SUBJECT: Intelligence Narrative

Mission: LIPPSTADT, 21st February, 1944.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. Narrative

21 A/C of the 306th flew lead Group of the 40th Combat Wing. Over Cromer at 1214 hours; enemy coast 5236N-0439E at 1302 hours. Then slightly north of briefed course to IP, where cloud made visual identification of target impossible. Turning right in search of a last resort target, made a 360 degree turn south of Bielefeld in an unsuccessful effort to make a run on a town momentarily glimpsed through a break in the clouds. Course then passed between Munster and Osnabruck, and northeast of Rheine, bombs were dropped on Hopsten A.D. after a short run on a heading of 302 degrees Mag. Then north of Zwolle, leaving enemy coast 5 miles south of briefed point at 1534 hours. Landed at base at 1702.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

Fighter support was excellent until about 1420 hours when 4 sets of RR flares were fired by leader of Group in distance ahead and to left. All fighters in sight swarmed over to that formation, leaving 40th Combat Wing unprotected from approximately 1420 to 1440. During this period 20 to 30 T/E and S/E's were seen. At 1424, in general area of primary, 2 Me210s made a violent headon attack from 12 o'clock above, diving close over our high squadron. One of these under heavy fire of our gunners, collided with a Bf109 "B" in triangle, which was flying as an 8th A/C with our high squadron. Left wing came off Bf109 and two chutes were seen. There were no other direct attacks on this Group. E/A seemed content to wait for stragglers. We claim 1-0-1 5 no claim.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

Worst A.A. gun fire encountered was at coast on way in and out, moderate but accurate. At Rheine, moderate, tracking and accurate. Meager and inaccurate from other points en route. A.A. gun fire damage out of 21 A/C, 12 slight, 5 serious.

4. Bombing

Primary covered by 10/10ths cloud. Formation headed out over break which opened to northeast, bombing Rheine/Hopsten airfield, identified by strike photos. Bombs are short to southeast. Town of Lingen hit by another Group.

6. Weather

10/10ths cloud in area over primary, but clear to north. Visibility good in bombing area.





# 8,000 Tons on Reich in 36 Hours 2,000 U.S. Planes Out Again; Nazi Fighter Output Is Cut 30 Pct.

**Two Day Raids of 1,000 Bombers Each  
Follow Devastating RAF Blows  
At Stuttgart and Leipzig**

Two thousand American warplanes struck again at the German aircraft industry yesterday in the fourth major Allied assault on the Reich in 10 hours.

"Switching their main attack from the Nazi fighter factories, whose production was slashed more than 30 per cent by the heaviest daylight raid of the war Sunday, the Fortresses and Liberators pounded airdromes, plane depots and two plants.

The attack carried the total tonnage dropped in the four raids to about 8,000, far and away the heaviest battering of the war.

Yesterday's assault, with nearly as many aircraft in the air as the 1,000 bombers and 1,000 fighters which Stuttgart ripped the heart out of the Germans' capacity to build lighter planes, cost 15 bombers and five fighters, it was announced officially. U.S. fighters destroyed 33 enemy planes, but

The attacks yesterday comprised the 12th day of operations this month for the heavies of the U.S. Strategic Air Force in Europe, equaling the previous high mark for any full month's operations.

The second great daylight blow was struck in the wake of the RAF's second straight major night effort—an attack Sunday night in "very great strength" on Stuttgart, in southwestern Germany.

Marauder medium bombers of the Ninth Air Force and RAF medium light bombers meanwhile contributed to the strain on the Luftwaffe with their second straight day of attacks on targets in France and the Low Countries, all without loss.

Bombed yesterday were two air-frame-component factories in Brunswick, which were badly damaged on Sunday; targets at industrial Hanover, and large aircraft parks and other military installations near the Netherlands border, including Bramsche, Lingen, Vechte, Quakenbruck, Diepholz and Ahlhorn.

While USSTAF ground crews were working through the night to equip the bombers for a second successive major effort, preliminary recapitulation of claims in Sunday's battles showed 126 enemy aircraft destroyed in the air and some two score more damaged or destroyed on the ground.

Meanwhile, it was revealed that at least 38 per cent of the facilities producing single-engine fighters in Germany, and 30 per cent of those turning out twin-engined fighters, had been shut down following Sunday's attack. In a statement last night, Maj. Gen. Frederick L. Anderson Jr., deputy commander for operations of the U.S. Strategic Air Forces in Europe, said:

"The best evidence now available shows that results of Sunday's daylight operations by the Eighth Air Force were in part as follows:

"1—There is no production today in factories near Leipzig which, immediately prior to the attack, were manufacturing approximately 38 per cent of Germany's single-engine fighter aircraft. Heavy damage was done to these plants. Whether it may be possible in time for the Germans to restore partial production has not yet been determined.

"2—The same statements hold true concerning the twin-engine fighter

## Frick Speaks Out Against NL Critics; Draft Figures Cited

**NEW YORK, Feb. 21—Obviously annoyed with the publication of misleading statistics on National League ball players in service, Ford Frick, league president, stepped forward to defend the players by revealing the accurate figures. "Just to keep the record straight," Frick said, "61 per cent of the men who were on the reserve list in 1941-42 are now in service or were called up and rejected.**

"Of those not in service, 17 are 4-F. Two are dead, two are aliens and perhaps a half dozen others are in war plants. I can say that we have in our league only a few more than 100 of the 294 originally on call."

"I should say," Frick continued, "that the two major leagues have around 425 players in service."


