Dear Russ,

Please forgive me for taking so long to answer you. Your call and information opened up many memories.

I joined 306th at Wendover Field and was with 306th to the end of the war. When we went to Thurleigh, England, I was assigned to Glen Tompkins crew. After he flew a few missions he installed a 30 caliber machine gun in the nose of our B-17. I think the nose turret evolved from that installation. I was assigned assistant squad inspector under Francis McGarvey. Later I was assigned to a group inspection team. (One man from each squadron under command of a captain constituted this team.) When Francis McGarvey returned to the U.S.A., I went back to being squad inspector and that was my assignment until the end of the war.

In January (?) 1949 I became a permanent caretaker of 2,L-16 planes of the air wing of the 28th Division of the Pennsylvania National Guard. During our summer encampment in September 1950 the 28th was called into action proceeding to Camp Atterbury, Indiana. I was assigned to DIVARDY Division Artillery Headquarters. I was in charge of 3, L-16s and 4 other artillery sections planes...two planes in each section.

The 28th Division split up in 1951. Some of the men went to Korea and the remainder went to Germany. I was in Germany 7 months, returned to U.S.A. in May (?) 1952. I had 12 years as Tech Sergeant.

I became a Christian November 1950. In 1964 after 14 years of preparation at 46 years of age I and my family went to Papua New Guine in the Southern Highlands interior ministering and building. We retired in 1980.

At 72 years of age I am in good health still doing carpentering, have a small work shop to do crafts and repair work as well as preaching when called on to do so.

Would there be any way I could get "clay pigeon" and 8th A.F. insignias? Back in the late 1940s I loaned a man my copy of the photo of the 367th so that he could get a copy. He never returned it. I remember we were all standing on the wings of a B-17. Would there be any way I could get a copy of that photo?

God bless you for putting the 306th back together. I am looking forward to reading "First Over Germany".
