Treasury to Change Hands

Schedule Set For Des Moines Reunion

We're looking forward to seeing you in Des Moines this Fall. An ample choice of tours and special events has been lined up to make your stay with us an enjoyable one. The information below will help you make a choice as to which tours and events you want to participate in.

We would encourage you to make your reservations early. Room reservations should be made directly with the hotel. The Crystal Inn is an attractive 225-room hotel located on Fleur Drive directly across from the Des Moines airport. Rooms will be reserved on a first-come, first-served basis with overflow going to the nearby Best Western Des Moines International hotel. Reservations for tours and special events are also on a first-come, first-served basis with size limitations on certain tours.

Tours Thursday and Friday

Scenic tours have been lined up for Thursday and Friday, with three of these being repeated. In addition, there are three special events you'll not want to miss. These are the lowa Farm Dinner on Thursday evening, the Aviation Expo on Friday afternoon (Friday evening is free) and the Annual Reunion Banquet on Saturday evening. None of the tours will interfere with attendance at these special events.

The Amana Colonies (not to be confused with the Amish) is a National Historic Landmark and lowa's leading visitor attraction. Founded in 1855 by German-speaking people, seeking religious freedom and enjoying a communal way of life, the Amana Colonies offer a number of attractions. These include an old-world setting, woolen mill, winery, handmade furniture factory, numerous craft and gift shops, and many excellent eating facilities (that's why we left the choice of lunch up to you).

Living History Farms

Living History Farms is a 600-acre open-air museum that tells the story of midwestern agriculture. It features actual working farms from three different eras (1700 Indian, 1850 Pioneer, and 1900) plus a look at the farm of the future. There is also a recreated 1875 village with the Church of the Land built on the spot visited by the Pope on his trip to lowa in 1979. Note that this tour requires a fair amount of walking. After the tour, a special luncheon will be provided at the nearby lowa Machine Shed restaurant.

The Magnificent Mansion tour includes a visit to several elegant Victorian mansions including Terrace Hill, the Iowa Governor's residence, and Jordan House, a station on the Underground Railway in Civil War times. It also includes a visit to the 42-room Tudor mansion known as Salisbury House with its many art treasures, from ancient to modern. This mansion, built in the 1920's by an Iowa industrialist with eclectic art tastes, has been described by the National Trust for Historic Preservation as a "national treasure." We think you'll agree when you see it.

The **Discover Des Moines** tour gives the first-time visitor a good overview of Des Moines. It covers a wide area and includes stops at the Iowa State Capitol, State Historical Building, and Des Moines Botanical Center.

After a bus trip to Altoona on Thursday evening, you will enjoy a rib tickling **lowa Farm**Dinner served by the Pork Producers Association. It features a super thick "lowa Chop" with all the trimmings. There will also be a cash bar and something different in the way of musical entertainment, which we think you'll enjoy.

On Friday afternoon you'll take a bus trip to the new Ankeny Airport for a behind-thescenes look at one of the most unusual and exciting model air shows you'll ever see. Put on by the 1/5th Air Force, it features 1/5th scale model airplanes re-enacting portions of World War II. You'll recognize several WW II fighter planes, a 20-foot wingspan B-17 with 306th markings, and a 30-foot wingspan B-29. We believe this event will be one of the highlights of your visit to Des Moines.

119 'Join' Group In Phone Blitz

In this issue are listed 119 recentlyfound men of the 306th! (See page 7.) This is the largest number we have ever added in one three-month period, and is directly related to the efforts expended with the computerized National Telephone Directory. And we are continuing its use.

Of this number, eight came to us from other sources.

We began using the National Telephone Directory shortly before Christmas, and results have been phenomenal, only slowed by a 10-day vacation trip and the necessity of making telephone calls to verify that the listing we identified is indeed a 306th veteran.

In several cases, those called could furnish us with information on friends of WWII days with whom they have retained contact, and that is always a significant help. Our capitol expenditure for this was about \$300, including the purchase of a CD Rom unit for the computer and two computer ROM discs, which contain some 70,000,000 names.

This search also accounts in large measure for the expanded Obituary list to be found elsewhere in this issue; also for the significant number of women and children added to our mailing list.

