SUBJECT: Intelligence Narrative  
Mission: STETTIN, 11 April, 1944

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 557

1. Narrative

Take off at 0739 hours. English coast at Orfordness at 0912 hours. Enemy coast at 5231N-0434E at 0949 hours. Slightly south of briefed course to 5215N-1147E at 1126 hours, to 5130N-1345E to Gorau which was obscured by clouds. After a 270 degree turn to the right, north over Frankfurt a. Oder to an I.P. at 5320N-1410E at 1250 hours. A run was started towards Politz but at 1252 hours the Group swung on a heading of 115 degrees to Stettin at 1255 hours. North to 5430N-1455 E to 5520N-1230E to 5520N-1115E to Bugenkop to 5440N-0850E where the Danish coast was crossed at 1509 hours. English coast at Cromer at 1723 hours. Landed at Base at 1812 hours.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

(1) 306th flew 19 a/c as low Group and 7 a/c as lead Squadron of high Group of 40th Combat Wing. (2) Twenty single engines made first attack at 1037 hours west of Hannover. Attack was simultaneous by all 20, from high above, head on. As one pilot said, "Fighters came in a ragged group and hosed the whole outfit." Our A/c 385, lead plane of the high Group, was severely hit, and the navigator and bombardier of the #7 plane in the same squadron were killed on this pass. About 1100 hours, B-24 stragglers were observed and apparently our fighter escort went to their aid, for there were no fighters with this formation at that time. The second attack started at 1102, and for about four minutes 3 miles north of Brunswick, 40 e/a, in fours abreast, swept through the high group from 12 to 2 o'clock high. Two 306th a/c were shot down from the high Group on this attack, the lead a/c previously damaged and our O19 leading the second element. (Attention is drawn to our report on March 29th mission to Brunswick. It is suggested that very probably the same enemy formations were engaged, judging from similarity of tactics and area where interception was made.) Fighter support was excellent until Hanover when it dwindled entirely, P-51's reappearing at the briefed target about 1208 and continuing to the Danish coast, where P-38's failed to appear. Two T/E planes trailing our formation for ten minutes, and sometimes hanging below as if for stragglers, were finally driven off and believed shot down by P-51's at about 1210 hours. Near Hannover four Me 109's were reported to drop bombs from 1500 feet above formation but these exploded harmlessly more than 1000 feet above. A total of about 75 e/a enemy fighters was seen, Me 109's and FW's, some with red stripes around the cockpit, others with a red spot like the Japanese marking on the left of the fuselage. We claim 4-0-2-1. When the formation was attacked for second time near Brunswick, Foxhole Leader called enemy planes out as P-51's, and said not to shoot; later when real P-51's came close to the formation they were vigorously shot at.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

A.A. fire was accurate on this Group at Dummer Lake, Hannover and Stettin and was observed all along the route. At Stettin, rocket was observed with large yellowish-white plume; four balls were thrown out, each of which exploded separately. Seven of these bursts were observed. Some of the A.A. gun fire north of Dummer Lake burst with a flash of red flame, rather than the usual black or white smoke bursts. Of 24 A/C returning, 20 were damaged by A.A. gun fire, 8 seriously. Total battle damage was 11 slight, 11 serious, only 2 A/C showing no damage. Chaff was thrown out for about 6 minutes before target and at other occasional spots on route, but crews state all ships did not discharge at same time. Lead navigator, however, called for its use at Ijmuiden on Dutch coast on way in and believes it was effective.

4. Bombing

In spite of two attempts, it was impossible to bomb primary due to 8/10 cloud cover. Wing made a 270 to the right, flew over Frankfort am Oder and proceeded toward secondary. Using Prenzlau as an I.P., Wing proceeded toward secondary which was seen and identified. As run progressed it became apparent that secondary could not be bombed visually due to a shelf of cloud, and Wing leader turned off to bomb Stettin. Strike photographs show good concentration in built-up area approximately one and one-half miles west of the Stettiner Oderwerke.

5. Leaflets  
A/C 113-Q dropped 50 parcels of Q 93's at last resort - Stettin.
6. Weather  
Weather was 10/10 over Channel and almost perfect over the continent until Central Germany, when cumulus began to build up, until at I.P. for the primary it was 8/10. Cloud prevented visual bombing at both primary and secondary.

7. Observations

Pictures being forwarded include good coverage of dock area at Stettin and show concentrations of naval and merchant shipping. Swedish broadcasting stations were used to check bearings by four of our A/C, three checking on MALMO and one on STOCKHOLM. All navigators concerned report good results. Engineering reports a new type of battle damage - a 20mm shell that seems to combine high explosive and incendiary action, still burning after the explosion. One vertical stabilizer has hole about two feet long, one foot wide. Two brownish, black smudges as large as hole appear beyond edge of damage. No odor. Photos will follow. Balloons were seen on dam across Elbe River northeast of Magdeburg; also at Brunswick, Hannover, and Furstenburg, 5209N-1440E. Smoke screens were observed NE and NW of Brunswick along Elbe canal. Seven large A/C, painted blue, were seen on airdrome at 5325N-1413E. Twenty silver fighters on airdrome near Hannover. Fifteen fighters on airdrome near Oschersleben. Sixteen four-engine A/C on airdrome near Frankfurt Oder at 5220N-1440E. Nineteen twin-engine A/C on airdrome near Burg, 5216N-1155E.

8. Our A/C in Distress

Pilot Opdyke, A/C # 385-U, was hit in first attack. During second attack pilot's window was seen to be broken and it is felt pilot was probably injured. Co-pilot motioned for deputy to take over and A/C fell back. Pilot Ahlstrom, A/C # 019-Q, during second attack left wing was seen to be on fire. Ship exploded. No chutes.

