SUBJECT: Intelligence Narrative

MISSION: FRANKFURT, 3 February, 1944.

WILHELMSHAVEN *PSS*

1. Narrative

The 306th "A" Group left Cromer at 1015 hours. To avoid high cloud this Group swung 10 to 15 miles north of course to the I.P., after crossing the enemy coast at 5248N-0440E at 1052 hours. As briefed from target to enemy coast at 5347N-0745E at 1130 hours, thence to 5405N - 0700E turning short to avoid a front to the north. Reached Cromer at 1408 hours and base at 1506 hours.

The 306th "B" Group left the English coast three miles south of Cromer at 1016 hours. Heavy clouds and con trails off the Dutch coast not only separated this Group from Combat Wing but cut off and dispersed high squadron which was forced to return to base individually as noted below. Briefed course to enemy coast at 1048 hours, target at 1123 hours. Enemy coast back at 1131 hours at 5346N-0738E. During the entire trip over enemy territory the 306th "B" Group flew alone, in sight of but not with any combat wings. Cromer was crossed at 1349 hours and base was reached at 1435 hours.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

There was no enemy air opposition. No enemy planes were seen by either 306th "A" or 306th "B" groups. Fighter escort was excellent, P-47s meeting both groups as briefed and furnishing close escort through entire trip over enemy territory. P-38s gave close support to out "A" Group from the target to the coast on the way out. We make no claims.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

Both 306th "A" and "B" Groups encountered slight but accurate tracking from I.P. to target followed by a low but fairly severe barrage from target area. In the case of "B" Group barrage started late - 30 seconds after "Bombs away". Meager and inaccurate flak came from Langeoog and Oldenburg.

4. Bombing

Bombing results not seen due to complete cloud cover. 306th "A" Group, advised by PFF a/c that its equipment was out, bombed on PFF of another Combat Wing at 1123 hours.

306th "B" Group, proceeding alone on D.R. from Dutch coast, bombed city which appeared through break in overcast at exact time of E.T.A. Intense flak at target and presence of Combat Wings ahead support belief target bombed was primary. No nickels were dropped.

5. Weather

Thick, persistent con trails plus 9/10 to 10/10 clouds as high as 27,000 feet before and after target and 20,000 feet in target area separated low group from Combat Wing formation and cut off its high squadron.

6. Aircraft Returning Early

A/C No. 935-Y, pilot Horst, turned back at 0915 hours over Luton, due to bomb rack failure. All nickels carried were brought back. Landed at 0948.

A/C No. 065-Z, pilot Hector, turned back at 1055 hours at 5222N-0450E. Thick clouds broke up high squadron, and this A/C could not regain contact with Group. 8 booby bombs dropped at 5230N-0420E at 1115 hours, and 4 x 500 returned. Landed at 1240 hours.

A/C No. 558-N, pilot Cassidy, turned back at 1050 hours at 5232N-0440E. Lost Group in heavy cloud. 12 x 500 returned.

A/C No. 963-P, pilot Love, turned back at 1106 hours at 15 miles south of Lemmer, Holland. No. 4 engine went out. 12 x 500 were jettisoned.

A/C No. 196, pilot Hilton, turned back at 1046 hours at 5237N-0420E. Two inboard engines went out. 12 x 500 jettisoned in North Sea at 5242N-0420E at 1104 hours.

A/C No. 765-D, pilot Rutherford, turned back at 1058 hours at 5248N-0450E. Lost Group in thick clouds. Returned 12 x 500.

A/C No. 469-K, pilot Somerville, turned back after becoming separated from Group in clouds in vicinity of I.P. at about 1110 hours. Returned 12 x 500.

A/C No. 431-Y, pilot DiBetta, turned back at 1105 hours at 5315N-0550E with one engine turned out. 12 x 500 salvoed at 5320N - 0458E at 1112 hours.

