Dear Russ,

Sorry to have taken so long in answering your letter but there were several places I wanted to search for any material which might be of help. I'm afraid I didn't come up with a whole lot, because my copies of the orders you refer to were not returned from England with my personal effects after I was shot down.

Besides the form you sent me, I am enclosing what I dug up. The picture is of the crew I trained with in the Bowman Provisional Group in June, July and August of 1943. It was taken in Pendleton, Ore. in July 1943. This is the crew I was assigned to the 306th with in Sept. 1943 so all were members of the group.

LT. SCOTT R. BODDY, 25, died Dec. 6 of injuries suffered in an air crash near Nellis AFB, Nev. A graduate of Georgia Tech, he had been in the Air Force about three years. Surviving are his wife, Lynn, a son, Ryan Scott, his parents, a sister, Karen, and a grandfather. After cremation, the ashes were to be strewn over the Grand Canyon in Arizona. BRETT JAMES BRALY, 19, son of Col. and Mrs. Harold G. Braly of Offutt AFB, Neb., died Nov. 19 in Bellevue, Neb. Surviving besides his parents are a twin brother, Scott, and three grand-parents.

CAPT. RICHARD S. KEPNER, 30, died Dec. 6 of injuries suffered in an air crash near Nellis AFB, Nev. He had served at Moody AFB, Ga., George AFB, Calif., and in Iceland. Surviving are his wife, Peggy, a son, Jason, his parents, Lt. Col. (USAF, Ret.) and Mrs. Richard D., two sisters, Jane Sparks and Anne, and a grandmother. Burial with military honors was in Arlington National

COL. MAURICE R. LEMON (USAF, Ret.), 64, died Dec. 31 in Falls Church, Va. A 1938 graduate of West Point, he attended the Air War College and the National War College. At one point he was senior assistant to the Joint Chiefs of Staff and at another chief of staff of the 17th AF in Libya. From 1959 to 1962 he was vice comamander of Ramstein AB, Germany. He was commander of Hq. Command, Bolling AFB, Washington, D.C., when he retired in 1967. Surviving are his wife, Elinor, three daughters, Jeannette Olson, Marilyn Simak and Linda Rasmussen, a son, Maurice R. Jr., his mother and five grandchildren.

COL. CRAIG POWELL (USAF, Ret.), 54, died Dec. 21 in Guatemala City, Guatemala, where he had made his home since June. A B-17 commander in World War II, he was shot down and spent two years in a German prison camp. After the war he attended the University of Texas,

was recalled to duty and became a member of a jet fighter squadron in Europe. A veteran of the Berlin Airlift, he retired in 1965. He was a former editor of Armed Porces Management magazine and was associated with several national magazines. He also worked on a number of national network radio and Ty projects, Surviving is his wife; Ruth, of Quatemala City.

LT. COL. CLARENCE G. TIETZ (USAF, Ret.), 64, died Dec. 27 in Naples, Fla. Surviving are his wife, Edith, a sister, Louise Zimmerman, and two nfeces.