Two Discs in Use

The discs divide the country into two sections, East (going as far west as Ohio and Alabama), and west, the remainder of the country. Thus, it is necessary to search our 306th card file twice. After names are found that correspond exactly with our record, phone calls may be made to positively identify. BUT, it is impossible to sort out those persons with very common first names, as there may be hundreds to choose from. If we have some identification as to their pre-war location, we will try individuals in that area.

As a result of this work, we have begun including the first names of spouses, or an indication of marital status, in our "Newly Found" roster. This will carry through in to the 1994 directory. This is our last appeal for you to send us your spouse's name or other marital information quickly as we will need to get that into the computer by the time you receive your next *Echoes*, if we are to mail a new directory in early May.

If you question the top-heavy alpha listing shown in our new names, it is because we have to search generally in some orderly fashion so that no name is inadvertently skipped. The secretary has a card file of from eight to 10 thousand names of those who served with the 306th. At this writing, he has worked through Nicholas Gotch on the western list and through Edward F. Czerwonka on the eastern list. As you read this, he has progressed onward with the search, but it is expected that this will take a year or more to complete. By then it may be time to buy a new set of phone discs.

Mission Reports Can Bring You **A Whole Lot of Reminiscing**

Shortly before Christmas, Jack Samway, onetime 368th bombardier, received an envelope by priority mail weighing more than two pounds.

In it he had the mission reports for all but three of his 30 combat missions, and was also lacking the crew interrogation report for one mission. Some 217 pages were included in his order, and you can be sure it took him more than one evening to read carefully through all the reports, and to reconstruct in his mind some of the days over the Continent, and events before and after some of those missions.


Many of you can do the same thing, if you put the dates together and send your request to the secretary.

Since the reunion, more than 40 more missions have been added to the collection, and one last trip to Washington in late February or March we hope will complete the 306th's unique collection of mission material. We have heard of only one other group that has gone after this material, and it has everything stored in a warehouse in Georgia!

What do you get? The Intelligence narrative and sometimes the Operations narrative; the formation chart, which often includes the notations made during the mission by the air commander; a detailed route map showing how we got there and how we got home; engineering reports on damage to aircraft; and the crew interrogation sheet prepared by the crew and an intelligence officer back at Thurleigh. On some missions there is other data, depending on what was available in the folders at National Archives.

The 306th Bomb Group Historical Association is a Federally tax-exempt organization and as a veteran's group is classified as 501 (c)(19).

Requests have ranged from one mission, for Frank Lehnert who was in prison camp after that first day, to the complete 35 missions flown by many of those arriving after 1 July 44. Ground men have ordered missions they recall with interest, or track some of the fliers they knew.

Reginald Thayer, another 368th bombardier and an authority on high altitude bombing in the B-17, rather reluctantly ordered \$5 worth of missions (3), when they were first offered, and said he thought that they might be overpriced and not worth the effort. The three arrived in his Palisades, NY, home, and the next day Thayer put in an order for all of his missions. As to his authority, Thayer flew 50 missions with the 97th Bomb Group in the 15th Air Force before wangling a transfer to the 306th, and then flew another 29 missions with us. PROBABLY the only 306th men to surpass this total were Col. Immanuel Klette, with the 306th and 91st, and Col. William S. Raper, with the 306th and

Elbert Wood Story Told In New Book

The story of Elbert Wood's death on the way to Schweinfurt is told in a new book, Or Go Down in Flames authored by a younger brother, Prof. Raymond W. Wood. Wood was the navigator for 369th pilot George Bettinger on that fateful day.

Wood had joined the 306th 29 Aug 43, and this was his sixth mission.

Prof. Wood not only reveals the experience of the American flyers in this infamous battle, but that of the civilians on the ground and the enemy fighters who flew against the B-17s (including the Me-110 pilot who in all probability destroyed his brother's plane with a

As well as being a moving personal history and a stirring combat drama on a grand scale, OR GO DOWN IN FLAME also provides valuable resource material for anyone investigating the fate of casualties overseas. The Graves Registration branch of the U.S. Armed Forces has performed mammoth tasks in the service of our country, which is brought to light here in the final chapter and appendices. Wood's research has paved the way for others seeking details on a loved one's tragic end in America's foreign wars.





Gen James H. Doolittle is seen above on perhaps his last visit to Thurleigh, 12 July 1944, when the 367th lead ship, Rose of York, was christened by the then Princess Elizabeth. Doolittle died in the fall of 1993. The picture shows the three stars of a lieutenant general on his shoulders; he was not awarded the fourth star until 1985, in recognition of his leadership and his contributions to aviation. Doolittle has often been referred to as the champion of the 'calculated risk', a management tool he used in his leadership of the 8th AF in 1944-45.