Over 1,100 Planes Blast Enemy Port

Marauders, Allied Craft In Day-Long Sweeps Over N.W. Europe

Flying Fortresses bombed Wilhelmshaven, Germany's biggest North Sea port, in daylight yesterday to complete the sixth U.S. heavy bombing mission in seven days.

More than 1,100 bombers and long range fighters flew above almost solid clouds to give the Nazi U-boat center its eighth attack by Americans. Other formations of U.S. and Allied bombers and fighters were staging

long raids all across the northwestern ring of Hitler's Europe.

Marauders kept up their pounding of targets along the invasion coast of France, followed by formations of A-20s, Mitchells, Mosquitos, Typhoons, fighter-bombers and swarms of escorting fighters. Other Typhoons sank three barges off the Dutch coast. In the day attacks two fighter-bombers were reported missing.

Four heavy bombers and nine fighters were reported missing from the day raids. Fighters escorting the heavy bombers shot down eight Nazis; four runners, one.

Probably Over 700 Heavies

The heavy blow of the day's attacks was carried out by a force probably including more than 700 heavy bombers and was aimed primarily at the vast network of shipbuilding yards and docks which turn out most of Germany's

smaller submarines—the 500- and 230-ton coastwise craft which presumably will be used against Second Front shipping.

Marien Werft and Deutsche Werke are the two largest yards at Wilhelmshaven and in one group of their slips 13 submarines can be handled at one time. While the RAF has not hit Wilhelmshaven since last April, the USAAF attacked the sub yards last Nov. 3.

The first USAAF attack on Germany, Jan. 27, 1943, also was aimed at Wil-

helmshaven, but the striking force com-

prised 53 heavy bombers, approximately one-fifteenth yesterday's force.

Little Fighter Opposition

For most of the Fortress groups in the mission, however, an ineffectual cover-solid cloud, with moderate flak and little fighter opposition. Bomber crews were enthusiastic in praising the close fighter cover. The layer of weather which covered the target almost solidly throughout the attack also apparently kept Luftwaffe interceptors grounded, flits reported.

Capt. Arthur F. Briggs, of San Antonio, Tex., deputy commander of a group, who flew in a lead ship piloted by 1/Lt. Alan F. Tucker, of Hood River, Ore., said, "I saw almost nothing today except friendly planes and vapor trails (contrails). There was a little flak, but it didn't bother our group. Over the top of the clouds I could see four wings of B17s going over

the target ahead of us. Everybody was making contrails. It looked like a series of twisted bowling alleys. P47s, P38s and P51s played tag around us all the time."

1/Lt. Richard E. Rylands, of Ozone Park, L.I., N.Y., a bombardier who flew as a tail gunner on his 24th mission, said, "There were a lot of airplanes, at least a couple of hundred bombers behind me, and at no time during the operation did I see less than a hundred of our own fighters forming around us. It gives you a cozy feeling."

The attack was the second in two days for the heavy bombers, the sixth in seven days. The big aerial push which has covered targets from the Pas de Calais to deep in central Germany began with a lossless foray against the invasion coast of France last Friday. Frankfurt was attacked the next day, and Brunswick and Hanover on Sunday. Liberators went to the Pas de Calais on Monday, were grounded on Tuesday, but back in northern France again Wednesday.

Only 51 bombers were reported lost from the five missions through Wednesday, when two Liberators failed to return. Yesterday's was the third time in a week that the entire striking force numbered more than 1,100 planes.

Last night small formations of German intruders attacked southeastern England. There was an alert and moderate number of fighters.

GREATEST BLOW AT WILHELMSHAVEN

1,500 tons hit navy base

WILHELMSHAVEN had its biggest daylight attack yesterday, when more than 1,100 heavy American bombers and fighters circled round the great naval base like traffic around a city square and dropped 1,500 tons of bombs.

German fighters for the most part kept out of range. Only four of the great force of Forts and Liberators were lost. They flew 750 miles through snow, heavy wind and temperatures 30 degrees below zero.

Most of the bombs were dropped through heavy cloud. Heavy explosions and fires are reported.
