SUBJECT: Intelligence Narrative
Mission: BRUNSWICK, 29 March, 1944

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 557

1. Narrative

21 A/C of 306th Group took off at 1001 hours flying High Group in 40th Combat Wing. At assembly, difficulty was experienced in finding Fox-hole Leader. Course was approximately as briefed, except for minor deviations for Flak areas. Group however, was 6½ minutes early at target. Left Lowestoft at 1204 hours, crossed Enemy Coast at 52°43'N-04°38'E at 1230½ hours. Following target at 1321½ hours, a swing slightly North of course was made to a point just above Celle, then Combat Wing turned South to course and came out about as briefed, crossing Enemy Coast 52°35'N-04°36'E at 1544½ hours. About 30 miles off Dutch Coast, Combat Wing made a 360° let down through overcast. Landing at Base at 1726 hours.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

Support was available, though scant, from Coast to target on way in. About five minutes after target P-51's disappeared and there was a 20 minute gap in support until P-47's were met as briefed, carrying formation to Coast. During gap in escort between 1335 hours and 1345 hours near Celle, a Combat box of 16 FW 190's was observed. They flew in four flights, two flights abreast in front followed by the other two immediately behind, each flight consisting of four A/C in echelon. This combat box was first observed level with the formation. The planes climbed rapidly and disappeared. Shortly after they came diving out of the sun, at terrific speed from 11 o'clock high in groups of three, so arranged that the attack was delivered simultaneously on the entire group, trio of fighters evidently being assigned a definite part of the formation. Two of our A/C in the High Squadron were knocked out of position by this pass and later finished off as they drifted behind, the tail gunner of one being seen to blow up an FW that came in too close. A navigator and a tail gunner were killed in two other A/C. After this first pass the FW's reformed and attacked the Lead Group headon queuing up to come in line astern. One crew reports FW's were of new type with long maroon noses, silver with black crosses. Same crew stated "P-51's seemed to be lured away from the Groups—the attacks followed". We claim: 2-0-0-3.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

Moderately accurate fire encountered from Southeast at bombs away. Scattered inaccurate fire along route particularly at Clopperburg and at Dummer Lake. Damage from A.A. fire 3 severe, 3 slight.

4. Bombing

Bombs were dropped on PFF on a heading of 145° Mag. through undercast with unobserved results. Enough gaps in cloud for navigators to pinpoint position on way in and most of the crews feel bombs dropped at Brunswick. The thirteenth photo taken after bombs away (6 second interval) places formation short of town over canal due west and slightly north of airfield briefed as primary.

5. Leaflets

A/C 827-G dropped 50 parcels G-34's over Brunswick.

6. Weather

Gaps permitted pinpointing on way in; with 8 to 10/10's cloud over target.

7. Aircraft in Distress

Our A/C #950-K, pilot Hardin, at I.P. suddenly lost altitude, dropped bombs, #2 engine feathered. One report states that he was later hit by fighters and four chutes came out. Another report places him far behind formation as it reached Zuider Zee.

Our A/C #965-W, pilot Haywood, hit by FW's at 1338, fell 2,000 feet, leveled off, #3 engine and inside of nose on fire; then jumped by fighters and lost to sight, possibly three chutes.

Our A/C 953-L, pilot Schuering, going down under control after fighter attack north of Celle, after Target.

Other A/C in Distress

1 B-17, 1335, straggled, hit by fighters, no chutes.

1 B-17, 1345, hit by fighters, lost altitude, 5 or 6 chutes reported, then plunged down in flames.

8. A/C Returning Early

A/C #765, Pilot Schwedock, returned to base at 1050 hours with prop feathered. Pilot took off again at 1102 hours in A/C #521 and turned back at 1216 hours 30 to 40 miles Northeast of Lowestoft, at 19,000. 10 x 100 and 32 x M47Al bombs were returned.

A/C #133, Pilot Sommerville, turned back at 1203 hours, near Lowestoft, when #2 super-charger ran away. 10 x 100 and 32 x M47Al bombs were returned.







They flew four flights, two flights abreast in front followed by the other two immediately behind, each flight consisting of four A/C in echelon. Aircraft in distress

Our A/C — A/C # 950-K, pilot Hardin, at 1P suddenly lost altitude, dropped bombs, propeller quit, # 2 engine feathered. One report states that he was later hit by fighters and four chutes came out. Another report places him far behind formation as it reached Zuider Zee.

A/C # 965-W, pilot Haywood, hit by FW's at 1338, fell 2,000 feet, leveled off, #3 engine and inside of nose on fire; then jumped by fighters and lost to sight, possibly three chutes. under control

A/C 953-L, pilot Schuering, going down/after fighter attack north of Celle, after target.

Other A/C

I B-17, 1335, straggled, hit by fighters, no chutes.

I B-17, 1345, hit by fighters, lost altitude, 5 or 6 chutes reported, then plunged down in flames.

A/C Returning Early

A/C #765, Pilot Schwedock, returned to base at 1050 hours with prop feathered. Took off again at 1102 hours in A/C #521 and turned back at 1216 hours, Northeast of Lowestoft, 30 to 40 miles off the Coast, at 19,000. 10x100 and 32x47 A 1 bombs were returned.

A/C #133, Pilot Sommerville, turned back at 1203 hours, near Lowestoft, when super-charger #2 ran away and ~~the engine~~ ~~the engine~~ 10x100 and 32x47 A 1 bombs were returned.

MEMORANDUM RE LT. HARDIN

Lt. Carlson of the 4th Fighter Group (P-47's) dropped in to Intelligence on March 31. He reported picking up a ship he believed to be Hardin's because of its "H" in a triangle with the letter "V" underneath and the fact that its name was "----Cut". He first picked up this P-47 at Hannover and brought him out as far as Almhaar near the Dutch coast. The P-47 had both inboard engines feathered and one outboard motor was rocking like "Hull". Carlson left him at 5233N x 0450E at 13,000 feet. (He had picked him up at 16,000 feet at Hannover. Carlson made three orbits off the Dutch coast waiting for Hardin but he never came out and Carlson thinks he turned south at about the point last seen and mentioned above.

Lt. Carlson thinks it would be great help if Straylers could ~~tune~~ in on Channel C and maintain contact with escort.


