the other boys. And so far we received five are prisoners of war and four reported killed. As you said in your letter it is hard to believe. Yes it is it happens so far away and the way it happens is what is so hard. But if the boys were killed I know God was with them. So many things happens in war one never knows and when a report comes from Germany I know it isn't always true. As we have friend out quite a few boys have been reported missing and later reported killed and later found to be alive. So we will pray our boys are safe and alive. The Red Cross in San Diego said they had quiet a few boys who had been missing and reported killed and found to be alive there are quiet a few in San Diego where the reports haven't been true. Mr Bredeson is a contractor and is kept very busy so much building going on. We have lived in Calif four years we moved here from Minnesota. San Diego is a very nice City but a very busy City now during war. We have a married son living in Dallas Texas so far he isn't in service and three children at home. The girl is 17 yrs. The boy 15 yrs and a little boy 2 1/2 yrs old. David was our oldest boy and a very nice bright boy he was going to be married soon as he came home. He never said how many missions he had made not so many I don't think as he hadn't been across much over a month. Mabe the boys who are reported killed got away and are trying to get back and the German Government reportes them killed. You can't tell what the Germans report. It seems that if the boys were killed May 30th we should of got the message before 3 Months. As the prisoners were reported before. So many people have told us we should of heard before. I know a couple people here in San Diego who belong to our church got the messages in 4 to 6 weeks. They were killed in Germany. We won't give up hope. Mr Bredesons sister sent us a clipping last week of a boy who was reported missing then killed and found to be a prisoner of war in Germany. I'm inclosing one clipping my brother sent me of the same boy. Mr Bredeson's sister knows the people they live in Lisbon N. Dak. I'm inclosing a clipping of our dear boy. May God be with us and our boys and bring them home to us. Would like to hear from you again.

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Dear Mrs Burton -

I got home sometime ago to my wife and children and so of course we've been pretty happy now that it's all over. For you however I know that the end of the war in Europe did not mean the end of grief. Though I know that my grief could not match yours as you're his mother, I'll never forget Merrill and the other three. By this time I imagine you're fairly certain that Merrill will not come back. I delayed writing just in case there might be a chance because one can never be sure. But I regret to say that I was fairly sure of the fact that four members were killed one of which was your boy. I imagine you want to know what took place and where it took place. I hope this letter won't open a partially healed wound, and if it does I am very sorry.

It happened about fifty miles South West of Berlin not far from a town by the name of Dessau. It was about 11:10, English time May the thirtieth. We were hit by ME109s. There were five of them in the first attack I believe. Our left wing caught a 20MM and fired up Merrill took the ship out of formation. When he saw it was pretty serious he gave the order to bale out and tried to hold the ship level while the crew got out. Three of them baled out O.K. and then the left wing disintegrated and we fell into a spin with no hope recover. There were six of us that remained until the other wing and part of the ship disintegrated. Myself and the bombardier were thrown out and it's a shame that the rest couldn't have been thrown clear but to my knowledge they were not. I beleive they were still in when the ship crashed. I never got close to the wreckage when I hit the ground but the germans told us there we four bodies in the plane (whether they knew or not I'm not sure) and I am fairly sure that there were. In the event that he was killed he is without a doubt buried in a churchyard and in the Dessau Area. Merrill performed his duty wonderfully up to the very last and I have, and I know the other four who lived through it have a great deal of respect for your boy. Whether that is very comforting or not I don't know. Though I did not know Merrill very long I do know he was one of the finest fellows I've ever met but I'm sure you know that. I would appreciate an answer and will gladly answer any questions you might have if I can.

Have you received your sons personal things and have you received his identification tags. We received our sons things about 2 months ago but not his tags. This was is sure a sad story so many nice boys won't be coming home. But hope it will all end soon. Our summer weather is very chilly. And we have had rain. Which we hardly ever have in the summer. Rains starts out here in Jan. Well its getting late so will close. Hoping your family is well.

If you are the next of kin according to the line of kinship as set forth in the enclosed pamphlet, "Disposition of World War II Armed Forces Dead," you are invited to express your wishes as to the disposition of the remains of the deceased by completing Part I of the enclosed form "Request for Disposition of Remains." Should you desire to relinquish your rights to the next in line of kinship, please complete Part II of the enclosed form. If you are not the next of kin, please complete Part III of the enclosed form.

If you should elect Option 2, it is advised that no funeral arrangements or other personal arrangements be made until you are further notified by this office.

Will you please complete the enclose form, "Request for Disposition of Remains" and mail in the enclosed self-addressed envelope, which requires no postage, within 30 days after its receipt by you? Its prompt return will avoid unnecessary delays.

Dear Mrs Burton

We received your nice letter and I hope you will excuse us for our writing so late, but all the time I was very busy because of Ellie's first Holy Communion. We had to tidy up all the rooms and then there was that terrible accident. The child of the sister of my husband – they are living on the ground – floor – was playing at our neighbours' and at a given moment she dulled a kettle with fat in it over her body. From her belly till her feet she was all burned. We took her at once to the hospital, where she was under medical treatment for 6 weeks, but now she is at home again and she has practically recovered now. During that time I had the baby of my sister-in-law with me when she went to the hospital, but that's all over now.

Mrs Burton we also received the package from your Womenclub. Our cordial thanks to you and all the ladies! We really enjoyed the delicious coffee and candy. I have much???????????????????? the photo is yours,?? It was dark and rainy weather. There were not so many people as usually. The radio told last night that there were a bout 4000. I think it was because of the gloomy weather. The cemetery is closed now till February 1949. A wall will be build around and the cemetery gets the form of a star. Many soldiers are exhumed and will be transported to America. Newspapers say about 65%. There are the other militaire cemetery's in Holland, but they will disappear and the dead will be buried here at Margraten. It will be strange to us now we are no longer allowed to go to the grave, but we are sure that the cemetery will look fine when it is ready. Now the cemetery is closed we should like to ask your permission to have some masses read for the repose of your son's soul.

Enclosed I send you a photo we made at Easter and a photo of Elly on the day of her first Holy Communion and a photo of our boy n his car.

Well, Mrs. Burton, that's all the news for the moment. I am going to close my letter, for I have to go to town. The weather is a bit better now. It has been raining all the time these days. Once more I thank you for all you did for us. Please give our kindest regards to your children and all the ladies of your club. I am sorry that I can't thank them myself, but I am sure you will be so kind to do so.
