21 AC. took off at 0745 hours to bomb the marshalling yards at Hamm, Germany. There were no abatives; one of our AC failed to return.

The weather at take off was hazy, becoming progressively worse over the North Sea until the Island of Texel was reached when solid layers of heavy clouds were encountered. At this point the leader of the formation decided it was unwise to proceed further inland and turned back.

There was no flak reported.

4 or 5 FW 190's, 1 Ju 88 and 2 ME 110's were seen off the Island of Texel, the latter engaged AC making no attempt to engage our formation. The Ju 88 flew with us until fuel upon and then disappeared in a cloud.

The FW's appeared suddenly out of the clouds and made several passes at ships in our group. Capt. Friend's AC lagged slightly as the formation began its homeward turn and was immediately attacked by 1

FW coming in on a steep dive at about 3 o'clock. His #3 engine was hit and caught on fire at which time he left the formation apparently under control. Manual two or three other attacks were made on him and the next time he was seen fire was enveloping his plane along the fuselage to the tail. At this point 7 chutes were seen leaving the ship which was still over water but very close to land.

SUBJECT: Operations Report.

TO : Commanding General, Headquarters, First Bombardment Wing, APO 634.

(In compliance with Memorandum, Headquarters First Bombardment Wing, dated 21 February 1943, the following report is submitted.)

1. Narrative of Mission.

On mission of 4 March 1943, 21 A/C of 306th Bombardment Group (H) began taking off at 0745. Group assembled over base in formation and departed at 2,500 feet at 0814. Formation flown was two Squadrons of 7 in "V's" echeloned to the right and one Squadron of 7 in "V's" echeloned to the left. Lead Squadron was at base altitude with left Squadron high and right Squadron low. Arriving at Bassinbourne at 0828 the Group assembled with the 91st Bombardment Group (H) and the 101st Provisional Combat Wing departed with 91st Bombardment Group (H) leading 306th Bombardment Group (H). The 101st Provisional Combat Wing rendezvoused at 3,000 with the 102 Provisional Combat Wing at Scale at 0850 hours after making a left turn, with 102nd Provisional Combat Wing leading 101st Provisional Combat Wing. The formation crossed the English Coast out at Cromer at 9,800 feet and proceeded to a point 53° 39' N, 03° 04' E, where a right turn was executed. Formation proceeded on course until enemy A/C were encountered just previous to crossing the island of Texel. The weather became progressively worse until the island of Texel was reached when solid layers of heavy clouds were encountered and visibility dropped to about 300 yards. At this point our aircraft 42-5129 was shot down by enemy aircraft. At 0954, just past the island of Texel, the formation leader decided it was unwise to continue under the adverse weather conditions and a wide right turn was executed at 21,200 feet and formation headed for base. Descending to 3,500 feet we crossed the English Coast in at 1035 hours at Cromer and proceeded to base, landing at 1113.

2. Bombing.

No bombs were dropped on this mission.

3. Abortives.

There were no abortions on this mission.

4. Air Combats.

a. Enemy Tactics.

Four or five FW 190's, one JU 88, and two He 110's were seen off the island of Texel, the latter 2 engine A/C making no attempt to engage our formation. The JU 88 disappeared in a cloud when fired upon. The FW's appeared suddenly out of the clouds and made several passes at our Group. A/C 42-6129, pilot Captain William I. Friend, lagged slightly on the home-ward turn and was immediately attacked by one FW coming in on a steep dive at about 3 o'clock. His No. 3 engine was hit and caught on fire at which time he left the formation apparently under control. Meanwhile two or three other attacks were made on him and the next time he was seen fire was enveloping his plane along the fuselage to the tail. Seven parachutes were seen to leave the ship at this point. The Group claims one enemy A/C destroyed.

b. Our Tactics.

Although there were not great numbers of enemy fighters, attacks were made from all positions. The usual method of fire control was employed, with gunners being assigned a particular angle of fire prior to take-off. Gunners called out the angle of attack by the clock method. The same defensive formation as usual was flown by this Group. Turret gunners tried out the experimental British Reflector Sight and reports are very favorable.

c. Armament Failures.

- (1) Solenoids of Ball Turret guns went out at 13,000 feet but worked again upon returning to this altitude. This was on aircraft 42-5130 and cause has not been ascertained for certain as yet.
- (2) An electrical short circuit caused a solenoid on aircraft 41-24486 to go out.
- (3) A broken ejector caused radio gun on aircraft 42-5130 to cease firing.
- (4) One broken charging cable was reported.
- (5) None of these armament failures were serious and all can be corrected immediately.

d. Suggested Changes in our Tactics or Equipment.

Gunners reported very favorably on the experimental British Reflector Sight. Some of its advantages are: more head space in the Upper Turret, faster tracking makes possible the use of chest type parachute in the lower Ball Turret and due to limited visibility was much better than the computing.

5. Flak.

There was no flak reported on this mission.

6. Communications.

- a. The procedure employed was as prescribed with one aircraft breaking radio silence prior to take-off to call the tower for a tug.
- b. Navigational Aids--Two aircraft reported using Splasher Beacons numbers 5, 3, 7, and 12 with good results. One aircraft obtained two fixes using Beacons 5, 7, and 12 with good results. One aircraft reported using 3 Groups of multi-group beacons for homing.
- c. There were no breaches of radio discipline except the aforementioned call to the tower which is considered necessary.
- d. Equipment Failures--Aircraft 42-5431 reported one IFF antenna broken which has been fixed. Aircraft 42-5729 reported a sticky microphone button which caused interphone to go out for 20 minutes. This has been fixed. Aircraft 41-24417 reported interphone in Ball Turret out which was caused by dirty slip rings. Aircraft 42-5130 reported Radio Compass out which is being checked.
- e. All radio operators received the message from First Bombardment Wing. Two radio operators reported interference on the Wing frequency at 1020 and 1105 hours. Information not available as to whether it was enemy jamming or not.

7. Other Equipment Failures.

Aircraft 41-24488--Coupling connection engine and propeller governor broke.

Aircraft 41-24465--Supercharger regulator went out. New one being installed and will be in status within 6 hours.

Aircraft 42-5431--Supercharger ran away. The balance line is being cleaned to remedy this.

8. Battle Damage

There was no battle damage to aircraft of this Group on this mission, excluding aircraft 42-5129 which was shot down.

9. Aircraft Down Away from Base.

All aircraft of this Group returned to the home base excluding the one shot down over enemy territory.

10. General Recommendations and Corrective Action Adopted.

It is recommended that the lead Group on a mission of this type adhere more strictly to the altitude stated in the order, as evidenced by our Group's crossing the English Coast out at 9,900 feet, in order to stay above the Groups ahead.

It should be stressed again that radio silence must be maintained until the time of the first enemy attack, and that subsequent to the attack, the radio may be used almost freely. Today some individual insisted on breaking radio silence in one of the other groups thereby materially increasing the danger to those on the mission.

The less said about the weather and the possibility of better forecasts, the better.

The enemy as usual showed good ingenuity in making use of the cover offered for his fighters. This is best evidenced by the enemy fighter planes sneaking in under the vapor trails to make his attacks.


