- Lunday Light. 16, 1945 Jeaust Mrs. Banta .-I have its been timble of me not to really is no excuse for it of all the fault is entirely all mine I were wonderful lettle from you two ago but having been away this is my first opportunity in had to answer. I'm just hoping that I can tell you a very few things that may have and stillackinging heavily on your min all there is to know, or I should say what I know tolk to fancy Jasses, and by your letter see that shis told you everything. I think it would be better if ! started from the beginning and told you about the whole merecon. The day and one which I don't think any of us will ever forget was feet. 2, 1944. We were awahened about

2:00 in the morning and are all men are, we stayed in bed until the last minute, Finally at 2:30 we got up and huried down to the mers hall, eating as fast as we would so as to make a 3:00 brufing. Of the bufing all the crew sat topether with the exception of the Bombardier of the Radio Operator, but no matte when you were highed the tayer and flight was exite the same and when they unevered the map, every one almost slupped out of heat failue. The musion was to be Synthitic Oil Plants of Khuland, Chechoslovakio and it was really a very long typ, but that warn't all the opposition was to be suit about all the Germanscould muster in that section of tenitory. We still said it was OK. it was always that way, no matter how cough the musion was going to be weld do a good job and some home, and believe me Mrs. Banto John + Bob were a team We had the best Bombardies. + Pelot in the whole of the air Jones.

and I'm not telling you that just to make you fel good it was really true. But ucevil a gold or selver star beside his name on just about every bombing he'd ever made. Frist of all before we took of we Some some thing was going to kypen because nothing went right and were thing usually worked perfectly this morning it was just the opposito. We had twell with engines guins tunes and in general everything, and every one was jumpy for some reason of He took off and flue the northern could over water and seef down to the left of Berlin, We were leading the high group, so we naturally had to follow the lind group but the lead group was off course to the right and that luxueght us almost over Beslin The flak was very heavy and accurate and we lost two engines Nos 3-4

We couldn't hup leading so we sulled out of formation and come award behind, I just now out of green wik and there isn't any more, I hope you'll shave it and also all the mistakes and the timble uniting) the lead group, and just as we did German F.W. 1905 het us, and boy they hit so at a time about 2 bis hundred of them and they shot out another engine and some gas lines. That really put is in a fix. We went as long as we possibly would I should say about 100 miles or perhaps 75 west south west of Berlin and then had to look for a place to washeland, the finally found a field and started to washland. Before this on soming to this place all estro equiptment was thrown out and the bombs salvad on an opportune target this lightened the plane enough to hup us going on a few more miles. About 2 50 ft from the ground we all took each positions, The Pelot walled

If Banta + Carolino up behind shine and Aplained to them how the landing would take place, so they of know just about what to exect Everything would have gone along swell but our last engine cut out at an altitude of about 200 ft It Lasser pulled it up as fact and well as he possibly could but without enough height it was all useless. If might have still be allight but in our path there was a true and it stand us right in the face. The four of the crask threw everyone out of the ship, without exception of behulf who was throws into a corner against a bulkhead. We in the new part of the ship didn't know when the crash was soming so for that wason Schult didn't make if to the Radie Room. Mr. Banto the wash thew Bob from the ship and he was hilled instartly, I know you'll be thankful to know that he encured no suffering Bob was thrown

abut 30 ft. away from me, and was laying on part of a wing with blene Canal about a foot away When I was thrown out Idid umain concious for about minute enough to see Bob & Gene. I landed in a small pond of water about 4 ff deep and ther just haggened to lay my am around a branch, that little transf wally saved a drowning Mrs. Banto Bobs face was not scaned atall and as for as I would see he looked allight all over just as if he west sleeping Ididn't hear a grown from him or any thing which might make me think he was alive, It furt this Banta I thought I was the only one who got out alive but I didn't really went to live as long as they had given their lives Tuithfully I didn't think argone well live through it wen John said The same thing offerwards in the Hospital The Germans lame afterne in about 3 hours that is the civilians did, The soldiers came 4 hours later and put us into a truck for a first aid station there to

poskitel. The German dil however come into our ward about 2 weeks later and told us about the bundle of our buddies. The told we fa cusmons given them with full mulitary honor I was thankful for that because a lot of times they just let the lody lay where fall. John used to ask me hundreds of times each day if I had seen Bol, Itself him no I hadn. because his condition was so bad that the shock might have hilled him too so I said that moone had sun Bob and he might have gotten away, then he used to be relieved a very great deal. Mrs. Bento I know that I haven I given you really too much information but its all I can tell grow about Bob. If I happen to find out anything I may have over looked I'll units you immediately. I really am very sorry for you

Mrs. Banto because Bob was a son any mother woold give her right aim to have. Even all the fellows who had ever come into contact with him had never seen anyone like him, he was just one who had a way with wyone always hoppy go lucky with never any thisis bothung kins. We used to get alone swell because we two used to always go out to the shut range and see who could get the most hits. The always his come out about ever, and he used to get mad when we used to total up the sever and he used to find it tied Ill close now Mrs. Banto and me heart is with your all the way The selected was all all mino to be as fortunito as to have a Bombardier + fal to fly with as Bob.
