

Rooney, Denny to Entertain with Remarks

Two top notch speakers have been secured for the Pittsburgh reunion, to entertain, inform and amuse the 306th members and their guests.

Andrew A. Rooney is known to one and all as Andy Rooney of CBS "60 Minutes" fame, but is also an experienced combat flier with the 306th, at least on one date in February 1943.

Rooney was a *Stars and Stripes* writer, by Army assignment, and he was further "posted" much of the time to Thurleigh and the 306th in 1943. He was a regular and well known visitor to the base, talking with all kinds of people, and writing stories that frequently appeared in the popular five-times-a-week publication that appeared at the base each morning.

As one looks at old and tattered clippings today that men have saved from the Stars and Stripes, invariably it is revealed that Andy Rooney was the author of the piece, taking a close look at the men who flew the planes, those who serviced the planes, and that large cadre of men who kept the base running.

The accolades of WWII GI's for his writing must still be ringing in his ears after all these years, as he has continued to reap more awards as a writer of books, TV news specials, and movie scripts. He has won four Emmys and five awards from the Writers Guild of America for his "best written TV documentaries."

To many Americans today, his feature at the close of "60

Minutes" each Sunday evening on CBS is the best thing of the hour-long program.

Time magazine once described him as the "most felicitous non-fiction writer in television." He will relive those halcyon days of WWII when he wrote the exploits of "our" men day after day, as he comes to our luncheon at the Air National Guard on Reunion Thursday.

Robert R. Denny, a pilot with the 368th Squadron flying thirty-five missions in 1944 and early 1945, will be our Saturday night banquet speaker.

Denny Meets the Enemy

He will bring us experiences he had both during the war and in a long career following, much of it as a TV writer and producer, including the script of "Why Hitler Lost," which brought him into contact with Adolf Galland, Luftwaffe fighter commander, and Johannes Steinhof, who flew FW 190s against Flying Fortresses and in the postwar period was commander of the Luftwaffe.

Denny's first novel, *Aces*, may not yet be a best seller, but it is a successful novel about WWII combat flying, with a few other elements mixed in to give it more pizazz. It is good enough that his publishers quickly had Denny back at the computer console, working on a second novel with a WWII flying theme.

England is Not Far Away — in 1992!

England is not far away in terms of distance, or in flying time, or in the memories of the many of us who served our overseas tours at Thurleigh in 1942-45, or even into '46!

These facts can be reinforced for all who choose to join the 306th Bomb Group 50th anniversary reunion trip back to England in 1992. Planes will leave from half a dozen U.S. cities on Monday, 25 August 1992, most landing at Heathrow Airport on London's west side, or possibly at Gatwick, south of London.

Expect 400 on Jaunt

Some 400 men, spouses and friends are expected to join the flights to England, and to participate in the reminiscences there. Some will be

joyous, some will be saddened by thoughts of departed comrades. We will attend a service at the 306th memorial on the site of the old 40th Combat Wing headquarters just outside the boundaries of today's RAE Bedford, a place that many of us called home for varying periods of time a half century ago.

This mood will again come to the fore as we also make an important visit to the Madingly cemetery, a bit to the northwest of Cambridge, where many 306th men are interred, and where those lost at sea or never found are memorialized on the Wall of the Missing, which stands along one side of the reflecting pool.

In this issue of *Echoes* is a more refined travel and event schedule for that important week, obviously the last time

for many of us to visit this area which in a few short days, months or years became such an important part of the rest of our lives.

Major revisions have been made in the routing and scheduling for this trip, as the committee has been mindful of the age span of our travelers, and the different aspects upon which individuals wish to focus. Because of all of this the venture has been slowed down, not trying to cover too much in too short a span of time. There are those who wish to spend more time in Bedford, while others want to go to London.

We are also working to accommodate those who will fly on their airline passes, and those retired military who will travel space available. But it is in Bedford, Thurleigh and London that

Jim Macry, 1991 reunion chairman, is at presstime predicting that there will be nearly 600 people on hand. The hotel reports, as well, that reservations are coming in rapidly, and that they are surprised with the early response of the 306th membership.

Andy Rooney, noted CBS commentator and honorary member of the 306th, and Robert Denny, one of our own, are poised to bring us stories and highlights of the 306th as seen through the perspectives of reporter and commentator, and a pilot and novelist. This should provide a high level of entertainment and something totally different from such diversions provided at other reunions.

