Heavy clouds prevented bombing by all but two groups which were able to find a hole in the clouds and dropped 98 tons of bombs on the target. Fighter support was furnished by 2 squadrons of Spitfires. Enemy opposition was slight. Flak was slight and inaccurate. 3 B-17s and 1 B-24 were lost.

BOMBING RESULTS: A break in the clouds at the target was found by 33 a/c of the 303rd and 305th Groups which dropped 198 x 1000 G.P. from 24-25000 ft. at 1225 hrs. Bursts were observed across the Rotterdam Dry Dock Co's. west yards with several direct hits on the plating sheds. There was a large concentration of bursts on the dock sidings northeast of the Lekhaven and among warehouses on the north quays of the Lekhaven and Kielhaven. Bursts were also observed among office and residential buildings immediately north of the dock sidings and at the northeast corner of Wilhelmina Hafen.

REASONS FOR FAILURE TO BOMB: 61 a/c failed to bomb because of heavy clouds which obscured the target. 3 B-17s crashed before reaching the target area, one was forced out of formation shortly after the take-off and was unable to find and rejoin it, and 3 returned early because of mechanical failure. The missing B-24 was last seen heading for England with the No. 2 engine afire after having completed the diversionary sweep.

ENCOUNTERS: E/a opposition was slight. About 25 a/a were encountered, all on the diversionary sweep. 1st Wing reports that attacks were made in clusters

off to one side with individual e/a peeling off for attacks which were not pressed home. 2nd Wing reports that many attacks were made in pairs from 4:30 to 6 o'clock, some from high and above, usually breaking off before coming closer than 600 yards. The e/a were mostly FW 190s with a few Me 109s. Four of the FW 190s were completely black. Other colorings noticed were: silver wings with black crosses; yellow noses; orange noses and black cowling; and orange and black fuselages.

PERSONNEL CASUALTIES: In the 1st Wing 16 crew members were killed (15 in collision near Wellingborough), 3 seriously wounded, and 4 slightly wounded. 2nd Wing reports 1 crew member slightly wounded and 10 missing.

EQUIPMENT CASUALTIES:

Lost: 2 B-17s collided near Wellingborough and crashed shortly after taking off. 1 B-17 crashed near Bradwell Bay after being badly shot up on the diversionary sweep. 1 B-24, which was last seen about 15 miles off the English Coast with No. 2 engine afire, is missing.

Estimated Battle Damage: Category "A" - 3 B-17s and 1 B-24; Category "E" - 1 B-17.

FLAK: At the target flak was slight and inaccurate with black bursts. Slight and inaccurate flak was encountered over Schouwen or Overflakkee Islands, and along the Dutch Coast at The Hague, Scheveningen, Leiden, and Katwijk aan Zee. Intense and accurate flak with black bursts was encountered over Walcheren Island at 17000 ft.

FIGHTER SUPPORT: 2 squadrons of Spitfires provided support and cover, while 5 squadrons of Spitfires carried out diversionary sweeps over the Pas-de-Calais. The crew of 1 B-17 reported that Spitfires came in and supported it exceedingly well when it was being chased by 2 FW 190s after having sent out an SOS that it was turning back because of engine trouble.

ROUTE: Rendezvous point for both Wings was at Harwich, the formations then proceeded on the diversionary sweep to 51°20'N-02°15'E, to 51°50'N-03°00'E to Harwich. En route to the I.P., which was about 8 mi. SW of The Hague, cloud conditions prevented navigators from obtaining a fix until a break through was found along the coast at Blankenberghe. The course was then altered toward the I.P.

WEATHER: Low cloud at take-off was 6/10-8/10 with bases 1500-2000 ft. and tops at 5000 ft., 8/10-10/10 altostratus at 16-18000 ft. and 3/10-4/10 cirrus above, with a visibility of 4-6 mi. En route there was 8/10-10/10 low cloud with occasional breaks to 3/10-6/10, middle clouds of 6/10-8/10 with bases at 15-18000 ft., and good visibility. The target was obscured, except for small breaks, by 7/10-8/10 low and middle clouds and 7/10-8/10 clouds above 20000 ft. Visibility was good. Winds encountered were as forecast. Non-persistent contrails were encountered at 18-20000 ft. On return trip light rime was encountered at 10000 ft.

OBSERVATIONS: A mile-long line of concrete fortifications was seen paralleling the coast about 5 mi. north of The Hague. Naval and shipping observations include a large ship, believed to have turrets, in the mouth of the Maas River; a large freighter at dock at Ostendo; and many small ships in harbor at Rotterdam. One enemy submarine near a friendly convoy 15-20 mi. east of Walton-on-Naze crash dived when sighted. 2 beams of light observed off Walcheren Island seemed to follow one formation of the 1st Wing in manner similar to S/L beams. The 2nd Wing reports orange lights, often in pairs, on ground just inside Dutch Coast.



Hennessey's plane opened fire and saw E/A enter his stream of bullets. Jones saw his tracers hit first the motor and then back through the fuselage. Lt. Pollock on plane 649 followed this E/A as it passed under Hennessey's plane at which point he saw it first start to smoke and then burst into such intense flames that they could not possibly be put, at which point this E/A plummeted straight down still fiercely blazing until out of sight in the clouds.
