SUBJECT: Intelligence Narrative.

TO.....: Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H).

1. Hot News

One B-17 exploded over Munster as a result of A.A. Gun fire. Seven chutes observed. One B-17 exploded over Munster as a result of A.A. Gun fire. Eight chutes observed. One B-17 spinning down, out of control at 1518 hours in Munster area, with enemy fighters attacking. Three to four chutes. One B-17 going down south of Zuider Zee at 1536 hours. Six chutes seen. Plane exploded at ground. One B-17 going down at 1504 hours before I.P. Six chutes. One B-17 went into spin in Munster area, 1521 hours. Three to five chutes. Regained control, followed this group, and, it is believed, made home. One P-47 in Munster area. Pilot bailed out.

2. Narrative

Nineteen A/C took off at 1155, and at 1403 were over Felixstowe. The course was as briefed to 51 48N - 07 03E, then followed 92nd Group to Coesfeld, bombed and proceeded to 52 14N - 07 03E, then returned as briefed.

3. Fighter Opposition

The 306th Group was the low and second group in the 40th Combat Wing. There were no attacks on this group. Enemy fighters in quantity were seen attacking other formations, notably the wing behind, in the target area, and the formations over Munster. Me109s and FW190s predominated. A few Me109s were seen. Fighter support was good. P-47s were first seen engaging E/A just before the I.P. at 51 48N - 07 03E at 1506 hours and provided effective high cover and wide area support from there to target and on the course back. An FW190 was seen destroyed by a P-47 right after bombs away (Coesfeld). A pilot was seen to bail out of a P-47 in Munster area. Spits were first observed at Dutch coast on route back. We make no claims.

4. A.A. Gun fire

No A.A. Gun fire on this group at Coesfeld. Moderate accurate tracking fire noted in Ruhr, but not near this group. At Munster A.A. Gun fire was intense, both barrage and continuous following. A.A. Gun fire was meager and inaccurate at Dutch coast.

5. Bombing


Photographs show 92nd Group bombs in dense concentration right on town of Coesfeld. 306th Group bombs short as our lead bombardier expected to bomb Munster, and had only 10 second run after he saw 92nd bombs away.

6. Comments

Smoke screen observed over Ruhr Valley. A large explosion or burst of flame seen near Zaltbommel, Holland on way in. Something like red flare reported coming from ground, bursting at A.A. Gun fire altitude, possibly ground-based rocket guns.

SUBJECT: Group Leader's Narrative.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. Take-off and join-up was executed as usual except for bad weather conditions. A track of 245° was made good 1000 feet above overcast. Join-up was executed over Cranfield as planned.

2. The 306th Group was over Thurleigh at 16,000 feet on time for Wing rendezvous. There being no other Groups in sight, this Group continued on course, joining the Wing at Stoney Stratford.

3. The climb was too fast to enable this Group to form proper Wing formation before leaving the English Coast.

4. The lead Group of the Wing made two "g" turns upon reaching enemy coast, thus allowing the 306th Group to get in proper formation. The cruising speed of the Wing was consistently between 160 and 165 MPH. Good Wing formation was maintained and our Wing suffered no attacks by enemy aircraft. No AACF was encountered on the route in.

5. The I.P. was broadcast on VHF as well as 6440 Ke and a red flare was fired. Moderate AACF was encountered over the I.P. The plane was given over to the bombardier on A.F.C.E., but it momentarily locked. Because of this the pilot moved this Group to the left and again turned the ship over to the bombardier. It became apparent that the target selected was not that which had been briefed. The lead bombardier of this Group then set up on target being bombed, aiming for center of town, and released the bombs.

6. No AACF was encountered after the bombs were away. No difficulty was experienced in getting the 306th Group back into Wing formation after the bombing run.

7. The return trip was uneventful and no attacks by enemy aircraft were encountered.

8. Fighter cover offered by P-47's was excellent.

SUBJECT: Communications Report for Mission of 10 October, 1943.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. PREPARATION:

In general, the correct radio procedure was followed throughout the mission.

2. RADIO AIDS:

Eighteen airplanes were equipped with "Ges" and reported good results to 05 52' E longitude. No jamming was reported, but greater distance was not possible due to fading of signals.

Splasher Beacon Number Six was used for homing with good results. Splasher Beacons Four and Five were used for L.O.P.'S in some cases. "B" group of Multi-Group Beacons was used for L.O.P.'S all the way to Germany and back - strong, clear signals were reported.