This also marks the reunion at which you will receive full information on the 1992 reunion in England and will have an opportunity to initiate your registration for that adventure. Travel experts will be on hand to talk with you during the reunion.

While the activities are centered in the Holiday Inn near the Pittsburgh International Airport, there will be opportunities for everyone to visit in and about the Pittsburgh area. The Station Square complex on the edge of downtown Pittsburgh is an aspect of the community that is highly regarded by both residents and visitors. During WWII you may have changed trains in the Pittsburgh Station, and while you cannot do that now, you can go back to the old station and with a touch of nostalgia about you see the interesting shops and restaurants that abound there.

You will also be able to become acquainted with the two Generals Chrisjohn, Robert J., the onetime 368th pilot, and his son, Robert G., who is commander of the 171st Air Refueling Wing of the Pennsylvania Air National Guard. Son Robert will be our host Thursday for a tour of the ANG facilities and for a Fish and Chips lunch in one of their hangars. It is here that Andy Rooney wil speak to us and bring back some memories of 1943 at Thurleigh.

On Friday morning many of the Group will leave for the **Gateway Clipper**, and a trip up the Ohio River to Ambridge



Pearl Harbor Survivor

Taylor Leedy, co-pilot on Robert Welter's 423rd crew, and later a first pilot, believes he was the only Pearl Harbor survivor among 306th pilots. He already had two plus years in service on 7 Dec 41, and was at Hickam Field on that "Day of Infamy." After completing his tour on D-Day, he flew for a period with Cycle Relay.

A lot of thoughts flooded through Taylor's mind when he saw the collison picture in the last issue of *Echoes*, as he was headed for the line shack with his parachute and oxygen mask on 15 Oct 44 when the two planes hit, almost overhead.

OBITS

Harry H. Barber, 367th tail gunner (Howard Balcom crew), died 12 Oct 89 in Norway, ME. He arrived with the Group 1 Sep 44 and flew into Jan 45.

Charles R. Crow, 367th radio maintenance man, died earlier this year in Sun City, CA.

Guy H. Golden, Jr., 423rd waist gunner and evadee (w. Gino DiBetta), died 5 May 91 in Pine Bluff, AR, where he had been an insurance agent. He was missing 14 Feb 44 on the raid to Frankfurt, was rescued by the French Underground and became the 1000th evadee to return to Allied military control. He leaves his wife and four children.

Claude L. Hostetter, a longtime ground officer with the 4th Station Complement Squadron, died 29 Oct 83 in Clinton, OK. He began in Intelligence, and was variously station defense officer and plans and training officer, among other assignments. He retired from USAF as a lieutenant colonel, and later worked for the Oklahoma State Employment Service.

Robert W. Huistra, 423rd bombardier and POW (w. Martin Andrews), died 15 Feb 91 in Tuscon, AZ, of cardiac pulmonary arrest. He was a graduate of Indiana University and a CPA. Andrews' plane went down on 6 Sep 43 at Stuttgart, Germany.

Frank (Bob) Leasman, 367th navigator and POW (w. Ralph Gaston), died 2 May 91 in Anaheim, CA. With the original group, Leasman bailed out of Gaston's crippled plan on the 2 Nov 42 raid to St. Nazaire, and spent two and one-half years at Stalag Luft III. Retired in 1984, Leasman continued to suffer injuries incurred during his bailout.

LTC Roy M. MacLeod, first Protestant chaplain for the 306th, died 8 Feb 91 in Imperial Beach, CA. He left the 306th 1 Jul43 when he was transferred to VIII AF Composite Command. He retired

Anyone who flew on this mission is invited to contact Cyril Norman, a longtime friend of the 306th, who is trying to sort out what really happened on that mission to St. Nazaire.

One plane was ultimately lost, and in working with German accounts, Cyril is trying to establish whether Lt. Robert Brandon's plane was hit by German flak over the Channel Islands, which would account for its disappearance.

You can write Cyril Norman, 16 Rye Crescent, Cople, Bedford MK44 3TJ, England. USAF in Aug 61 and was 82 years of age at the time of death.

Francis X. Mulherin, Jr., assistant finance officer for the Group, died 26 Mar 79 in Augusta, GA. An avid golfer all of his life, Mulherin was the winner of many tournaments, and was Georgia State Amateur Champion in 1938 and again in 1965. He was in sales for United Brokerage Co., Augusta.