1043 hours, P-47, in spin and crashed. No chute seen.

1533 hours, B-17, turned back towards enemy coast.

A/C # 158-S, Pilot Jones, turned back at 0900 hours at 5150N-0010E. Instrument malfunction. Brought back 10 x 500.

11. Dispatched A/C Returning Early

A/C # 155-J, Pilot Rehn, turned back at 1058 hours, about 15 miles N.E. of Hannover; # 3 engine knocked out by flak. Jettisoned 10 x 500. Two P-47's gave him close support almost to coast.






# Iows Pass 96 Hours

## Streams of U.S. Ships Paste France, Reich; 4,000-Ton RAF Raid

Forts, Libs, B26s Hit Widespread Targets; You'll Soon Fly Dawn-to-Dusk in the Invasion, Eisenhower Tells Pilots

American bombers and fighters struck their heaviest pre-invasion blows yesterday as they smashed Nazi targets the width of Europe—from France to the Baltic Sea—in the wake of a 4,000-ton night assault by the RAF.

An air fleet of nearly 2,000 U.S. warplanes thundered out from Britain just after dawn and despatched task forces through bitter opposition to half a dozen points spread across Germany. Hundreds more medium bombers and their escorts lashed at objectives in France and Belgium.

In their fourth straight day of attack and their seventh this month, USSTAF Fortresses and Liberators hit early at Oschersleben and Bernberg, in central Germany, according to an official announcement, and Nazi radio broadcasts said other formations were attacking objectives along the Baltic.

With aircraft over the Channel and North Sea almost continuously from dawn to dark, the newest Allied offensive passed 96 hours of sustained attack obviously designed to smash the enemy forces in the air and immobilize them on the ground.

As the air fleet went out, Gen. Eisenhower told a group of American pilots they soon would be flying from dawn to dusk in a great land-sea invasion of Western Europe which would crush the Germans and crush them properly.

During that period, he said, he would depend of pilots everything they had.

He would drive them so hard, he added, that they would forego proper sleep and food for weeks—but they would break the Nazis, he declared emphatically.

While for four consecutive days the American bombers and fighters have been blasting away at the Luftwaffe's power in the air and on the ground, the RAF has been striking at the transport centers which funnel traffic to the German invasion-defense ports, and on Monday night the Lancasters and Halifaxes struck the heaviest blow of the war with approximately 4,000 tons of bombs on five railway junctions in France and Belgium.

Nine hundred bombers formed the RAF force, including Mosquitos which went to Hannover and the Ruhr. Twenty-two aircraft were reported missing over targets which included Ghent, Tergnier, Tours, Aulnoye and Laon. Mines also were laid in enemy waters.

The RAF forces were scarcely home from their widespread raids, which heaped fire and ruin on rail centers already under attack for a month by U.S. Marauders, when the Forts and Libs started out with their escorts of P51s, P47s and P38s. Formation after formation went up from British bases and joined the great stream of warplanes heading for the Reich. As they slanted off to the east, Marauder

bombers and Ninth Air Force Thunderbolts raced across the North Sea to follow up the RAF assault with blows at the railway center of Charleroi. Other B26 forces hit the Nazi airfield at Chievres, in Belgium, and military installations in northern France.

One Marauder was reported missing, but there was no official announcement up to late last night on the day's losses for the heavies and their escorts.

German radio last night claimed that more than 100 American aircraft were destroyed during the day. Unofficial indications last night were that U.S. losses, while high, would be approximately half, the Nazi claims.

Of the bombers which failed to return, at least seven were reported to have made forced landings in Sweden, and four crew members parachuted from another plane, Stockholm dispatches said.

Some heavy-bomber groups came home with reports of bitter battles as they dashed into the Reich for another day's opposition at other big targets.

German radio stations, whose raiding system was busy most of the day—except when the stations were closed down as raiders appeared overhead—reported fierce engagements all across Germany, particularly in the Hanover-Braunschweig area. Other air battles were taking place in northern Germany, the radio said, and a German News Agency report described a running action between U.S. planes and Nazi interceptors along the Baltic coast.

Some objectives were hit in clear weather, but other heavy bomber formations reported clouds over Germany.

Returning crews reported heavy enemy fighter opposition but prided their own fighter escort.

The fighters made vicious attacks on some of the groups but we got through OK," said 2 Lt. William Etheredge, Chicago, a Liberator navigator.

Saturday, Fortresses splattered bombs across Nazi airfields at Handorf, Achmer, Oldenburg and Quakenbruck, all in northwestern Germany, while Liberators hit the Messerschmitt 110 plants at Brunswick and railway junctions in the area. That day the USSTAF lost 34 bombers and 24 fighters, while the bomber gunners destroyed 60 enemy craft and the fighters 88.

Sunday, unescorted Fortress formations across the Baltic to Marienberg, Riga and Posen, fought through intense opposition and flak. Liberators hit Tutow and Warnemunde plants manufacturing Focke-Wulf fighters and pursuit formations strafed Nazi planes on the ground. The day's score was 31 bombers and eight fighters lost, 43 enemy planes shot down by the bombers and 20 by the fighters.

Monday, airfields and plane-repair depots in Belgium and France took a pounding as the Fortresses went in modest strength to the Junkers engine-repair station at Vilvorde, the Heinkel and Messerschmitt repair works at Evere and the airfield at Melsbroek. Liberators hit the factory turning out Luftwaffe transport planes at Bourges and Orleans and targets in the Pas de Calais. Fighters swept against ground installations. The day's losses were three bombers and four fighters, with seven enemy planes destroyed by the bombers and eight in air combat.
