SUBJECT: Intelligence Report

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H).

1. Hot News

B-17 ditched at 1022 hours in Channel between Le Havre and Selsey Bill. (4950N-0030W). Phoned to Wing.

B-17 at approximately 0838 East of Paris (10 miles); 4-7 chutes seen. Plane appeared to be under control and had wheels down. Believed to belong to 92nd Group.

B-17 at 1000 hours exploded (flak hit), North of Evreux. No chutes seen.

2. Narrative

18 A/C took off at 0610, arriving over Dungeness at 0801. Course as briefed to target. On way back, came by way of Meulan, n/e of Paris, to Ganarden, to Monancourt, to St. Andre, to Evreux, to Trouville, to Selsey Hill over London to base.

3. Fighter Opposition

Enemy fighter opposition was weak. Some 40 to 50 enemy aircraft, practically all FW190's, observed at 0815, but only direct attacks came between Meaux, East of Paris, at 0834 and IP, when about a dozen FW's made head on attacks on low elements of this group. Attacks lasted only a short time and were almost invariably from 12 o'clock, level. Fighter escort excellent and close, breaking up more than one nose attack, and taking complete care of all fighter opposition until leaving formation around I.P. No fighters encountered over target or on way out. We claim 2-0-0.

4. A.A. Gun Fire

There was no A.A. Gun Fire at this group over target, but intense firing off to left. This may have been directed at 92nd, which turned off to left between I.P. and target, while 306th went on to bomb primary. Most A.A. Gun Fire encountered by this group was at Evreux on way out at 0951. Odd bursts at other points on route including Gayeux, Grandvilliers, Rouen, Etampes, Conches and Le Havre.

5. Bombing

306th bombed primary. Position fixed by GEE. Photos confirm location, but cloud on photographs obscure point of impact. Lead bombardier and navigator had location of field fixed from I.P. Picked up field through hole in clouds, ran on briefed MPI, when cloud obscured it, picked up main dispersals and aiming point north side of field, made 25 second run and dropped. Weather clear to I.P. 8/10 to 10/10 from there to Target.

Several crew members reported that FW190's "ran away" from P47's, and seemed to avoid combat with them at all costs. Crews report Me109's shooting rockets at P47's.

(A) Narrative

S-1. Enemy fighter opposition was weak. Some 40 to 50 enemy aircraft, practically all FW190's, observed at 0815, but only direct attacks came between Meaux, East of Paris, at 0834 and IP, when about a dozen FW's made head on attacks on low elements of this group. Attacks lasted only a short time and were almost invariably from 12 o'clock, level. Fighter escort excellent and close, breaking up more than one nose attack, and taking complete care of all fighter opposition until leaving formation around I.P. No fighters encountered over target or on way out. We claim 2-0-0.

S-2. No A.A. Fire at this group over target, but intense firing off to left. This may have been directed at 92nd, which turned off to left between I.P. and target, while 306th went on to bomb primary. Most A.A. Fire encountered by this group was at Evreux on way out at 0951. Odd bursts at other points on route including Cayeux, Grandvilliers, Rouen, Etampes, Conches and Le Havre.

S-4. 5 seriously damaged, four slightly damaged. Practically all damage from A.A. F.

S-6. Black smoke seen rising above low cloud, at least 5,000 feet in air, SE of Paris, near easterly loop in Seine, undoubtedly result of 4th Wing bombing. 92nd bombed airfield on way out near Evreux, possibly St. Andre de L'Eure. Bombs hit center of airport, at 0948, without seeming to hit buildings or dispersals. Good concentration reported. About 25 E/A and other activity seen on airfield at Bretigny.

S-7. 306th bombed primary. Position fixed by GEE. Photos confirm location, but cloud on photographs obscure point of impact. Lead bombardier and navigator had location of field fixed from I.P. Picked up field through hole in clouds, ran on briefed MPI, when cloud obscured it, picked up main dispersals and aiming point north side of field, made 25 second run and dropped. Weather clear to I.P. 8/10 to 10/10 from there to Target.

S-8. Several crew members reported that FW190's "ran away" from P47's, and seemed to avoid combat with them at all costs. Crews report Mel09's shooting rockets at P47's.

Jettisoned bombs in channel on return. #052, bombs would not release over target. Brought bombs back. (8) No A/C returned early.







No A.A. fire seen at target but an intense barrage consisting of about 40 bursts was seen to N.W. of Rouilly. It was suggested that this barrage came from a dummy airfield to throw us off the track.

Paris Among Eight Enemy Targets Hit

orts, Marauders Pound Air Bases; Nazis Lose 29 Fighters in Day

Eighth Air Force Flying Fortresses and Marauders, smashing Luftwaffe airfields and repair bases for the second successive day, blasted eight targets in France yesterday, including the former Caudron-Renault aircraft factory at Paris, now used for Me109 repairs.

The day's raids, which cost the enemy 29 fighters knocked down by the Forts and the supporting fighters, came only a few hours after the same combination of heavy and medium USAAF bombers, striking out over the coast shortly before dusk Thursday under cover of the year's biggest fighter blanket, pounded two airbases and a power station in western France.

10 Planes Missing

Eight heavy bombers and two fighters failed to return from yesterday's raids, and one medium bomber, one light bomber and two fighters were missing after the Thursday evening operation.

The success of the heavily-armed Fortress against the toughest sort of fighter opposition of yesterday's bag of 29 enemy planes were credited to the B17s—led Air Chief Marshal Sir Philip Joubert to assert in a war commentary broadcast by radio that "It almost looks as though the Fortress type of bomber has defeated the contemporary fighter."

The Forts hit five targets in their early morning strike into France: 1—The Caudron-Renault aircraft factory in Paris, separated by a bend in the Seine from the large Renault motor works heavily damaged by Forts last April 5; 2—A large Luftwaffe repair base for single-engine fighters at Romilly-sur-Seine, 65 miles southeast of Paris; 3—A base for fighter reserves at Beaumont-le-Roger, on the Risle river, about 30 miles southwest of Paris; 4—An operational fighter base