LTC Maurice W. Pickett, 367th engineering officer and POW, was killed 4 Apr 91 in an auto accident north of Eugene, OR. He had recently made his home in Coburg, OR. Although non-rated, Pickett was a frequent flier on 367th A/C, and on his third mission with Raymond Fortin was MIA at Bremen 17 Apr 43. Pickett retired from USAF in Jun 67.

Robert E. Reid, 367th copilot (Robert Cardon crew) and POW, 12 Sep 44 at Ruhland (w. Earl Barr), died 10 Jan 91 in Pawtucket, Rl.

John M. (Jack) Schmidt, 367th radio operator (Charles Wegener crew), died 26 May 91 in Belleville, IL, from a blood clot in the brain following quadruple bypass surgery. Jack and his wife were regular attendees at 306th reunions, and prior to retirement he had been a cattle buyer for Swift & Co.

Col. Alvin G. Schuering, 369th pilot and POW, died 2 Jun 90 at Wheaton, IL. He joined the group 1 Dec 43, and his plane was shot down 29 Mar 44 at Brunswick. He leaves his wife and six children. Col. Schuering retired USAF in 1972, having served with SAC, the Joint Chiefs, and as CO of the USAF Technical School, Chanute AFB, IL. He earned his law degree in 1979 and then spent six years with the DuPage County District Attorney's office.

Thomas L. Smith, 367th waist gunner (Howard Balcom crew), is now deceased. He joined the group 1 Sep 44 and flew into Jan 45.

James F. Sylvester, 423rd pilot from 8 Aug 43 to 11 Oct 43, died 31 Mar 47 in Munich, Germany, where he was stationed with the 61st Troop Carrier Group.

Orin A. Van Cleave, originally with the 1024th Ordnance Co. at Thurleigh and then a waist gunner with the 423rd, died 8 Apr 91 in Skokie, IL. He joined a combat crew in Apr 43 and became the 80th EM to complete a tour, leaving thegroup 11 Sep 43.

Jack C. Webb, 423rd waist gunner (Loyal Felts crew) and POW, died Dec 89 in Madeira Beach, FL, where he had lived for some years. He was shot down 26 Jun 43 (w. Thomas Logan) on a mission to Bremen, Germany.



Ground Officers Were Essential To the 306th

A senior officer, commenting after the war, said that one of the reasons for the strength of the 306th Bomb Group was its excellent corps of ground officers. These were the men who usually stayed home from missions and kept affairs moving properly, who kept the paper work flowing, who kept the supplies coming, and who made it possible for the senior rated officers to carry out their flying duties in addition to their ground work.

(Right here it should be mentioned that ground officers often found their way into the planes, flying in the nose or waist, and that four of them gained first hand experience in the German prisoner of war camps!)

A study of the personnel list of the Group indicates there were 288 ground officers who served the Group from its beginning at Wendover until the end of combat in 1945.

Like others, ground officers came and went, with the inventory of such men being 84 on 10 Jan 43, and one year later, 1 Jan 44, the count had risen to 131.

Additionally, there were a fair number of rated officers who held administrative posts, while putting in their combat time on a more occasional basis. This began with the group commander, the squadron commanders, many of the operations people, and others who were a part of the combat side of the base.

The list of ground officers has been compiled largely from various semi-annual rosters and other listings, and from the Special Orders that were issued daily from 1 Mar 42 through the end of combat. Unfortunately, the late 1942 and all of 1943 orders are in short supply. Thus, the historian today continues to request officers to go through their 201 files and to send him copies of any orders issued to them, especially between 1 Mar 42 and 30 Nov 43.

The Listing

Now, as to this roster, the men are listed alphabetically. Appended is information as to the unit to which they were assigned or the specific task(s) they handled on the base. A date followed by a hyphen indicates date of arrival with the 306th, a hyphen followed by a date indicates the date of departure. Most men have not been able to be traced at both ends of the chronological spectrum.

An asterisk immediately following the name means that the person is now on our mailing roster for Echoes. A name followed by a (D) indicates that the person is known to be deceased.

Once again we ask your indulgence. Tell us what these men did; where they came from; where they may have attended college; or, if you know a person to be deceased. If you have Special Orders listing any of these men, please send along a copy. Any information you have will help "swell" the historical file of the 306th Bomb Group.