306th Has Big **Hand in Life At Ardmore**

In the spring of 1944 operations at the Ardmore, Okla., Army Air Field had a strong flavor of 306th men, past and future, according to a book loaned to the editor by Charles Niblack, who arrived with the 368th squadron as a pilot 4 Jun 44.

B/Gen Frank A. Armstrong, Jr., the second CO of the 306th in January and February, 1943, arrived at Ardmore in Aug 43, heading up the 46th Bombardment Operational Training Wing.

LTC James W. Wilson, former 423rd squadron commander and Group deputy commander, came to Ardmore as director of training for the 395th Combat Crew Training School

1st Lt. Beverly R. Lamb 368th, was a bombardier instructor, while 1st Lt. Emmette W. Ford 423rd, was also on the staff. Capt. L.P. Johnson, 423rd, was a flight commander, and Capt. Edward P. Maliszewski, 369th, was commander of Training Section B.

Training Section C had Capt. John R. McKee as an instructor pilot, and Capt. Pervis E. Youree, 423rd, as a tactical advisor.

17 August 1943 Lt. Conrad FCO

2100 hrs. Drem lighting out on all but main R/W. Attempts being made to contact an electrician, but got no answer from night people. Put auxiliary flare path down. 18 August 1943

0815 hrs. Contacted electrician re Drem lighting. Pending a more detailed inspection, lights may be out tonight. Inspection to be made this morning.

0855 hrs. Explained lighting faults to Station Electrician Mr. Bray. He believes difficulty arises from passage of vehicles over cables laid parallel to R/W, since these cables are laid fairly close to surface. Such vehicles as graders, heavy trucks as well as a/c taxiing from R/W to grass, cause most of trouble. Will inspect immediately but can promise no immediate results.

1010 hrs. Drem lighting OK on all R/Ws - Blown Fuse!

When and Where Did **Pilots Come From?**

As one might guess, Col. Charles Overacker predated all other pilots who ever flew with the 306th as to the date of completing his pilot training, finishing in Class 27-C at Kelly Field, San Antonio, TX.

In all, three pilots finished in the '20s, six in the '30s, two in '40, 17 in '41, and the flood gates opened with the '42 classes.

The original group, leaving for combat, had drawn as deeply as the 42-F class for its original complement of pilots and co-pilots. Many of these men reported within a day or two after graduation to the 306th at Wendover Field, Utah, for their introductions to the B-17.



"You can't change history..."

It was an invitation that was diffcult to accept, even though it included a trip to Europe, expense paid. It came from BRT, Belgium national television. They were making a document about a WWII air raid on an aircraft plant in Antwerp, on April 5, 1943. I had been shot and captured by the enemy on that mission.

The raid was a disaster. Four B-17s went down in the fierce air battle over Belgium. Thirteen American airmen were killed, 28 became prisoners of war. The Luftwaffe counted five FW 190s lost. In the targeted plant, 307 Belgian workmen were killed.

In the heat of the battle, most bombs overshot the target, some by as much as a kilometer. A number fell into the little town of Mortsel, a densely populated suburb of Antwerp. Three schools were hit, 209 children were killed. In all, 936 Belgians died under the bombs of that raid.

"These are your friends! Your allies!" a German guard said to me as we watched a rescue worker emerge from a stricken building carrying a little girl in his arms.

It was one of the blackest days of the warr for Belgium.

So why would an American airman agree to go back to the scene of the tragedy as Belgium paused to observe its 50th anniversary and to mourn the loss once again?

Because you can't change history. It happened. And somebody from the American side had to share in the grief.

What could any say?

Killing and being killed. That's what war is all about. The monumental tragedy is that we still don't know how to avoid it and and the same time escape the sure and dire consequences of being passively defenseless.

Mourning the dead is the least we can do.

Major Problem 14 October '43 Delineated in 305th Study

Wrong Placel Wrong Timel, The 305th Bomb Group and the 2nd Schweinfurt Raid, by George C. Kuhl. Atglen, PA, Schiffer Military/ Aviation History, 1993. 304 pp. \$24.95.

Black Thursday was blackest for the planes and crews of the 305th Bomb Group, followed in second place by the 306th.

