TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (II), APO 557.

1. Narrative

21 A/C of the 306th flew as lead group of the 40th Combat Wing. Took off at 0652 hours, crossed English Coast at Clacton at 0839 hours. Followed briefed course to Enemy coast at 5120 N, 0235 E at 0858 hours. Followed briefed course to I.P. at 0913 and target at 0920. Due to bombsight malfunction on first run, a 360 degree turn to left just inside Ghent was made and a second run made on a heading of 80 degrees at 0935 hours. The course back was as briefed, the enemy coast being crossed at 5140 N, 0343 S at 1001 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours. The English Coast was crossed at Orfordness at 1033 $\frac{1}{2}$. Base at 1109 hours.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

No enemy A/C were seen. Support by P-47's was continuous in spite of the fact that this formation was late coming out due to second run. Most of the support was from 10,000 to 15,000 feet, apparently on the lookout for E/A coming up out of the overcast.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

Practically no A.A. gun fire on this group at any point except target where it was meager and inaccurate. In spite of two runs, battle damage from A.A. gun fire was five slight and one severe.

4. Bombing

On the bomb run, the bomb sight in the lead ship "blacked out." the high and low Groups went on to bomb briefed aiming point, while 306th leader made a 360, turning lead over to deputy for second run. 40th was last combat wing to bomb, and by the time 306th approached target on second run it was last group to bomb. Deputy bombardier found briefed aiming point obscured by previous bombing and selected unhit group of installations at southwest corner of field for new MPI. Pictures show briefed aiming point completely obscured, and show good concentration squarely on new MPI. Division was requested to bring these facts to the attention of O.M.S. so that bombing will be judged on basis of new MPI. According to bombsight maintenance, trouble with bombsight on first run was due to gyro getting tangled with caging mechanism, causing gyro to precess (probably due to loose caging knob).

5. Leaflets
None carried.

6. Weather

Weather was CAVU until just before I.P. From there until the middle of Brussels, 8/10 undercast, after which it broke to about 2/10, making good visibility at the target.

7. Observations

a. One crew reported observing flak on way back after crossing English Coast at Felixstowe. Another crew reported that a B-17 which dropped a smoke bomb on English Coast was shot at by AA guns.

b. A few fighters were seen taking off from Brussels/Evere A/D on first approach.

c. Land area to northwest of Ghent appeared to be flooded.

d. About 8 flashes were observed to come from the vicinity of Savenham, about 1½ miles NE of Brussels/Evere A/D. The flashes seemed to be yellowish and to last for about one minute each and were repeated at intervals. These may have been sodium searchlights, which have been reported previously.

Bombers Hit Defense Belt For Invasion

RAF, U.S. Blast Targets From Paris to Coast in Relentless Hammering

The Allied air forces swept over Belgium and France in almost incessant relays yesterday, from the dark hours of early morning until afternoon, pounding at the airdromes, aircraft repair plants and railway installations on which the Germans depend heavily for defense against invasion.

Following close upon the heels of the great five-pronged assault on Focke-Wulf production by American heavies Sunday, the combined forces of the RAF and USAAF launched these attacks against the enemy:

1—The RAF struck its first major night blow in the Paris area since the Gnome-Rhone raid in May, 1942, pounding the great railway yards at Villeneuve St. Georges, ten miles south of the city's center. Other RAF bombers struck rail targets at Lille, in northern France. Eleven aircraft failed to return.

Marauders Blast Coast

2—More than 200 Ninth Air Force Marauders, sweeping across the Channel in 11 waves at 20-minute intervals, attacked military objectives on France's northern coast, escorted by P47s. All returned.

3—Flying Fortresses and Liberators of the Eighth Air Force attacked German aircraft repair works and airdromes in Belgium and France yesterday, escorted by P38s, P47s and P51s, while Liberators, with similar escort, struck the Pas de Calais area of France. Three bombers and four fighters failed to return.

4—Mustang fighter-bombers of the Ninth, driving deep into Belgium, swooped low over a rail center to bomb locomotives, freight trains, sheds and tracks. All returned.

The Sunday attacks, extending as far as Marienburg and Gdynia in East Prussia and Posen in Poland, cost the American forces 31 bombers and eight fighters. American escort planes claimed 20 enemy fighters shot down, the bombers accounted for 43, and bombs destroyed or damaged 29 more on the ground, headquarters said.

Between 300 and 350 fighters and bombers were engaged in the battles at the targets

in Belgium and France yesterday. New enemy fighters came up to give battle, but those which did, attacking a few formations, were described as aggressive. The escorts destroyed seven fighters in the air and others on the ground; the bombers' toll was not tabulated late last night.

Among the heavies' targets were the repair works at Evere and Vilvorde and the airfield at Melsbroek, near Brussels; the aircraft factory at Bourges, in France, and the airfield at Orleans, France. The destruction of seven enemy fighters by the U.S. escort, plus the fighter opposition which the RAF night bombers encountered, indicated that the Luftwaffe had sent defensive forces back to France, where Allied bombers have met little opposition for weeks.

Col. Donald J. Blakeslee's Mustang group became the high-scoring fighter outfit in the ETO yesterday when its pilots destroyed 28 aircraft on a French airbase, bringing its total to 405, compared with the previous high score of 384 by Col. Hubert Zemke's group. The group's score was run up largely since March 22, when it stood at less than 100.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Strategic Air Forces announced yesterday that reconnaissance photos taken in Sunday's heavy raids on Focke-Wulf plants showed great destruction.

At Marienburg, in East Prussia, all principal buildings of the assembly plant were heavily hit and set ablaze. The plant was virtually devastated by U.S. bombers six months ago yesterday to the day, but had been reconstructed and was resuming production.
