SUBJECT: Intelligence Narrative,
Mission: Lyons A/F, France; 30 April, 1944.

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H), APO 557.

1. Narrative

7 A/C of the 306th Group took off at 0648 hours, flying low squadron in high composite group of 41st Composite Wing. Course was approximately as briefed throughout. Planes returned to base at 1416 hours.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

E/A made two attempts to attack the formation. The first was immediately countered by fighter escort. The second took advantage of the brief and only absence of fighter support during the mission. However, enemy pilots acted rather green and inexperienced. Near Orleans, 0916 hours, 3 S/E E/A made one pass at low or lead group, without firing a shot, and hotly pursued by P-47's. At 1155 between Nevers and Orleans, a glancing attack by two yellow-nosed FW 190's was made on this squadron from 11 o'clock high. One group fired green-green flares, and friendly fighters on Channel C stated that they would be there in about three minutes. At 1158 about 50 FW 190's, queuing up out of range at 6 o'clock, failed to press attacks, apparently due to appearance of P-47's. We claim 1-0-1-0.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

No anti-aircraft fire was experienced by our A/C.

4. Bombing

The high group virtually wiped out section of target assigned to it; almost the entire area on the western side of the field, from 94th CBW MPI to our MPI being covered with a close concentration which covered ammunition dump as well. Only one or two hangars at north end of field are visible on strike photos. Lead pilot reported that two hangars were lifted bodily into the air by 1,000 pounders. 2 hangars under lead CBW's MPI have roofs blasted off and field around them is heavily cratered.

5. Weather

Visibility was very good and light scattered cloud in target area was no hindrance to bombing.






Lead pilot reported that ~~two~~ hangars ^{were} lifted bodily into the air by 1000 pounders. 2 hangars under lead CBW's MPI have roofs blasted off and field around them is heavily cratered.
3. 306th flew 7 a/c in low squadron in high composite group of 41st Composite Wing. E/A made two attempts to attack the formation. The first was immediately countered by fighter escort. The second took advantage of the *(However, Enemy Pilots acted rather green and inexperienced)* brief and only absence of fighter support during the mission. Near Orleans, 0916 hours, 3 s/e e/a made one pass at low or lead group, without firing a shot, and hotly pursued by P-47's. At 1155 between Nevers and Orleans, a glancing attack by two yellow-nosed FW 190's was made on this squadron from 11 o'clock high. One group fired green-green flares, and friendly fighters on Channel C stated that they would be there in about three minutes. At 1158 about 50 FW 190's and Me 109's, queuing up out of range at 6 o'clock, failed to press attacks, apparently due to appearance of P-47's. We claim 1-0-1-0.

1. NO LEAFLETS CARRIED TO FRENCH TARGET.
2. HIGH GROUP VIRTUALLY WIPE OUT SECTION OF TARGET ASSIGNED TO IT; ALMOST THE ENTIRE AREA ON THE WESTERN SIDE OF THE FIELD, FROM 94TH CBW MPI TO OUR MPI BEING COVERED WITH A CLOSE CONCENTRATION WHICH COVERED AMMUNITION DUMP AS WELL. ONLY ONE OR TWO HANGARS AT NORTH END OF FIELD ARE VISIBLE ON STRIKE PHOTOS. LEAD PILOT REPORTED THAT TWO HANGARS WERE LIFTED BODILY INTO THE AIR BY 1000 POUNDERS. 2 HANGARS UNDER LEAD CBW'S MPI HAVE ROOFS BLASTED OFF AND FIELD AROUND THEM IS HEAVILY CRATERED.
3. 306TH FLEW 7 A/C IN LOW SQUADRON IN HIGH COMPOSITE GROUP OF 41ST COMPOSITE WING. E/A MADE TWO ATTEMPTS TO ATTACK THE FORMATION. THE FIRST WAS IMMEDIATELY COUNTERED BY FIGHTER ESCORT. THE SECOND TOOK ADVANTAGE OF THE BRIEF AND ONLY ABSENCE OF FIGHTER SUPPORT DURING THE MISSION. HOWEVER, ENEMY PILOTS ACTED RATHER GREEN AND INEXPERIENCED. NEAR ORLEANS, 0916 HOURS, 3 EX S/E E/A MADE ONE PASS AT LOW OR LEAD GROUP, WITHOUT FIRING A SHOT, AND HOTLY PURSUED BY P-47'S. AT 1155 BETWEEN NEVERS AND ORLEANS, A GLANCING ATTACK BY TWO YELLOW-NOSED FW 190'S WAS MADE ON THIS SQUADRON FROM 11 O'CLOCK HIGH. ONE GROUP FIRED GREEN-GREEN FLARES, AND FRIENDLY FIGHTERS ON CHANNEL C STATED THAT THEY WOULD BE THERE IN ABOUT THREE MINUTS. AT 1158 ABOUT 50 FW 190'S, QUEUING UP OUT OF RANGE AT 6 O'CLOCK, FAILED TO PRESS ATTACKS. APPARENTLY DUE TO APPEARANCE OF P-47'S. WE CLAIM 1-0-1-0.
4. NO ANTI-AIRCRAFT FIRE WAS EXPERIENCED BY OUR A/C.
5. VISIBILITY VERY GOOD AND LIGHT SCATTERED CLOUD IN TARGET AREA WAS NO HINDRANCE TO BOMBING.