Two airplanes obtained weather reports from our base HF D/F station. One airplane obtained a QRM from our base station.

3. RADIO DISCIPLINE:

No breaches in radio discipline were observed or reported.

4. EQUIPMENT:

4-23515-423rd Squadron, Interphone weak at altitude. Co-pilot's mike button sticks, being checked.

4-30813-423rd Squadron, Bombardier's interphone out, fixed.

4-30767-367th Squadron, Pilot's mike button sticks, fixed.

4-30728-367th Squadron, Interphone weak, being checked.

5. REMARKS:

The 40th Combat Bombardment Wing Splasher proved very useful for keeping our airplanes close to the field with a low ceiling and poor visibility.

Good radio reception was reported throughout the flight.

SUBJECT: S-3 Narrative.

TO : Commanding Officer, 808th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. At 1155 hours, 10 October, 1943, nineteen airplanes of this Group began taking off to bomb Munster, Germany. One was abortive, none flew with other units, and all returned safely.

2. The assembly and route over England were flown substantially as planned, though poor visibility hampered the rendezvous of the Group. The lead Group flew at too high an indicated airspeed at altitude, resulting in excessive manifold pressure requirements in our Group. The navigation, in the vicinity of the IP and target, was poor, resulting in the bombing of the wrong town. The return to base was uneventful, with the exception of the problems and hazards presented by landing under conditions of extremely poor visibility.

3. It is recommended that the lead Group of the Combat Wing restrict cruising speeds to those laid down in Standard Operating Procedures. Such a policy will make for better formation flying, and also save the engines.

It is also recommended that missions not be flown on three consecutive days, since it leads to undue flying fatigue, especially on the part of the pilots. This is particularly dangerous when the landing at the end of the third mission is made under conditions of extremely poor visibility. Such landings tax the skill of a fresh pilot, and are extremely dangerous to one who is fatigued from twenty-two hours of combat formation flying in a space of fifty-four hours.

SUBJECT: Navigation Narrative.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. The 306th Bombardment Group (H) took off at 1155, 10 October 1943 to bomb Munster, Germany.
2. We climbed through dense fog to 8,000 feet and assembled the Group over the undercast.
3. The Group departed from Thurleigh on course at 1309 hours. Rendezvous was made with the 92nd and 305th Groups between Daventry and Peterborough. The 306th Group was the low Group in the Combat Wing.
4. The Combat Wing followed the planned course up to the last crossing of the Rhine River, when they turned slightly North to avoid AAGF.
5. The 92nd Group established the I.P. at 5148 N - 0703 E and went on to bomb Coesfeld.
6. The lead navigator of the 92nd Group must have mistaken the railroad at the I.P. and land marks were confusing. The town was similar to the primary only smaller.
7. The return to base was as briefed and was uneventful.
8. The Group arrived at base at 1659 hours and landed.

a. Aircraft No. 42-35198, Lower Ball Turret, reported as having erratic operation in azimuth at altitude.

b. Aircraft No. 42-3515, Right Upper Turret gun, Solenoid burned out.


2. Bombing Equipment failure was limited to the following:

a. Aircraft No. 42-30779, Bomb Load released by the Emergency Release; Bomb Control Rods hit by flak.

b. The following is a report of the C-1 Autopilot and bombsight Equipment.

a. The group lead aircraft No. 42-30732 made the bombing run on A.F.C.E. and the pilot reported that the equipment operated satisfactorily. The bombardier reported that the secondary clutch locking solenoid locked momentarily several times when he was in control of the aircraft. Complete ground check of the A.F.C.E. before and after the mission failed to reveal any malfunctioning.

b. No other malfunctions were found or reported.

SUBJECT: Bombing Narrative.

TO : Commanding Officer, 308th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. A.P.C.E. and ABC computer were used. Metro data checked O.K.

2. Much confusion was encountered by the 308th Bombardment Group (H) at the IP, and a collision with another group was averted only because of a violent turn. The lead group settled down on its bombing run, and the lead bombardier of the 308th group became confused as to which of the two cities in the vicinity was the target. As a result he had an actual 10 second run on the same target as the Combat Wing leader, and experienced great difficulty in aligning himself on the target of Cossfeld. It is believed this city was the target attacked, although neither navigators nor bombardiers are certain.

3. The 308th Group dispatched 19 aircraft, all of which carried 12 X 500 lb. M45 bombs. One aircraft was abortive and returned bombs; 18 aircraft released at target.

4. Strike photographs show some hits on the city, and a string of bombs wasted on open territory as a result of the very short run.


