Mission: AUGSBURG, 25 Feb. 1944.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 634.

1. Narrative

306th flew low Group to 305th. CBW and Division Assembly considered perfect by our Group leader, but course to target, being south of briefed route, led straight through very accurate Saarbrucken A.A. gun fire. Course home was again somewhat to south, but Saarbrucken was skirted by a swing around to the north this time. Take-off at 0901, Selsey Bill 1040, enemy coast 5003N-0118E at 1118. Target at 1353, enemy coast out 6 miles south of Le Treport at 1612, Beachy Head at 1631, base 1753.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

The 306th flew low Group in the 40th Combat Wing. Escort, until the target was spotty with large gaps. As soon as the formation emerged from the accurate and unexpected Saarbrucken A.... gun fire about 1210, and before it reformed, it was surprised by two sudden diving attacks, perfectly executed, out of the sun, each of which accounted for one of our ships. Each attack was made by a pair of Me109s working together. At 1325 a third attack got another of our A/C. While enemy fighters were always in sight from the first attack to the target, these three were almost the only attacks on this Group, and, as noted above, were made by comparatively few A/C. The majority of the 50 odd enemy fighters seen being content to attack stragglers. Several crews commented on the unusually large number of B-17s straggling on this mission. P-38s were picked up at 1330 shortly before the target and were seen to take care of some Me109s. P-47s were picked up at 1400 hours and Spitfires were met as briefed. There were gaps in fighter support on the way out but no more enemy fighters were seen. We claim 5 destroyed.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

The only severe A.A. gun fire encountered on the mission was seen when the lead group, flying south of course, inadvertently flew over Saarbrucken on the way in. At the target, A.A. gun fire by contrast was practically negligible. One crew felt chaff was helpful. Every ship landing at base had A.A. gun fire damage, 10 serious, 3 slightly.

4. Bombing

305th was first to bomb. Strike photos show the main weight of their bombs probably to the south, but smoke is all over the M.I. 300th bombs are slightly north, with about 12 bombs among parked A/C. A ship from 351st landing at this field carried a camera. Pictures show a huge fire originating in 40th Combat Wing aiming point. Shadow from fire is large enough to obscure entire airbase. There also appear to be hits on right in 41st area, and area to north where 94th had M.I. is hit by large concentration.

5. Weather

Overcast stopped at French coast. Weather CAVU thereafter.

6. Observations

Two rockets were seen coming from a wood just west of the airbase at Gunzburg. A white trail of smoke was seen leading to two large bursts at our altitude. As the smoke cleared, ten or twelve small white parachutes about one foot in diameter were observed from each burst. Each parachute supported a small bright red ball which floated slowly downward just behind our formation. Another crew reported the objects below the parachutes as being the size of beer bottles. These did not explode, the idea seeming to be for them to explode on contact with an airplane.

7. Our Aircraft in Distress

At 1210 A/C #245-K, pilot Coleman, was knocked out of formation by E/A. Nine chutes, several report ten.

At 1212, A/C #728, pilot Day, was attacked by Me109s. Wing broke off and plane went down. Six chutes seen.

At 1225, A/C #979-U, pilot Bayless, was attacked by E/A and went down with one engine smoking. Seven chutes were seen.

c. Other aircraft in Distress

At 1148, B-17 in 305th. Group was hit by E/A and seen headed toward Switzerland with #4 engine out. One man bailed out.

At 1258 B-17 went down with two E/A after it. Three chutes seen.

At 1318 B-17 went down smoking, followed by E/A. No chutes.

At 1358 two B-17s were losing altitude and heading for Switzerland. Two P-51s were following.


At 1450 B-17 was attacked by 8 Me109s and went down smoking, out under control. No chutes seen.

9. A/C Taking off but not Dispatched


A/C #724-E., pilot Rohn, took off and engine caught fire while over the field. He landed and got a spare, while taxiing got a flat tire.

A/C #505-V, pilot Durier, took off and turned back at 1053 hours, 5030N-0010E. Oil coming out of #2 engine.




These parachutes supported small red balls which floated down slowly just behind our formation. These red balls did not explode and it is thought that they are constructed so as to explode on contact with an A/C. One crew reported the objects as dangling from small parachutes and about the size of a beer bottle.
