First, I want to tell you what an honor it is to have you a part of this group. Your name is mentioned so many times in our vast research for our Uncle. You are well respected out there in cyberspace - world wide.

My Uncle, S/Sqt Wayne F. Laubert

306thBG/368thBS

Staioned at Thurleigh from June/July 1944 until crash - December 15, 1944.

Our story:

Just a few years ago, my brother did a generic inquiry with everyone directing us to you. You were so helpful to my brother, even sending us page 295 from your book mentioning our Uncle's crash.; since there weren't any copies of the book to buy.

We held on to it like it was gold.

This opened up my mother/Aunts with their stories, personal accounts.

My brother hit zero in finding more - and he stopped.

Last year, my brother had a traumatic brain injury - In July, 2001 - wasn't expected to live; miracles do happen; surgery - and he's back to work!

My gift to celebrate his life was to embark on the journey with him in continuing research on our Uncle Wayne.

Now using internet to search more.

The info out there was fantastic in how to get records, as well as info about time/place in the war.

We made a tribute book for our Uncle, with general info from the 306th BG, 368thBS, Thurleigh airfield website,

Cambridge Cemetery website (this is where some of his crew is buried,) maps of England, stories from web sites/forums about this time in the war, even found the Pilots and Co-pilots family - contacted them - and are exchanging info!

Mr. Preller's site has been helpful, Mr. Berry with his patience in answereing so many of my questions.

We obtained the accident report from Mr. Fuller - no photos. B-17 websites, and Don Rapp's site was also good resource -

but is on/off available to pull up.

We took pictures of his grave in Vienna, MO, and a pic of the memorial at the courthouse in Vienna, Missouri of the men of Maries county, who died in WWII.- that has his name on it. Just this past 4th of July, my aunt shared with us his purple heart, last letter, obit, etc.

You were going to check to see what other missions he may have flown on to send me other 2 days to decide what mission reports to send me along with that date.

Please Let me know if you didn't get my last e-mail - it was a personal story about us and a big thank you to you!

- 2. page 146 Name should be Charles A. Crooks (with a S) not Crook
- 3. page 160 what does #633 mean??
 also could you tell me what letter is behind Tail
 number given? I couldn't read it.
 What does the letter mean?
- 4. If it doesn't give the name of the plane does that mean it didn't have a name, or you just don't have the info? were some planes not named??
- 5. unfortunately, in this diary book, it doesn't even have an entry for December 15, 1944 the day my Uncle was returning from a mission from ?Kassel #750? and crashed near greenham common.

Also, it doesn't even mention that that was the day Glenn Miller's plane disappeared

- 6. Why was his crew not mentioned in the following month (Jan) or at any time as receiving medals??
- 7. How do I find the specific info of the 31 missions he flew on if he was not mentioned anywhere in this diary, except that he joined the squadron in July, 1944.??

Where would that info be?

Most of the crew he crashed with did not join the unit until Oct. 1944, so I know he flew with other crews, etc. before that time.

SUBJECT: Intelligence Nurrative

Mission: KASSEL

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H)

1. Narrative The 306th flew 33 A/C plus 3 PPF as 40 "C". Route: Clacton, 1015; enemy coast at 5239H - C437E, 1058; Over Continent about 10 miles left of course to IP at 5133N - 0830E, 1200 hours; target Kassel, 1210g; on course on way out to Ostend, 1407; Claston, 1015; Base, 1602.

PFF equipment on two PFF A/C which landed here functioned satisfactorily.

Buckeye gave periodic reports on weather from Dutch coast over target, saying clouds 21 to 30,000 feet, dense persistent contrails, and that bombing would

be PPP.

- 2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support There was no opposition from enemy fighters. Fighter support was continuous, first appearing before Dutch coast.
- 3. A.A. Gun Fire There was no flak at the target. A few bursts appeared at Ijmuiden, just before crossing the Dutch coast on way in.
- 4. Bombing
 This Group bombed Kassel using PFF technique through 10/10ths cloud at 1210 hours. Pictures show no ground detail.
 - 5. Nickels A/C 611-G dropped ten T240 on Kassel.