Mission Report **Papers Near Complete Now**

Most of the Mission Report papers have now turned up, and by the time you receive this issue of Echoes they will probably be on file.

But, there still remains a problem with thirteen missions, which could not be found in the National Archives files. We then gueried USAF Historical Research at Maxwell AFB, AL, and received copies of operational data on about half of these. This was soon followed by information from Archives that they could provide operational data on most of the remainder that we were seeking.

But, left out in the cold in these two responses, is the fact that no crew interrogation reports exist for these missions: 1943: 14 Feb-Bremen, 18 Mar-Vegesack; 9 Oct-Gydnia, and 14 Oct-Schweinfurt (some crew lists).

1944: 21 June-Berlin, 6 July-Noball in France, 18 July-Peenemunde, 20 July-Kothen, and 30 Nov-Gera.

-21 Oct 43

1945: 8 Apr-Halberstadt, 17 Apr-Dresden and 19 Apr-Falkenburg.

Don't lose hope quite yet, because with more searching some of this data may yet be found. The historian will keep working on the matter, and is confident of success.

Filling Your Orders!

Anyone can order the Mission Reports, limited to three at a time for \$5. When your order is filled, order some more. Some longer orders have been accepted, but many of these people will wait a while before all of their requests can be filled.

The historian still has a number of back orders to be answered, and many of them will be taken care of by the time you read this issue. Others will be handled as expeditieously as posible, but may well run into September.

At this writing, my December '90 orders from Archives have been filled, but it often takes thirty to sixty minutes to get one date cleared up in the files. The April orders are due the week of this writing, and will be placed in the files as soon as possible.

Materials have also been received from the USAF Historical collection, and some of the missing data has been ordered from National Archives.

Where's Pittsburgh?

Some nagging questions concerning men of the 306th:

Where are they all? We estimate that some 2,000 to 3,000 men are still living in the U.S. who served at Thurleigh, 1942-45, and who are not on our mailing list. About a half dozen have requested to be removed, but that leaves a lot of others whom we would like to find.

Have you checked any lists you still may have? Or, your old address book? Or your memory?

Some crews are hiding! There were some crews who arrived in 1943, or even late 1942, for whom we have no orders nor initial listings of them. If you came in those years with a combat crew and other crews, you may be able to

Book Review

"Zemke's Stalag," by Col. Hubert Zemke. 1991.

From his role as the efficient master of from forty to sixty fighter aircraft in the skies over Germany, Hub Zemke quickly moved to become the commanding officer for 9,000 Allied military personnel at Stalag Luft I, near Barth, Germany, in 1944. Weather broke up his plane over Germany, forcing a bailout.

his plane over Germany, forcing a bailout. Zemke tells his own story in this new book, which has recently been published. It begins with his leadership of the 56th Fighter Group, a sampling of P-51s which zealously guarded the bomber stream, attacked the Luftwaffe if possible, and strafed their way across Germany en route back to base.

Upon Zemke's arrival at Stalag Luft I, it was determined that he was now the senior Allied officer, and therefore he assumed command of all Allied personnel in the camp. That was not a simple task, as he had to learn the practices, problems and secrets of the POW world. He became the prisoners' spokesman to the German Luftwaffe Kommandant and his administrators.

Zemke's involvement included escape plans, food shortages and the hidden radios which monitored the BBC daily for information on the progress of the war that could be relayed to the camp population.

As the war progressed and both Allied and Russian forces approached the camp, Zemke was worried that Stalag Luft I could become a no man's land between the German Army and the Allied force approaching. Zemke finally made a deal with the Kommandant to pull his garrison out of the camp to prevent casualties to those housed there. It worked, and the Russian Army liberated the camp 2 May 1945.

The major problem then facing Zemke and his staff was how to get his 9,000 unwilling prisoners back into Allied hands. Finally a nearby airfield was cleared of booby traps and runway damage was repaired, so that in mid-May C-46 and B-17 planes of the 8th were able to fly in and to transport the men to camps in France for debriefing and shipment home.

As a former POW, who resided in both Stalag 4 and Stalag I, I consider "Zemke's Stalag" as must reading for all former POWs and for other servicemen. It conveys well the behind-the-scene activities of the camp, and explains also the conditions within a German camp and the suffering that prisoners endured.