Only two of their planes made it back to Chelveston, against the five of the 306th which came home on the long route around Paris.

George Kuhl, a 1945 pilot for the 305th, was interested in the/ Schweinfurt raid, which was still being talked about when he arrived with the 305th, and over the years he became intrigued by what actually happened to those planes and crews.

His labor is displayed in this interesting book, as he tracks the planes as

115th Mission Fort Returns On One Engine

306th BOMB GROUP — The Fortress How Soon returned from its 115th mission on one engine.

Approximately ten minutes from the target — an airfield in the Oranienburg area of Germany — the bomber ran into heavy tracking anti-aircraft fire. Close concussions of flak bursts bounced the Fort, striking No. 3 and 4 engines.

The pilot, 2/Lt. Robert E. Woods, of Memphis, Tenn., was hit in the right hand. The co-pilot, 1/Lt. John S. McDonald, of Rockford, Mich., was knocked out by a chunk of metal which tore through his helmet.

"When I came to, the cockpit was full of smoke, powdered glass and debris," McDonald related. "Three engines were out."

The battered Fort unloaded its bombs and went into a dive, plunging 10,000 feet before pulling out. Crewmen were alerted for the bail-out order.

Eight Mustangs suddenly appeared, four staying with the crippled bomber and four hitting the deck, silencing enemy flak batteries.

All equipment was jettisoned. The ball turret jammed, however. S/Sgt. Clarence W. Hunter, tail gunner from Graham, N.C., and Sgt. Edward J. Maliszewski, radio operator from Schenectady, N.Y., each grabbed one of the two tail guns and kept beating on the ball turret until it dropped.

"We staggered all over the sky — but made it back to base somehow," the copilot said. Despite one more obstacle — a flat tire — the pilot landed the Fort smoothly.

they went down, and then follows the crew members as they fought for life. And it is just at this point that a historian might raise his eyebrows. The detail is exquisite, with item following on item. Most of this had not been recorded at the time and has come from memories of long ago. Just how accurate some of these memories may be at least four decades after events is open to question.

Still, Kuhl has done an excellent job of searching the men out and then trying to give a coherent explanation to the entire affair.

Why did it happen? Kuhl perhaps cites a couple of villains in the piece—Maj. Gen. Frederick Anderson, 8th Bomber Command chief, for running the raid at all on a day of miserable weather, and Maj. Charles G.Y. Normand, the 305th air commander for the day, for myriad misjudgements of situations and pyramiding the problems for his formation, for the 40th Combat Wing, and ultimately for the First Bomb Division.

A DSC Proposal

One of the more amazing stories is that of Maj. Normand and his post-raid actions, as Lt. Joseph Kane, pilot of the group's lead ship, was summoned to headquarters the next day: "Sir, would you read and sign this citation recommending Major Normand for the Distinguished Service Cross for yesterday's mission? The Major has already been in and recommended you for the Silver Star.

"Kane slowly began reading the contents of the paper and was astounded at what he saw. Normand had filled his proposal with self-seeking fabrications concerning his conduct as yesterday's group leader . . . Kane finished reading Normand's fable . . . and returned unsigned the proposed commendation."

Responding to the sergeant's query, Kane said he would not sign the statement and "As for him recommending me for a Silver Star, forget it . . . i already have one."

Kuhl is also very critical of the 40th Wing critique the following afternoon, as no one probed into just what did happen to perhaps cause the heavy loss of men and aircraft.

Black Thursday was a nightmare for those who flew that day, and Kuhl points to some of the salient reasons as to the disaster which struck the 40th Combat Wing 14 October 1943 over the Continent.

Long, Slow Trip Home

368th Plane, # 42-29795, Mission 15 May 1943

"Just before we got to the target an ME-109 hit us. First, we were hit in the nose, then in the #4 engine. It began to smoke and we started to drop back. Then the prop on #1 ran away. Our #4 was smoking, and the fighters came in from every direction, swarming all over us. The tail gunner bailed out (we don't know just where). Soon the enemy fighters discovered that we had no tail gunner and they lined up on our tail and gave us hell. We went down in turning dives to 400 feet. The fighters left us shortly after we passed Heligoland. Came back on two engines at 120 mph. We threw over everything in the ship that we could get our hands on. Landed OK, but #4 prop dropped off as we hit the runway." Landed at Foulsham at 1143.
