Dear Mr. Chavez:

This letter is to confirm my recent telegram in which you were regretfully informed that your son, Technical Sergeant Hector A. Chavez, 39,287,690, Air Corps, has been reported missing in action over Germany since 12 September 1944.

I know that added distress is caused by failure to receive more information or details. Therefore, I wish to assure you that at any time additional information is received it will be transmitted to you without delay, and, if in the meantime no additional information is received, I will again communicate with you at the expiration of three months. Also, it is the policy of the Commanding General of the Army Air Forces upon receipt of the "Missing Air Crew Report" to convey to you any details that might be contained in that report.

The term "missing in action" is used only to indicate that the whereabouts or status of an individual is not immediately known. It is not intended to convey the impression that the case is closed. I wish to emphasize that every effort is exerted continuously to clear up the status of our personnel. Under war conditions this is a difficult task as you must readily realize. Experience has shown that many persons reported missing in action are subsequently reported as prisoners of war, but as this information is furnished by countries with which we are at war, the War Department is helpless to expedite such reports. However, in order to relieve financial worry, Congress has enacted legislation which continues in force the pay, allowances and allotments to dependents of personnel being carried in a missing status.

Permit me to extend to you my heartfelt sympathy during this period of uncertainty.

Dear Mr. Chavez:

I am writing you with reference to your son, Technical Sergeant Hector A. Chavez, who was reported by The Adjutant General as missing in action over Germany since September 12th.

Further information has been received indicating that Sergeant Chavez was a crew member of a B-17 (Flying Fortress) bomber which departed from England on a bombardment mission to Ruhland, Germany, on September 12th. Full details are not available, but the report indicates that during this mission at about 11:30 a.m., near Berlin, Germany, our planes were subjected to enemy antiaircraft fire, and your son's bomber sustained damage, and fell to the earth. The report further indicates that three parachutes were observed to leave the disabled craft before it descended. The crew members of accompanying planes were unable to obtain any further details relative to the loss of Sergeant Chavez's aircraft, therefore the above constitutes all the information presently available.

Due to necessity for military security, it is regretted that the names of those who were in the plane and the names and addresses of their next of kin may not be furnished at the present time.

Please be assured that a continuing search by land, sea, and air is being made to discover the whereabouts of our missing personnel. As our armies advance over enemy occupied territory, special troops are assigned to this task, and all agencies of the government in every country are constantly sending in details which aid us in bringing additional information to you.