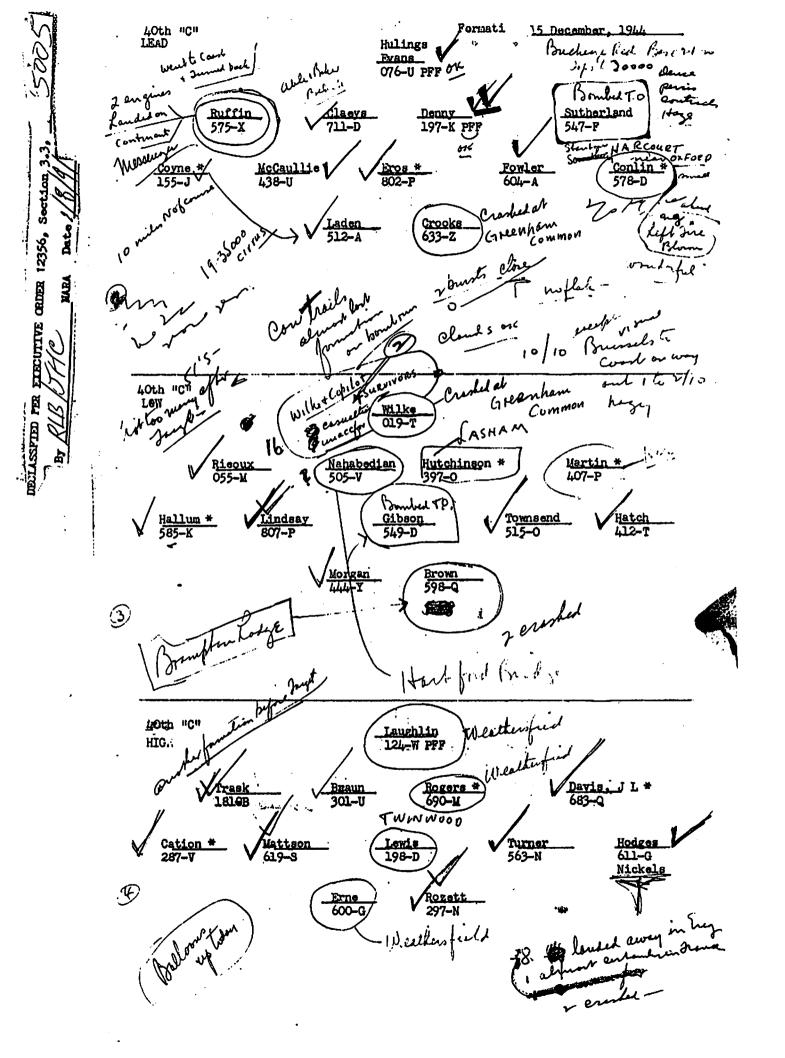
- Cloud cover was 9/10ths over Continent with tops at 18,000 feet, to about 0620E; from there to target 10/10ths, with heavy hase building up to 30,000 feet and dense persistent contrails above 22,000 feet. On way out, cloud was gradually breaking up near Brussels to 1-2/10ths.
- A/C Returning Early A/C 547-F, pilot Sutherland, turned back at 5234N - 0700E, 1121 hours due to engine failure; this A/C bombed target of opportunity at 5234N - 0100E. A/C 549-D, pilot Gibson, turned back at 5245N - 0615E, 1122 hours, bombed target of opportunity at 5247N - 0607E.

A/C in Distress Our A/C 019-T, pilot Wilke, and our A/C 633-Z, pilot Crooks, collided in mid-air in thick cloud or huze over Greenham Common. There were two survivors.

8. Observations Crews observed a contrail ascending vertically from Amsterdam area at A balloon at Cardington, flying at 800 feet, constituted a distinct navigational hazard on return from mission.

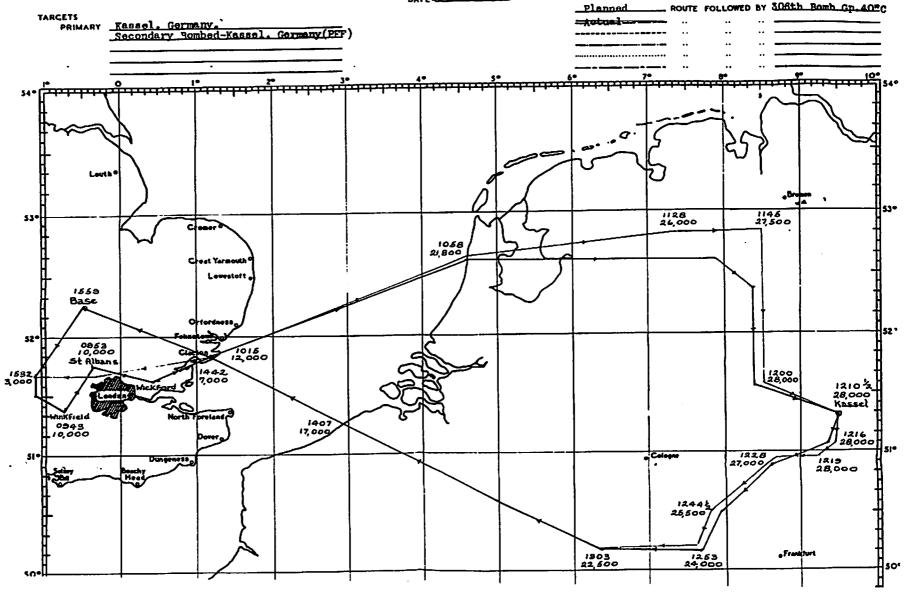
A/C Landing Away 8 A/C landed at other fields in England. One is outstanding, believed to have landed at A-70 "Messenger" in France.
