Better late than never in responding to your 21 December Letter. Procrastination coupled with too many extra curricula activities.

First, I recently received a letter from Mrs. Marie Fond that her husband Emmette Fond died on 8 December 1991. He had been living in Siloam Springs, Arkansas where he had been diagnosed as having a brain tumor and lung cancer. He survived the surgery to remove the tumor, but his constitution was insufficient to carry him through the operation and radiation treatments for the lung cancer. Emmette, Milton Prue Blanchette and I were the original officer crew members on Raymond Check's crew and until last summer we had not seen or heard from one another since 1943. During my trip to the east coast I made contact with both of them and had a marvelous time reminiscing about the "old days". I am so glad to have had the chance to visit with Emmette before he passed on. Hopefully Blanchette is OK; haven't heard from him for several weeks.

You asked me if I flew on the 17 April 43 mission. Honestly I can't nemember for sure. I flew several times to Bremen, Wilhelmshaven and Kiel but I couldn't lock in on the dates. The material (mission reports) that you sent have helped refresh my memory. But, there was one trip over that northern route that I haven't been able to fit into your coverages of the 306th missions in your book. I thought my hazandous ondeal occurred on the mission to Bremen when Maxwell Judas was shot down, but your story of that raid doesn't clear it Here is a short description of what occurred: During the bomb up. Here is a short description of what occurred: During the domo nun we experienced head on fighter attacks by the largest group of fighters gathered for a shoot-out. It was the first time that fighter attacks had broken up one of our B-17 formations. We successfully dropped our bombs on the target, but shortly thereafter the formation broke up into small groups of 3 or 6 in a formation. I started as one of three on our outbound heading toward the North Sea. We were under steady head on attacks by Fw's and ME109's and they were successful in inflicting serious damage to our three airplanes. Each aircraft went through evasive action and then rejoined into a three ship formation. Unlarturately the Germans were successful in downing two of us and Unfortunately the Germans were successful in downing two of us and knocking out two of my engines, radios, and the flight instruments and other fuselage and wing damage. I flew a mag course heading over the North Sea toward England over an overcast. On the Navigators best timing prediction for reaching the English coast I initiated best timing prediction for reaching the Crylish coast I initiated a "by-the-seat-of-your-parts let down through the clouds. Visibility was very poor, but we did cross the coast line in line with Norwich (we found out later). I was looking for any kind of a runway I could land on, ASAP. The radios were inop and we could not hear the barrage balloon squeaks and eventually snagged one of the balloon cables shearing off about a foot of a wing tip. We located an aerodrome somewhere rear Norwich. To my knowledge that B-17 never flew again. Our crew was transported eventually to Thurleigh aboard a B-24. (The B-24 was equipped with a G-box which I was told was very Top-Secret and was equipped with a G-box which I was told was very Top-Secret and I wouldn't be allowed to enter the Navigator's position.)---That is the story I'm searching for. Maybe it was 17 April 43?

Thanks for your efforts. See you in England in August.


